### **Local Government Regulation 2012**

Section 272 of the Regulation stipulates that the Chief Executive Officer must ensure that minutes of each meeting of a local government are taken under the supervision of the person presiding at the meeting.

Minutes of each meeting must include the names of councillors present at the meeting and if a division is called on a question, the names of all persons voting on the question and how they voted. At each meeting, the minutes of the previous meeting must be confirmed by the councillors present and signed by the person presiding at the later meeting.

A copy of the minutes of each meeting must be available for inspection by the public, at a local government's public office and on its website, within 10 days after the end of the meeting. Once confirmed, the minutes must also be available for purchase at the local government's public office(s).

### OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

### That Council adopt the Human Rights Policy (LSP\_CORP\_29).

The following report has been submitted for inclusion into Council's Ordinary Meeting to be held on 27 January 2021.

### **SUMMARY**

The Human Rights Act 2019 requires Council to act and make decisions in a way that is compatible with 23 specific human rights. The Human Rights have been grouped into 2 categories under the Act:

### Civil and political rights

- Recognition and equality before the law
- Right to life
- Protection from torture and cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment
- Freedom from forced work
- Freedom of movement
- Freedom of thought, conscience, religion and belief
- Freedom of expression
- Peaceful assembly and freedom of association
- Taking part in public life
- Property rights
- Privacy and reputation
- · Protection of families and children
- Cultural rights—generally
- Cultural rights—Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islander peoples
- · Right to liberty and security of person
- Humane treatment when deprived of liberty
- Fair hearing
- Rights in criminal proceedings
- Children in the criminal process
- Right not to be tried or punished more than once
- Retrospective criminal laws

### Economic, social and cultural rights

- Right to education
- Right to health services



### **PURPOSE**

This report proposes that Council adopt a policy to document Council's intention to act in accordance with the Human Rights Act and establish internal and external grievance procedures, should a complaint arise.

### **BACKGROUND**

The underlying principles to the Act and Council's draft policy are that:

- The inherent dignity and worth of all human beings are acknowledged, protected and are essential in a democratic and inclusive society.
- Human Rights should only be limited after careful consideration, and in a way that can be justified, fair and balanced.

The Human Rights Act requires all public entities in Queensland to act compatibly with Human Rights and to consider human rights before making a decision.

### STATUTORY/COMPLIANCE MATTERS

The provisions of the Human Rights Act 2019 apply to Council as a Queensland Public Entity.

### **ANALYSIS**

Council is bound by the Act, but is not required to adopt a policy, however, should a complaint be made against Council a policy that establishes a procedure to deal with the grievance provides a framework to give effect to the Act and Council's obligations, before escalation to the Human Rights Commission.

### STRATEGIC IMPACTS

The Act does not impose any additional impacts on Council and the role of Human Rights Contact Officer will be absorbed within the existing responsibilities of current staff.

### **Purpose**

The purpose of this policy is to outline Whitsunday Regional Council's responsibilities in applying the *Human Rights Act 2019* to:

- protect and promote human rights;
- help build a culture that respects and promotes human rights; and
- assists to promote a dialogue about the nature, meaning and scope of human rights.

### Scope

This policy applies to all Councillors, employees and contractors of Whitsunday Regional Council.

### **Applicable Legislation**

This policy refers to the Human Rights Act 2019 (Qld), with linkages to:

- Age Discrimination Act 2004 (Cwth)
- Anti-Discrimination Act 1991 (Qld)
- Public Interest Disclosure Act 2010 (Qld).
- Racial Discrimination Act 1975 (Owth)
- Sex Discrimination Act 1984 (Cwth)

### **Policy Statement**

### 1. Council's Position on Human Rights

- 1.1. Council is committed to
  - respecting, protecting and promoting the human rights of individuals;
  - complying with applicable legislation that supports human rights;
  - providing a fair, safe and healthy working environment for our employees that is free from unlawful discrimination, harassment, bullying or victimisation;
  - being an inclusive employer, promoting and valuing diversity within our workforce, among our customers, suppliers and in the communities in which we operate;
  - respecting our customers' privacy and protect their personal information.

### 2 Decision making

Council acknowledges that the Act allows for any of the human rights to be reasonably limited: just because a human right is impacted by a decision or action does not mean that the decision or action is incompatible with the Act or invalid.

Deciding what is reasonable is a matter of balancing the rights of the individual and the rights of the community. The following principles underpin Council's commitment to human rights:

- · the inherent dignity and worth of all human beings;
- the equal and inalienable human rights of all human beings;
- human rights are essential in a democratic and inclusive society that respects the rule of law.
- human rights must be exercised in a way that respects the human rights and dignity of others:
- human rights should only be limited after careful consideration and in a way that can be reasonable; justified; proportionate; rational; and balanced; and
- human rights have a special importance for the Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait
   Islander peoples of Queensland as Australia's first people, particularly the right to self-determination.

All statutory provisions (e.g. laws, regulations) are to be interpreted so far as is possible in a way that is compatible with human rights. If laws or regulations can be understood in a number of ways, the Act requires that the interpretation that takes human rights into account should be preferred. During the decision-making stage deciding what is reasonable limitation is a matter of balancing the rights of the individual and the rights of the community.

### 3 Complaints regarding the Human Rights

- 3.1 Whitsunday Regional Council will investigate and attempt to resolve any complaints made internally or by external clients;
- 3.2 All internal complaints will be dealt with through the implementation of the internal grievance procedures, identified in Attachment 1. Managers and the Human Rights Contact Officer are available to provide further details, support and advice. It is important to raise the issue of any potential or possible breach as soon as practicable;
- 3.3 For all external complaints, alleged breaches of human rights, a complaint is to be made initially to Chief Executive Officer. The complaint will be given a high priority and a written response will be provided, together with a statement of reasons;
- 3.4 Where a complaint is not resolved to the complainant's satisfaction, the complaint may be escalated to the Human Rights Commission as the independent arbitrator;
- 3.5 A person cannot claim financial compensation for a breach of their Human Rights; and
- 3.6 If the complainant is dissatisfied with the response, or after 45 business days has elapsed, the complainant may refer the matter to the Queensland Human Rights Commission.

### 4 Compliance and responsibilities

### 4.1 Officers

### 4.1.1 All Council employees:

- are obliged to respect, promote and act compatibly with human rights;
- must take the Act into account when developing and implementing Council guidelines, policies, local laws, procedures, decisions and services. New Policies will be required to include a statement explaining whether they are compatible or incompatible with the Human Rights Act and the fundamental rights identified.

### 4.1.2 Managers and Directors

All Managers and Directors:

- must consider relevant human rights when developing policy. This should include undertaking a
  human rights impact assessment for new policies and considering whether any proposed
  limitations on rights are reasonable;
- · identify areas of concern for their Branch; and
- · implement actions to comply with the Act for those areas identified of concern.

### 4.1.3 Manager, Governance and Administration

The Manager, Governance and Administration shall:

- act as the Human Rights Contact Officer;
- respond to all enquiries/complaints about Human Rights:
- · provide advice and options to staff on human rights issues as required; and
- provide assurance to the Chief Executive Officer that the Council acts in accordance with the Act.

### 4.1.4 Chief Executive Officer

The Chief Executive Officer is to ensure, through the Manager, Governance and Administration that the Whitsunday Regional Council is complying with the Act.

### 4.2 Councillors

All Councillors consider the relevant elements of the Act when making decisions and providing information or advice to the community.

### **Definitions**

**CEO** refers to the Chief Executive Officer of the Whitsunday Regional Council appointed in accordance with the *Local Government Act 2009*.

Council refers to the Whitsunday Regional Council

Employee refers to any employee, contractor, volunteer etc. of the Council

### **Attachment 1 - Internal Grievance Procedures**

The objectives of the procedure are to promote the prompt resolution of grievances by consultation, cooperation and discussion to reduce the level of disputation and to promote efficiency, effectiveness and equity in the workplace.

The following procedure applies to all industrial matters within the meaning of the Act:

Stage 1: In the first instance the employee shall inform their immediate supervisor of the existence of the grievance and they shall attempt to resolve the grievance. It is recognised that an employee may exercise the right to consult their union representative during the course of Stage 1.

Stage 2: If the grievance remains unresolved, the employee shall refer the grievance to the manager. The manager will consult with the relevant parties. The employee may exercise the right to consult or be represented by their representative during the course of Stage 2.

Stage 3: If the grievance is still unresolved, the manager will advise the Council and the aggrieved employee may submit the matter in writing to the Council if such employee wishes to pursue the matter further. If desired by either party the matter may also be notified to the relevant union.

### **Attachment 2 - External Grievance Procedures**

The objectives of the procedure are to promote the prompt resolution of grievances by consultation, cooperation and discussion to reduce the level of disputation and to promote harmony in the community.

The following procedure applies to all other disputes:

Stage 1: In the first instance the complainant shall contact the relevant Manager and they

shall attempt to resolve the grievance. It is recognised that the complainant may

seek support from another person during the course of Stage 1.

Stage 2: If the grievance remains unresolved, the matter shall be referred to the Human

Rights Contact Officer, who will consult with the relevant parties and attempt to arbitrate a resolution. A support person may assist the complainant in consultation

with Council during the course of Stage 2.

Stage 3: If the grievance is still unresolved, the complainant has the right to escalate the

complaint to the Queensland Human Rights Commission.

### Attachment 3 - Human Rights Act protections

### Your right to recognition and equality before the law (section 15)

Everyone is entitled to equal and effective protection against discrimination, and to enjoy their human rights without discrimination.

### Your right to life (section 16)

Every person has the right to life and to not have their life taken. The right to life includes a duty on government to take appropriate steps to protect the right to life.

### Your right to protection from torture and cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment (section 17)

People must not be tortured. People must also not be treated or punished in a cruel, inhuman or degrading way. This includes protection from treatment that humiliates a person. This right also protects people from having medical treatment or experiments performed on them without their full and informed consent.

### Your right to freedom from forced work (section 18)

A person must not be forced to work or be made a slave. A person is a slave when someone else has complete control over them.

#### Your right to freedom of movement (section 19)

People can stay in or leave Queensland whenever they want to as long as they are here lawfully. They can move around freely within Queensland and choose where they live.

### Your right to freedom of thought, conscience, religion and belief (section 20)

People have the freedom to think and believe what they want – for example, religion. They can do this in public or private, as part of a group or alone.

### Your right to freedom of expression (section 21)

People are free to say what they think and want to say. They have the right to find, receive and share information and ideas. In general, this right might be limited to respect the rights and reputation of other people, or for the protection of public safety and order.

### Your right to peaceful assembly and freedom of association (section 22)

People have the right to join groups and to meet peacefully.

### Your right to taking part in public life (section 23)

Every person has the right to take part in public life, such as the right to vote or run for public office.

#### Property rights (section 24)

People are protected from having their property taken, unless the law says it can be taken.

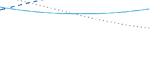
### Your right to privacy and reputation (section 25)

Everyone has the right to keep their lives private. Your family, home or personal information cannot be interfered with, unless the law allows it.

### Your right to protection of families and children (section 26)

Families are entitled to protection. Children have the same rights as adults with added protection according to their best interests.

### Cultural rights - generally (section 27)

People can have different family, religious or cultural backgrounds. They can enjoy their culture, declare and practice their religion and use their languages.

### Cultural rights - Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islander peoples (section 28)

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in Queensland hold distinct cultural rights. They include the rights to practice their beliefs and teachings, use their languages, protect and develop their kinship ties, and maintain their relationship with the lands, seas and waterways.

### Your right to liberty and security of person (section 29)

Everyone has the right to freedom and safety. The right to liberty includes the right to not be arrested or detained except in accordance with the law. The right to security means that reasonable steps must be taken to ensure the physical safety of people who are in danger of physical harm.

### Your right to humane treatment when deprived of liberty (section 30)

People have the right to be treated with humanity if they are accused of breaking the law and are detained.

#### Your right to a fair hearing (section 31)

A person has a right to a fair hearing. This means the right to have criminal charges or civil proceedings decided by a competent, independent and impartial court or tribunal after a fair and public hearing.

### Rights in criminal proceedings (section 32)

There are a number of minimum guarantees that you have when you have been charged with a criminal offence. These include the right to be told the charges against you in a language you understand; the right to an interpreter if you need one; the right to have time and the facilities (such as a computer) to prepare your own case or to talk to your lawyer; the right to have your trial heard without too much delay; the right to be told about Legal Aid if you don't already have a lawyer; you are presumed innocent until proven guilty; and you don't have to testify against yourself or confess your guilt unless you choose to do so.

### Rights of children in the criminal process (section 33)

A child charged with committing a crime or who has been detained without charge must not be held with adults. They must also be brought to trial as quickly as possible and treated in a way that is appropriate for their age. Children are entitled to opportunities for education and rehabilitation in detention.

### Right not to be tried or punished more than once (section 34)

A person will only go to court and be tried once for a crime. This means if the person is found guilty they will only be punished once. If they are found to be innocent they will not be punished.

### Retrospective criminal laws (section 35)

A person has the right not to be prosecuted or punished for things that were not criminal offences at the time they were committed.

### Right to education (section 36)

Every child has the right to primary and secondary schooling. Every person has the right to have access to further vocational education, based on their ability.

### Right to health services (section 37)

Everyone has the right to access health services without discrimination. This right also states that nobody can be refused emergency medical treatment.

### SUMMARY

The Local Government Remuneration Commission (the Commission) is an independent body and established under the *Local Government Act 2009* to decide the maximum amount of remuneration payable to the councillors in each of the local government categories.

### **PURPOSE**

To consider the Local Government Remuneration Commission Report for 2020.

### **BACKGROUND**

The Commission has decided not to increase the maximum remuneration levels for mayors, deputy mayors and councillors from 1 July 2021. The levels will remain as set at the amounts fixed for 1 July 2020. In making its determination, the Commission considered the following:

- Decrease in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the financial year ended 30 June 2020 (percentage change from previous financial year)1
  - Weighted average of the eight capital cities: -0.3 per cent
  - o Brisbane: -1.0 per cent
- Increases in the Wage Price Index (WPI) for the financial year ended 30 June 20202 o Australia (All Industries): +2.1 per cent
  - Australia (Public Sector): +2.3 per cent
  - Queensland (All Industries and Public Sector): +1.9 per cent
- Queensland Weekly Payroll Jobs and Wages for the period of:
  - o 14 March to 27 June 2020: Jobs -5.2 per cent; Wages -1.2 per cent
  - o 14 March to 19 September 2020: Jobs -2.5 per cent; Wages -1.7 per cent
  - o 14 March to 31 October 2020: Jobs -2.0 per cent; Wages -3.3 per cent

### STATUTORY/COMPLIANCE MATTERS

247 Remuneration payable to councillors (Local Government Regulations 2012)

(1) A local government must pay remuneration to each councillor of the local government.



- (2) The maximum amount of remuneration payable to a councillor under the remuneration schedule must be paid to the councillor, unless the local government, by resolution, decides the maximum amount is not payable to the councillor.
- (3) In a resolution made under subsection (2), the local government must also decide the amount of remuneration payable to the councillor.
- (4) The amount of remuneration decided under subsection (3) for each councillor must not be more than the maximum amount of remuneration payable to the councillor under the remuneration schedule.
- (5) The amount of remuneration for each councillor, other than a mayor or deputy mayor, must be the same.
- (6) The local government must make a resolution under subsection (2), for the remuneration payable from 1 July of a particular year, before 1 July of that year.

### **ANALYSIS**

Council does not need to make a decision, unless it wishes to change (ie. reduce) the remuneration for Councillors. Remuneration is currently set at:

Mayor: \$133,196 pa Deputy Mayor: \$83,247 pa Councillor: \$70,759 pa

Our determinations on these matters, together with the Remuneration Schedule to apply from 1 July 2021 are included in the enclosed Report, which we commend to you.

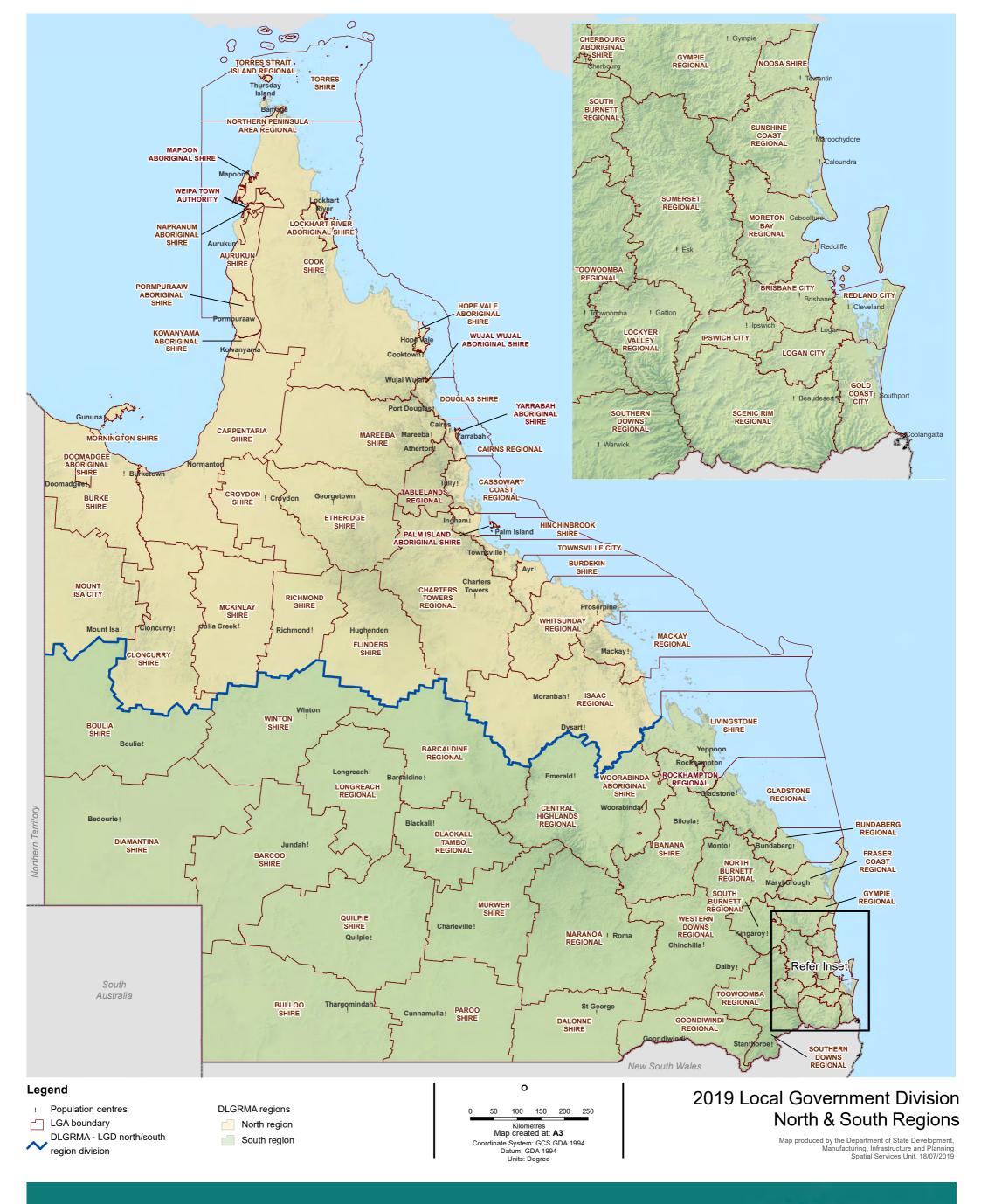

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# 2020 Report key determinations

In its 2019 report, the Commission determined not to make any category changes. The Commission did, however, state its intention to undertake an analysis of the categories in the period 2020-2021, after the 2020 quadrennial Queensland Local Government Elections. The Commission's anticipated analysis has been delayed in 2020 due to the impact of the COVID-19 global pandemic. COVID-19 has inevitably resulted in an increased focus on other priorities for Queensland local government. The Commission commends all local government members for their on-going contribution to their communities and the State of Queensland.

The Commission still intends to undertake a category review during 2021 and will engage with and invite submissions from councils and stakeholders commencing in early 2021.

The Commission has decided not to increase the maximum remuneration levels for mayors, deputy mayors and councillors from 1 July 2021. The levels will remain as set at the amounts fixed for 1 July 2020.

In making its determination, the Commission considered the following:

- Decrease in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the financial year ended 30 June 2020 (percentage change from previous financial year)<sup>1</sup>
  - Weighted average of the eight capital cities: -0.3 per cent
  - o Brisbane: -1.0 per cent
- Increases in the Wage Price Index (WPI) for the financial year ended 30 June 2020<sup>2</sup>
  - o Australia (All Industries): +2.1 per cent
  - o Australia (Public Sector): +2.3 per cent
  - o Queensland (All Industries and Public Sector): +1.9 per cent
- Queensland Weekly Payroll Jobs and Wages<sup>3</sup> for the period of:
  - o 14 March to 27 June 2020: Jobs -5.2 per cent; Wages -1.2 per cent
  - o 14 March to 19 September 2020: Jobs -2.5 per cent; Wages -1.7 per cent
  - o 14 March to 31 October 2020: Jobs -2.0 per cent; Wages -3.3 per cent
- As in 2019, in 2020 the Commission considered Brisbane City Council's Independent Councillor Remuneration Tribunal (ICRT) remuneration determination a potentially relevant factor, however, the ICRT reviews and resets Brisbane City Councillor remuneration arrangements every five years. The last increase was in 2017, at which time the ICRT accorded a two per cent increase to salaries effective 1 July 2018. In its 20 November 2019 Report, the ICRT determined not to make any changes outside of its four yearly remuneration review cycle.

• In its 13 August 2020 determination of the Base and Additional Salary Rates and Allowance System, the Queensland Independent Remuneration Tribunal (QIRT) determined by majority (with dissent from the Chair) to provide a zero per cent increase to the base and additional salary levels of members for the years commencing 1 September 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022. The Commission notes the QIRT Chair's dissent that a decision to impose a 'salary freeze' on members for a period of five years is unreasonable and that the Chair would have determined to increase the base and additional salaries by 2.5 per cent from 1 September 2021 and 1 September 2022.

The Commission considers that its own obligation to conduct an annual review of the maximum levels of remuneration affords the Commission the flexibility to consider and respond to the short and long term impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic which is not necessarily available to the QIRT and ICRT.

- Decision of the Salaries and Allowances Tribunal of Western Australia determination dated 8
   April 2020: no increase.
- Decision of the New South Wales Local Government Remuneration Tribunal Determination and Annual Report dated 10 June 2020: no increase.
- Decision of the Victorian Minister for Local Government: two per cent increase effective on 1
  December 2019. It is noted that the 1 December 2020 Victorian decision was unavailable at the
  date of this determination.
- Tasmania is the only jurisdiction that has increased the remuneration for local government councillors. The increase, effective 1 November 2020, is an automatic indexation of local government allowances provided for under the *Tasmanian Local Government Act 1993* by multiplying the allowances for the previous year by the inflationary factor (determined by calculating the current year's June quarter Wage Price Index divided by the previous years' June Wage Price Index).
- The application of principles of consistency and austerity, and general consideration of recent conservative wage review practices in both the public and private sectors.
- The Commission's inability to project the short and long-term impacts of COVID-19 with certainty.

The Commission also had regard to anecdotal reports and submissions received about:

- The impact of economic hardship experienced by local communities during and following the COVID-19 pandemic and natural disasters of 2019-2020.
- The potential disproportional impact of COVID-19 pandemic restrictions on rural and remote communities.
- The economic cost to communities of interruption to businesses.
- The significant economic volatility and contraction during 2020.
- The need to ensure sustainability for local governments and their communities.

# 1. The Commission

# Formation and composition

The Local Government Remuneration Commission (Commission) is an independent entity established under the *Local Government Act 2009* (the Act). On 1 October 2019, His Excellency the Governor, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, approved three new appointees to the Commission for a term of four years.

This is the second report of the new Commission, and the fourteenth report including the reports of the former Local Government Remuneration and Discipline Tribunal and the Local Government Remuneration Tribunal.

The current Chair and Commissioners of the Commission are:

#### Mr. Robert (Bob) Abbot OAM

#### Chair

Mr. Abbot has extensive experience in the local government sector with 32 years as an elected councillor and mayor. Mr. Abbot has experience working at state and national local government organizations and has held board and panel positions, including Deputy Chair of the South East Queensland Council of Mayors, Director of the Local Government Association of Queensland (LGAQ), and Director of the Australian Local Government Association. Mr. Abbot has been a mentor for newly elected mayors on behalf of the LGAQ, with a particular focus on mentoring Queensland Indigenous mayors.

In the Australia Day 2020 Honours List, Mr. Abbot was the recipient of an Order of Australia (OAM) for his service to local government and to the communities of Noosa and the Sunshine Coast.

#### Ms. Andrea Ranson

#### Commissioner

Ms. Ranson is a lawyer with extensive experience in public and private sector business and governance. Ms. Ranson brings substantial legal experience in commercial, industrial, and equal opportunity law, ethics, and justice. Ms. Ranson is a Nationally Accredited Mediator currently working with the Queensland Civil and Administrative Tribunal (QCAT), and a member of the Department of Justice Dispute Resolution Panel and Aboriginal Working Group. Ms. Ranson is appointed as a Non-Executive Director to the Board of North Queensland Bulk Ports Corporation, a government owned corporation. Ms. Ranson is Chair of the Corporate Governance & Planning Committee and a Member of the Audit & Financial Risk Management Committee of that Board. Ms. Ranson holds a Master of Laws (LLM), Bachelor of Laws (Hons) and Bachelor of Arts from Monash University. She is a Graduate of the Australian Institute of Directors (GAICD) and a Fellow of the Governance Institute of Australia (FGIA).

#### Mr. Reimen Hii

#### Commissioner

Mr. Hii is a barrister and Nationally Accredited Mediator. He holds the degrees of Bachelor of Laws and Bachelor of Arts. He is a practicing lawyer with extensive knowledge in public administration and community affairs, and a particular interest in civil and commercial law. Mr. Hii is experienced in professional discipline matters, including investigations, public administration, corporate and public governance, public sector ethics and finance. Mr. Hii has a culturally and linguistically diverse background and experience working with diverse communities. Mr. Hii has previously been recognized as Australian Young Lawyer of the Year by the Law Council of Australia, in recognition of his significant contribution to access to justice and diversity advocacy. Mr Hii provides a deep understanding of diversity and brings well respected analytic skill, together with legal and business acumen to the role.

# Remuneration responsibilities

Chapter 6, Part 3 of the Act, proclaimed into force on 3 December 2018, established the Local Government Remuneration Commission to assume the remuneration functions of the former Local Government Remuneration and Discipline Tribunal which ceased to exist on 3 December 2018.

Section 177 of the Act provides the functions of the Commission are:

- to establish the categories of local governments, and
- to decide the category to which each local government belongs, and
- to decide the maximum amount of remuneration payable to the councillors in each of the categories, and
- to consider and make recommendations to the Minister about the following matters relating to councillor advisors—
  - (i) whether or not to prescribe a local government under section 197D(1)(a);
  - (ii) the number of councillor advisors each councillor of a local government may appoint;
  - (iii) the number of councillor advisors a councillor of the council under the *City of Brisbane Act 2010* may appoint; and
- another function related to the remuneration of councillors if directed, in writing, by the Minister.

Chapter 8, Part 1, Division 1 of the *Local Government Regulation 2012* (Regulation) sets out the processes of the Commission in deciding the remuneration that is payable to councillors.

The Regulation requires the Commission to review the categories of local governments once every four years, in the year prior to each quadrennial election, to determine whether the categories and the assignment of local governments to those categories require amendment.

After determining the categories of local governments, the Regulation also requires the Commission to decide annually, before 1 December each year, the maximum amount of remuneration to be paid to mayors, deputy mayors and councillors in each category from 1 July of the following year.

In addition, section 248 of the Regulation allows a local government to make a submission to the Commission to vary the remuneration for a councillor, or councillors, to a level higher than that stated in the remuneration schedule where the local government considers exceptional circumstances apply. The Commission may, but is not required to, consider any such submission. If the Commission is satisfied that exceptional circumstances exist, the Commission may approve payment of a higher amount of remuneration.

On 12 October 2020, the *Electoral and Other Legislation (Accountability, Integrity and Other Matters) Amendment Act 2020* and section 197A of the *Local Government Act 2009* came into force. These changes formed part of the Queensland Government rolling reform agenda in the local government sector to further strengthen transparency, accountability and integrity measures that apply to the system of local government in Queensland.

Section 197A of the Act established requirements for councils that wish to employ councillor advisors and councilor administrative support staff to assist councillors complete their duties. The role of councillor advisors is currently restricted to Brisbane City Council and to those councils within category 4 to 8 as prescribed by this Commission.

The requirements in relation to the appointment of councillor advisors include the following:

- must vote to pass a resolution to create councillor advisor positions (except Brisbane City Council)
- appoint advisor, at the discretion of councillors and only until the councillor's term ends, unless re-appointed by a new councillor
- must report the costs of councillor advisors to the community, for example through the council's annual report.

Requirements for councillor advisors include the following:

- they must submit registers of interests and keep them up-to-date
- they must follow a new Code of conduct for councillor advisors in Queensland
- they must comply with the local government principles and can be found guilty of integrity offences.

The Commission is yet to receive any submissions or enquiries in relation to councillor advisors as at the date of its determination.

# 2. Remuneration determination

### Remuneration determination for councillors

As required by section 246 of the Regulation the Commission has prepared a remuneration schedule for the 2021-2022 financial year, applicable from 1 July 2021 (the Schedule), which appears below.

Arrangements have been made to publish the Schedule in the Queensland Government Gazette and for this Report to be printed and presented to the Minister for Local Government.

# **Methodology**

The Commission had regard to the matters in section 244 and 247 (2), (5) of the Regulation in determining the Schedule. The Commission also noted and had regard to the matters listed on pages 6 to 8 of this Report to determine the appropriate maximum remuneration in each category of local government.

The Commission notes it did not receive any specific submissions from councils in relation to setting the remuneration schedule for the 2020-2021 financial year and has continued to adopt a conservative approach to setting remuneration levels.

#### Matters not included in the remuneration schedule

Section 244(3) of the Regulation states that the remuneration cannot include any amount for expenses to be paid or facilities to be provided to councillors under a council's expenses reimbursement policy.

During the 2020 consultation period, Townsville City Council sought clarification and consistency in relation to the application of Motor Vehicle Policies by local government across Queensland.

The Commission notes section 244(3) of the Regulation states that remuneration decided by the Commission cannot include "any amount for expenses to be paid or facilities to be provided to councillors under a council's expenses reimbursement policy". The Commission is of the view that the application of Motor Vehicle policy falls within section 244(3) exclusions and that the Commission cannot prescribe whether or how a vehicle policy is applied by individual council's as the Commission does not prescribe expenses and reimbursement policies.

The Commission notes that practices may differ within or between individual councils, however, as the matter falls outside of council's statutory functions the Commission is unable to decide to direct council.

The Commission has informed Townsville City Council of this determination.

# Pro rata payment

Should an elected representative hold a councillor position for only part of a financial year, she or he is only entitled to remuneration to reflect the portion of the year served.

#### Notes to the remuneration schedule

In its 2014 report the then Tribunal explained the rationale behind the adoption of a system of remuneration which comprised a base payment (of two thirds of the annual remuneration) and a monthly payment based upon attendance at, and participation in, the 12 mandated council meetings.

- Note 1 The monetary amounts shown are the per annum figures to apply from 1 July 2021. If an elected representative only serves for part of a full year (that is, 1 July to 30 June) they are only entitled to a pro rata payment to reflect the portion of the year served.
- Note 2 For councillors in category 1 councils, a base payment of \$36,073.28 is payable for the 12 months commencing on 1 July 2021. A meeting fee of \$1,503.06 per calendar month (or fortnightly equivalent) is payable for attendance at, and participation in, scheduled meetings of council subject to certification by the mayor and/or chief executive officer of the council. Mayors and deputy mayors in category 1 councils are to receive the full annual remuneration level shown.

# 3. Matters raised with the Commission during the remuneration review program

A summary table of submissions made to the Commission during the review period and the Commission's determination is provided below.

# **Meetings and deputations**

Local governments were provided with the opportunity to engage with the Commission at the 124<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference of the LGAQ at the Gold Coast Convention and Exhibition Centre held from 19 to 21 October 2020.

Townsville City Council and South Burnett Regional Council provided the Commission with oral deputations during the LGAQ Conference.

Considering the restrictions imposed by COVID-19 the Commission determined and advised councils that the date for written submissions would be extended from 26 October 2020 to 30 October 2020. Five submissions were received from the Central Highlands Regional Council, Torres Strait Island Regional Council, Isaac Regional Council, North Burnett Regional Council and Pormpuraaw Aboriginal Shire Council by 30 October 2020.

After the extended due date, the Commission also receive a written submission from Somerset Regional Council on 2 November 2020, and from Barcaldine Regional Council and Toowoomba Regional Council on 5 November 2020.

In making its determination, the Commission had regard to all submissions it received, together with the matters on pages 6 to 8 of this report.

Key points raised with the Commission during the 2020 review period were not dissimilar to 2019 and included increasing demands on councils in relation to sustainability, industry and innovation, potential recognition of differential council and councillor workloads. Councils also raised the impact and future uncertainty of the COVID-19 pandemic with particular emphasis on concerns for the wellbeing of their community constituents, future economic growth, development, and sustainability, especially in regional areas.

No change requested on behalf of council. 4 Date received Written Submission on 5 November 2020 Received from Barcaldine Regional Council, Acting Chief **Executive Officer Brett Walsh** Council advised the Commission that it had Summary of submission passed a Resolution on or about 28 October 2020 in the following terms: "Council receives the report and provides feedback to the Commission that it is the position of Barcaldine Regional Council that Mayor and Councillor remuneration for the 2021-2022 financial year remain at the same level as the 2020-2021 financial year." **Determination** The Commission has noted council's Resolution passed for no change in mayor and councillor remuneration for the 2021-2022 financial year. 5 Date received Written Submission on 30 October 2020 Received from Central Highlands Regional Council, Chief Executive Officer Scott Mason on behalf of council **Summary of submission** Council is currently identified by the LGRC as a category 3 council. Council repeats its submission that it does not consider category 4 as appropriate, however, it should be differentiated from other category 3 councils. Council advocates for a new category between category 3 and 4 to separate councils that fall outside criteria and can be justified recognising the extraordinary diversity of industry. The following factors were relied upon in council's submission: Central Highlands contributes a significant amount to Queensland's Gross Domestic Product by way of its resource and agricultural, sectors. There are 11 operating coal mines in the region generating \$813 million of local spend and significant royalties for the state. The gross value of agricultural commodities produced within the Central Highlands is greater than \$800 million per annum.

- Coal and agricultural sectors have significant impact on elected members in relation of the need to understand the operational complexities of each sector but the elected members also deal with tourism, retail, support services to various industries, education and facilitating a lifestyle of choice for residents of the region.
- Significant stakeholder engagement is required by mayor and councillors outside of their ordinary standard central duties, especially in the context of drought.
- Mining resources are quantifiably more intensive than other regions (for example, natural gas).
- Submitted that Central Highlands is unique due to the presence of two significant industries in its region.

Council identified that similar challenges facing both Central Highlands and Isaac Regional Council supported the creation of two new categories.

Key issues raised in support of council's submission included increased (and significant) demand particularly around the resource and agricultural sectors, infrastructure growth, innovation, and regional sustainability. Resident and non-resident population demands were also cited as creating additional workload for councillors. Council has repeated its questioning of whether councillors could properly be considered as 'part-time' given increasing community and industry expectations upon council regarding regional sustainability.

Summary of submission

Council relied on its previous submissions dated 24 October 2018 and 21 October 2019, together with representations made to the Commission at the LGAQ Conference on 15 October 2019 by Deputy Mayor Kelly Vea and Senior Advisor Mary-Anne Uren.

Council has previously requested that mayors of like councils in category 3 be remunerated at a higher level than their counterparts, to recognize the mayor's role demands full-time hours where the local government area has a geographical spread of more than 50,000km², a resident and non-resident population total more than 30,999 and the local government area has a significant diversity of Industry.

The practical request that council repeats in its 2020 submission to the Commission is that the existing category 3 councils become category 3A councils and that a new category 3B be introduced which includes Isaac Regional Council and Central Highlands Regional Council and sets remuneration for the mayor of each of these two councils in accordance with the remuneration determined for category 4 mayors. Council requests that the remuneration of the deputy mayor and councillors be consistent with the remuneration of category 3A councils.

Council states that resource sector requirements, community expectations to ensure regional benefit and the increased regulatory oversight of mining practices, together with the impact of an extensive agricultural sector creates requirements for the mayor to participate in stakeholder engagement activities outside of their ordinary standard central duties, especially in the context of drought.

Council's submission states further that whilst it is acknowledged that category 4 mayors are not full-time – Isaac Regional Council considers that a minimum increase of the mayor's remuneration to the level requested is warranted.

Additionally, council submitted that data utilised to inform the categories for remuneration where based on Census information, is subject to a significant lag bias. The council referenced the Bowen Basin population report, produced by the Queensland Governments Statistician's Office, and submitted that this report would provide a more relevant, up-to-date, reference for populations being managed by Isaac Regional Council.

Council submitted that the additional level of engagement required by the mayor stemming from the non-resident population is considerable and that continuous engagement is required through advocacy to state and

federal governments to fund infrastructure and services, advocacy and engagement with resource and renewables proponents in the region to manage and mitigate impacts and seek opportunities from economic developments in the region.

Strategic planning for a sustainable future with diversity of industries in the Isaac region. Submission stated to relate to increased remuneration for mayor only.

The Commission will consider the matters raised and invite further submissions and/or engagement with councils in 2021 when the Commission intends to undertake an analysis of the current methodology, remuneration categories and application.

# North Burnett Regional Council, Mayor Rachel Chambers

#### **Summary of submission**

Council seeks an understanding and clarity regarding LGRC remuneration methodology. Submits that category 1 is not reflective of the effort and skill of council. Identified issues council faces in undertaking their role and that the current remuneration does not reflect the actual role and duties undertaken daily which include - 20,000km<sup>2</sup> area with six distinct townships, current salary makes it difficult to attract younger candidates needed to be involved in planning for the future, roles are full-time (long hours, after hours, public holidays and on call) and all councils are under the same legislative conditions and subject to the same obligations to achieve financial sustainability and positive socio-economic outcomes. Questioned lack of qualifications or skills needed as part of the methodology. Challenged whether 'conditions are different' equates to 'workload is different'. Economic development is a factor for all councils.

#### Determination

Pursuant to section 242 of the Regulation, in establishing categories of local governments, the Commission **must have regard to the following criteria**: -

- (a) The size, and geographical and environmental terrain, of local government areas.
- (b) The population of local government areas, including the areas' demographics, the spread of population serviced by the local governments and the extent of the

services the local governments provide; and

(c) The Commission may have regard to other matters the Commission considers relevant to the effectiveness, efficiency, and sustainability of local governments.

The Commission intends to analyse the application of the regulated criteria and its applicability to best service the needs of local government representatives and their constituents moving forward. The Commission will be inviting further engagement with local government in 2021 with formulating an understanding of the challenges and demands faced by mayors, deputy mayors and councillors with increasing demands for councillor participation in growth, development, innovation, infrastructure and sustainability.

The Commission understands that additional clarity regarding methodology has been requested and in 2021 the Commission intends to formulate a general guide to assist council/s better engage and communicate with the Commission.

<u>Somerset Regional Council</u>, Chief Executive Officer Andrew Johnson for Mayor Graeme Lehmann

**Summary of submission** 

Council submitted that council categories and selection criteria should be reviewed to ensure that the level of workload is reflected by the constitutes serviced. Council requests that remuneration is reinstated comparable to at least that at the time of amalgamation.

Council submitted that the service level and expectation of communities and workloads are increasing. Council contends that alternative formulas should be considered as part of determining categories to ensure adequate compensation is given to elected members. Changes in legislation (Belcarra Reform, etc.) have added increased burden to elected members, once again, raising the risk and workload of elected members.

Council argued that Remuneration in the Somerset Region had reduced since

amalgamation, while Somerset continues to grow.

The Commission will consider the matters raised and invite further submissions and/or engagement with councils in 2021 when the Commission intends to undertake an analysis of the current methodology, remuneration categories and application.

#### **Summary of submission**

Council repeated its previous submission to the LGRC that the current category 5 status should be elevated to category 6.

Council notes that it shares category 5 with Cairns, Mackay, and Redland, and submits that it is more appropriately benchmarked, on a variety of measures, with those councils in category 6, specifically Ipswich and Townsville. Factors submitted by council included:

- size of Toowoomba Regional Council area being 12 times larger in area than lpswich and 3.4 larger in area than Townsville
- geographical and environmental terrain of Toowoomba Region
- population of Toowoomba Region including demographics; spread of population across 12,973km²
- extent of services and diversity of communities
- extent of development in the region (one of the most diverse and robust economies in Australia)
- councillor workload given one city and 28 independent towns and villages are incorporated in the Toowoomba Region
- managing challenges with being in a highly productive, growth region, with large infrastructure projects requiring significant investment by council including Toowoomba Bulk Water Supply; Cressbrook Dam Spillway Upgrade; Reservoir and Treatment Plant upgrades; Toowoomba Region Sports Precinct; Cooby Dam Spillway Upgrade and additional projects specifically identified by council in its detailed submission

- ongoing challenges related to aligning the community following amalgamation of eight councils
- re-categorisation of Toowoomba
  Regional Council as category 6 would
  promote relativities between councils
  and ensure appropriate remuneration
  with confidence in what council has
  identified as being a "demanding
  environment".

Torres Strait Island Regional Council, Mayor Phillemon Mosby

#### **Summary of submission**

Submission that TSIRC should not be classified as a category 1 council and should be in a category of its own. Mayor, deputy mayor and councillors inadequately remunerated under category 1.

TSIRC is one of three local councils in the Torres Strait region. TSIRC manages the treaty agreement between the border of Australia and Papua New Guinea (PNG) and identifies itself as the only local council in Australia with this added responsibility. TSIRC services fifteen separate communities spread across 42,000km2 of open sea, each with its own unique characteristics and service requirements. As an Indigenous Regional Council under the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Communities (Justice, Land and Other Matters) Act 1984 (Qld), it is submitted that TSIRC has additional responsibilities in managing Deed of Grant in Trust (DOGIT) communities as Trustee, as well as providing for local government services. TSIRC submits that there are several matters which are unique to it and that these matters add to the responsibilities of councillors. These matters include: treaty obligations between Australia and PNG; high cost of living and travel in and to the region; limited employment (meaning that the mayor and councillor salary is in most cases the only source of income); over 800 social houses under banner of responsibility; no revenue from rates base and completely reliant on state and commonwealth funding; responsible for management of air and sea

ports in 15 island communities; multilingual language challenges and Native Title determinations add a layer of complexity to the functions as a local government.

#### **Determination**

The Commission notes the increasing pressure on councils in relation to sustainability and strategic development. The Commission further notes the specific matters raised by TSIRC regarding consideration of a future category change and/or creation of a new category.

The Commission will consider the matters raised and invite further submissions and/or engagement with councils in 2021 when the Commission intends to undertake an analysis of the current methodology, remuneration categories and application.

#### OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

The following report has been submitted for inclusion into Council's Ordinary Meeting to be held on 27 January 2021.

#### **SUMMARY**

The Australian Local Government Association is calling for Notices of Motions for their National General Assembly for 2021. The theme for the 2021 Assembly is 'Working Together for our Communities'. This theme acknowledges the need to come together and with other partners, including the Federal Government, to deliver for our communities.

ALGA received significant feedback on the motions process and topics from the 2018 and 2019 NGA. In response to the feedback received, ALGA has prepared a discussion paper that explores data that identifies critical areas local government needs to consider now and into the future.

Councillors are also invited to register for the 2021 National General Assembly for Local Government, held in Canberra on 20-23 June 2021. The Regional Forum will also be held onsite in Canberra on 20 June. At this time, it is unclear whether COVID-19 restrictions will still be in force in June 2021, but if this is the case the NGA may also include virtual participation and attendance.

#### **PURPOSE**

To determine Council's representation at the National General Assembly and give Council the opportunity to present a motion for consideration at the Assembly.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Motions must meet the following criteria:

- 1. be relevant to the work of local government nationally;
- 2. be consistent with the themes of the NGA;
- 3. complement or build on the policy objectives of your state and territory local government association;
- 4. be from a council which is a financial member of their state or territory local government association;
- 5. propose a clear action and outcome; and



not be advanced on behalf of external third parties that may seek to use the NGA to apply pressure to Board members or to gain national political exposure for positions that are not directly relevant to the work of, or in the national interests of, local government.

# **SUBMITTING MOTIONS**

The National General Assembly of Local Government (NGA) is an important opportunity for you and your council to influence the national policy agenda.

The 2020 NGA "Working Together for Our Communities" was unfortunately cancelled due to COVID-19 but the ALGA Board has decided to retain the theme and emphasise the importance of partnerships to building and maintaining resilience in our councils and our communities.

To assist you to identify motions that address the theme of the 2021 NGA, the Australian Local Government Association (ALGA) Secretariat has prepared this short discussion paper. You are encouraged to read all the sections of the paper but are not expected to respond to every question. Your motion/s can address one or more of the issues identified in the discussion paper.

Remember that the focus of the NGA is on partnerships, working together, and resilience so your questions could focus on how local governments can work in partnership with the Australian Government to address the challenges our communities face, or the opportunities that are arising to build back better.

#### Criteria for motions

To be eligible for inclusion in the NGA Business Papers, and subsequent debate on the floor of the NGA, motions must meet the following criteria:

- 1. be relevant to the work of local government nationally;
- 2. not be focussed on a specific location or region unless the project has national implications. You will be asked to justify why your motion has strategic national importance and should be discussed at a national conference;
- 3. be consistent with the themes of the NGA:
- 4. complement or build on the policy objectives of your state and territory local government association;
- 5. be submitted by a council which is a financial member of their state or territory local government association;
- 6. propose a clear action and outcome i.e. call on the Australian Government to do something;
- 7. be a new motion that has not already been debated at an NGA in the preceding two years; and
- 8. not be advanced on behalf of external third parties that may seek to use the NGA to apply pressure to Board members, or to gain national political exposure for positions that are not directly relevant to the work of, or in the national interests of, local government.

### OTHER THINGS TO CONSIDER

Motions should generally be in a form that seeks the NGA's support for a particular action or policy change at the Federal level which will assist local governments to meet local community needs. Motions should commence as follows: This National General Assembly calls on the Australian Government to restore funding for local government Financial Assistance Grants to a level equal to at least 1% of Commonwealth taxation revenue.

To ensure efficient and effective debate where there are numerous motions on a similar issue, the ALGA Board NGA Subcommittee will group the motions together under an overarching strategic motion. The strategic motions have either been drafted by ALGA or are based on a motion submitted by a council which best summarises the subject matter. Debate will focus on the strategic motions. Associated sub-motions will be debated by exception only.

Motions should be lodged electronically using the online form available on the NGA website at: www.alga.asn.au. All motions require, among other things, a contact officer, a clear national objective, a summary of the key arguments in support of the motion, and the endorsement of your council. Motions should be received no later than 11:59pm AEST on Friday 26 March 2021.

Please note that for every motion it is important to complete the background section on the form. The background section helps all delegates, including those with no previous knowledge of the issue, in their consideration of the motion. There is a word limit of 150 for the motion and 200 for the national objective and 300 for the key arguments.

All motions submitted will be reviewed by the ALGA Board's NGA Sub-Committee, as well as by state and territory local government associations to determine their eligibility for inclusion in the NGA Business Papers. When reviewing motions, the Sub-Committee considers the importance and relevance of the issue to local government and whether the motions meet all the criteria detailed above.

Please note that motions should not be prescriptive in directing how the matter should be pursued.

With the agreement of the relevant council, motions may be edited before inclusion in the NGA Business Papers to ensure consistency. If there are any questions about the substance or intent of a motion, the ALGA Secretariat will raise these with the nominated contact officer.

Any motion deemed to be primarily concerned with local, state or territory issues will be referred to the relevant state or territory local government association and will not be included in the NGA Business Papers.

There is an expectation that any council that submits a motion will be present at the National General Assembly to move and speak to the motion.

# INTRODUCTION

2020 has been a year like no other. A year that many individuals and organisations, including councils, would wish to forget. While the drought lessened its hold on parts of the country to be replaced by floods, more than 110 local government areas were severely impacted by the Black Summer (2019-20) bushfires - and no one was spared the effects of the battle against COVID-19. The 2020-21 storm and fire season may add to the sense that it was a year of disasters.

Friedrich Nietzsche said: "That which does not kill us, makes us stronger." So how can councils become stronger after 2020? How can we ensure that our communities are stronger and more resilient? How do we work together and with our partners to ensure that we build back better from the series of unprecedented events that have marked 2020?

### **COUNCIL RESILIENCE**

In the first quarter of 2020, state and territory Governments closed facilities where people gathered in numbers to reduce the probability that hospitals would be overwhelmed by a rise in COVID-19 cases. This included a substantial number of council owned and operated revenue generating facilities which had flow-on effects for other revenue- generating enterprises such as paid parking. Major funding gaps rapidly emerged in many councils that typically generated significant amounts of own revenue.

Councils that cannot generate significant amounts of the own revenue are typically dependent on grant funding from other levels of government, including Financial Assistance Grants from the Australian Government. These councils tend to service rural, regional and remote communities that are often large in area but small in terms of population. The capacity of these councils to deliver all their required services and infrastructure can be severely strained at any time.

With local government funding under pressure across the nation, and other levels of government facing fiscal constraints, councils may need to do more with less in the near term and be innovative with both budgeting, service delivery, balancing competing demands and longer term financial planning. Services may need to be scaled down or delivered in innovative ways. Asset management and maintenance programs may need to be varied. Working collaboratively with neighbouring councils or forming alliances may be a way of achieving efficiencies and enhancing service delivery along with fostering innovation, cutting red tape, and working in partnership with third parties may be others.

Digital service delivery and working from home - adopted during the height of the pandemic - may become the new norm. This may increase opportunities for councils to innovate, work together and share resources, and fill long term skill gaps. New challenges may emerge including how staff are supported and how productivity, collaboration and motivation maintained. There may be significant consequences for local democracy and council's ability to engage authentically with their communities. Digital transformation and technology modernisation will be essential for some councils. Even already well-established adopters of digital technology may need to rethink their approach.

Can the Australian Government assist councils with efficiency measures that reduce the cost of services without a major change in service levels experienced by the community?

What opportunities are available to enhance the adaptive capacity of councils and its potential to 'weather the storm' through innovation and creativity? How can the Australian Government assist?

Apart from Financial Assistance Grants, how can the Australian Government assist councils to become more financially sustainable and able to better meet the needs of their communities? Are there new partnership programs or policy changes the Government

# **COMMUNITY RESILIENCE**

Community resilience is the capicity of communities to respond to, withstand, and recover from adverse situations including natural disasters, persistent drought, pandemics, fluctuations in global trade, recession, and a rise in inequality. In some circumstances in response to these pressures and stresses, local communities are not able to recover to their previous state. Instead they need to adapt to cope with long term stresses. But ideally, we want all communities to not only survive but thrive.

Local governments play a critical role in building resilient and sustainable communities and helping to buffer people and places against social, economic, and environmental disruptions and overcome adversity. One critical area is through the provision of resilient infrastructure. Councils' infrastructure should meet the community's current and future demand, be built to contemporary standards, be affordable for both the council and the user, and be reliable with appropriate asset management practices in place to ensure maximum return on investment.

In addition to physical infrastructure, social infrastructure is also vital for resilience. Social infrastructure is broader than just buildings, it includes the individuals and groups, places, and institutions, including councils, that foster community cohesion and social support. Communities and individuals with good social networks and connections demonstrate greater resilience.

The loneliness epidemic is challenging social resilience. Research produced before the coronavirus pandemic revealed that one in four adult Australians are experiencing loneliness with over half the nation reporting they feel lonely for at least one day each week. In addition to its impacts on community resilience, feeling lonely can pose a bigger risk for premature death than smoking or obesity and can be associated with depression, poorer cardiovascular health and, in old age, a faster rate of cognitive decline and dementia.

Communities that are more vulnerable to shocks and disasters are often reliant on only one industry, have minimal redundancy or no backups for essential services and infrastructure such as only one source of water, one powerline or one access road. They also often only have few voluntary or charitable organisations working in the community. Often community leadership is weak or fails to inspire, engage, and unleash the power of other leaders and critical social networks.

Community resilience cannot be built and then left to its own devices. It needs to be strengthened continuously, not just in times of crisis. It involves people getting together to create sustainable links within their community and the community and its leaders having the ability to learn from experience and improve over time.

How can councils work in partnership with the other tiers of government to adopt a community development approach that builds resilience?

What are the best models available to councils to ensure that our communities thrive and focus on prevention and preparation rather than relief and recovery? How can the Australian Government partner with councils to ensure thriving communities?

What actions can councils take, in partnership with others including the Australian Government to promote community resilience and protect against external shocks such as industry closures or natural disasters? Are tools available to assist councils build community resilience or do we need new or different tools?

### COLLABORATION AND PARTNERSHIPS

Creating a resilient community and ensuring a resilient and sustainable council requires partners. Councils can work with partners in different ways to find local solutions to local problems. They can partner with a wide range of organisations including other councils, other levels of government, the voluntary and community sector or business and research sector organisations. The aims of these partnerships are typically to improve services and deliver changes to benefit the local area.

Collaboration and partnerships with other councils and public or private organisations can also bring benefit from economies of scale in providing services or purchasing in bulk for example. Procurement partnerships have been a particularly successful example of this. Working in partnership can make a considerable contribution to efficiency improvements, such as through cost savings in back-office functions or sharing of plant and equipment.

Other benefits associated with partnerships and collaboration include opening the way for local communities to share ideas and connect with others. Partnerships enhance the ability of a council to access innovation, enhance skills development, work across council boundaries to address regional issues, and maximise competitive advantage in the delivery of major infrastructure projects.

Strategic collaboration is not just about savings and sharing resources. It is also about maximising capacity in addressing community expectations, or working with members of the community to overcome challenges and seize opportunities. For example, building and maintaining productive partnerships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and communities is critical for councils committed to Closing the Gap and involving Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities in decision-making and service development and delivery.

Collaboration and partnerships that work well are underpinned by good governance, an agreed purpose, and mutual benefit.

There is a long history of local government partnering with the Australian Government to deliver projects and programs that benefit local communities, achieve fairness and equity across the nation, and support local delivery of services and infrastructure. In the absence of constitutional change, how do we further build and strengthen this partnership with the Australian Government?

How do we encourage and incentivise councils to embrace partnerships and collaborative arrangements more enthusiastically including those which seek to ensure the development of economic development supporting infrastructure?

What are the obstacles to working in partnership with other councils or organisations? Can the Australian Government help overcome these?

How do councils, together with their communities, work in partnership to build resilience and entrench it into everyday life?

That Council accept the donation of the newly constructed Clubhouse as a Council Asset for insurance purposes from the Bowen Men's Shed located at 66 Dalrymple Street, Bowen in accordance with Council's Contributed Asset Policy.

The following report has been submitted for inclusion into Council's Ordinary Meeting to be held on 27 January 2021.

# **SUMMARY**

To take ownership of the newly constructed Clubhouse of the Bowen Men's Shed located at 66 Dalrymple Street, Bowen.

# **PURPOSE**

The Clubhouse has been built on Council land therefore in the event that the lease expires, or the Club folds Council will retain the Asset. To mitigate Council's risks in relation to the depreciation of the Asset, it is recommended to take on the Asset now and include within Council's Asset register.

# **BACKGROUND**

Bowen Men's Shed currently hold a lease with Council over the land at 66 Dalrymple Street, Bowen. There is currently a building on site that has been previously used as this Clubhouse which is on Councils asset register, however due to the popularity of the group they have expanded their use of the land.

Bowen Men's Shed are in the final stages of building their new Clubhouse at 66 Dalrymple Street, Bowen that was funded through various grants including \$30,000 of Council grant funding. As the Asset is on Council land, Council will obtain ownership of the asset and include within Council's Asset Register in accordance with the Contributed Asset Policy.

The Bowen Mens' Shed Group contacted Council seeking to have the insurance of the building covered by Council under the Councils' insurance policies. This has been arranged and part of the conditioning of insurance is that Council take ownership of the asset by way of donation. This ensures that the asset can remain on the insurance schedule and is covered by Council's insurance.

#### STATUTORY/COMPLIANCE MATTERS

**Local Government Regulation 2012** 



#### **ANALYSIS**

In accordance with their lease requirements, Bowen Men's Shed will still be required to conduct basic maintenance and repairs on the Asset, however all major works and repairs will be reported to Council and actioned accordingly. The building has been added to building asset schedule for insurance purposes.

## STRATEGIC IMPACTS

Financial Implications – the Asset has been valued at \$50,000 and will be incorporated within Council's budgeted maintenance schedule.

Risk Management Implications – the lease with the Bowen Men's Shed ensures that they are to undertake basic maintenance and to keep the premises neat and tidy and free of vermin.

Corporate Implications – the incorporation of a new asset on Council's Asset Register and subsequently included on Council's Insurance Policy.

Reputational Implications – it is supporting and promoting the local community organisations within the region.

The following report has been submitted for inclusion into Council's Ordinary Meeting to be held on 27 January 2021.

#### **SUMMARY**

Council is trustee of the land at Lot 158 on HR1652, 6 Les Stagg Drive, Proserpine.

Proserpine BMX Club currently have a trustee lease with Council over part of the land at Lot 158 on HR 1652 that is due to expire on the 31 March 2021.

#### **PURPOSE**

Proserpine BMX Club have advised Council that they wish to renew their trustee lease and continue their operations from this site.

# **BACKGROUND**

Proserpine BMX Club has held a trustee lease with Council for a term of 10 years at a peppercorn rate. They have established infrastructure such as a clubhouse and tracks to allow their Club to function successfully.

Their trustee lease is due to expire on the 31 March 2021 and as this is a trustee lease, there are no available options to renew therefore a new lease agreement is required to be entered into to allow them to continue having tenure of the land.

#### STATUTORY/COMPLIANCE MATTERS

Local Government Regulation 2012 Land Act 1994

#### **ANALYSIS**

It is recommended that Council continue the arrangements and agree to enter into a new trustee lease with the Proserpine BMX Club in line with Council's other community organisation leases for a term of 10 years and at a peppercorn rate.



Section 236(b)(ii) and (c)(iii) of the Local Government Regulation 2012 allows Council to enter into a leasing agreement with a community organisation and to an existing tenant without the requirement of going to a public tender.

### STRATEGIC IMPACTS

Strategic – ensuring that Council controlled land is being managed in accordance with the permitted use and Council's obligations are being satisfied.

Financial – the trustee lease will be at a peppercorn rate, therefore will not be providing Council with revenue. Taking this cost away from the community organisations allow them to invest it back into the Club and benefit their members.

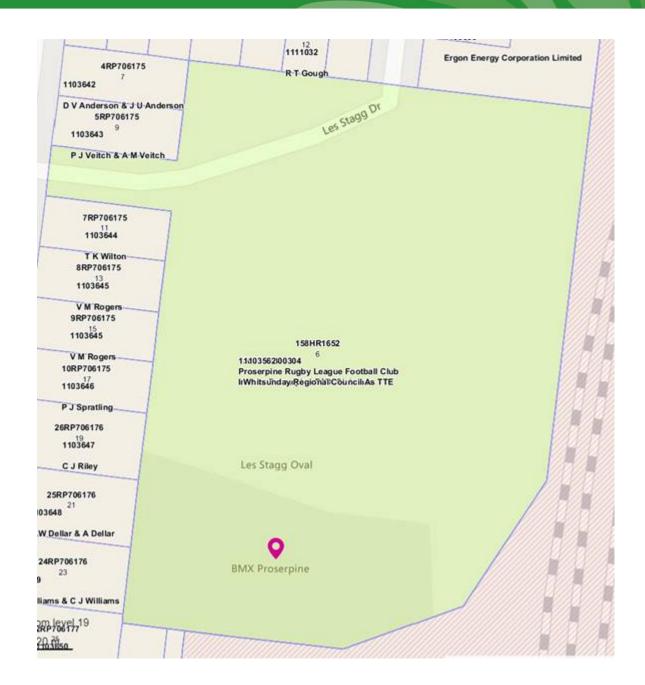

The following report has been submitted for inclusion into Council's Ordinary Meeting to be held on 27 January 2021.

# **SUMMARY**

To award contract 500.2020.0122 for the lease of part of the land at 18793 Bruce Highway, Bowen known as the Bowen Aerodrome.

# **PURPOSE**

To present to Council a recommendation following the invitation to tender for the lease of part of land at 18793 Bruce Highway, Bowen. One submission was received, and Council Officers' have reviewed the submission and have made a recommendation for Council's consideration based upon the information provided.

# **BACKGROUND**

Council is the Owner of the property known as the Bowen Aerodrome located at 18793 Bruce Highway, Bowen (Lot 237 on HR1027). The area identified as referenced on the lease plan is Lease A2 and Lease Area 2 with a total area of 6.426Ha.

A commercial lease would be entered into to obtain tenure of the part of the land at the Bowen Aerodrome to store commercial materials. Conditions will be imposed to ensure the permitted use of the land is being complied with and ensuring the safe access around the aerodrome facilities.

The lease will be in accordance with Council's commercial lease terms for a 10-year term with no options to renew. These terms have been developed reflecting Council's expectations of the Lessee and the responsibilities they will maintain and uphold. These terms may be negotiated with evidence provided within the tender submission to either omit or amend.

#### STATUTORY/COMPLIANCE MATTERS

Local Government Regulation 2012



#### **ANALYSIS**

Part of the land at 18793 Bruce Highway, Bowen was identified as a Council asset that may be disposed of by a lease through the public tender process.

Land is defined as a valuable non-current asset. Section 227 of the Local Government Regulation 2012 prescribes that the disposal of valuable non-current assets must be undertaken:

- through the invitation of public tenders; or
- offers the non-current asset for sale by auction,

and, that Council must satisfy the Sound Contracting Principles in the disposal of the asset.

Council invited tenders through:

- LG Tender Box Councils tender portal; and
- Whitsunday Times
- Mackay and Whitsunday Life

Tenders closed 2.00pm on the 3<sup>rd</sup> December 2020.

One submission was received by Mirthill Pty Ltd T/A Pat McDonnell Earthmoving by the closing time.

Mirthill are one of the longest standing Earthmoving and Civil Company within the Whitsunday's and have over 40 years' experience. They have advised that their intentions for the land is to use it as a hard stand and stockpile area. This is in accordance with the permitted use stated within the tender documents.

# STRATEGIC IMPACTS

Financial Implications – Rental costs of excluding GST \$2,000 per year with annual CPI increases will be received by Council.

Risk Management Implications – the lease of the land will be in accordance with Council's commercial lease terms.

Corporate Implications – the identification of a underutilised land that is not required by Council for operational purposes is ensuring the organisation is innovative, efficient and financially sustainable.

Reputational Implications - it is supporting and promoting the local business sector as the intention of the purchaser of this land is to create more commercial space for businesses within the Bowen region.

Legal Implications – terms within the lease will be incorporated to ensure that any risks are mitigated to Council and ensure that the Lessee is responsible for the operations occurring within their leased area.

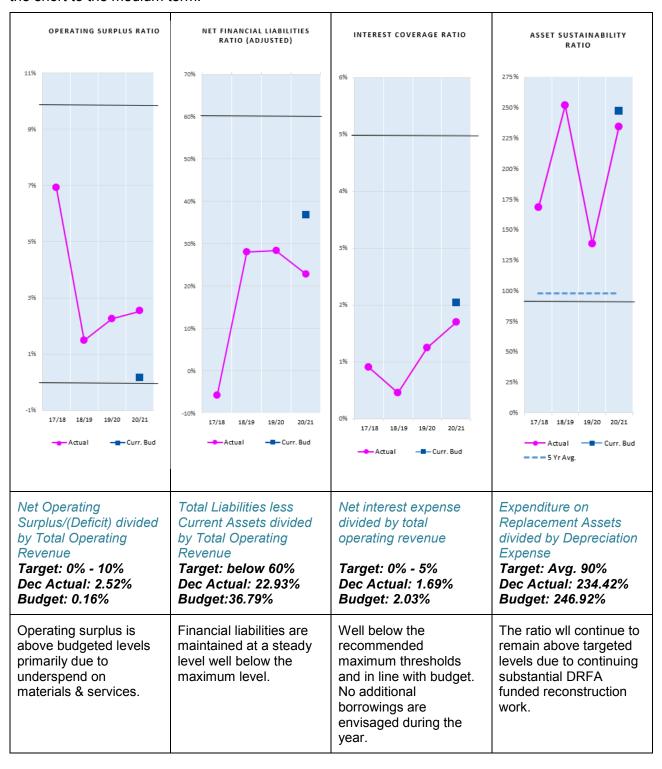

#### OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council receive the debtor report for the second quarter of the financial year 2020-21.

The following report has been submitted for inclusion into Whitsunday Regional Council's Ordinary Meeting to be held on 27 January 2021.

#### **SUMMARY**

The report provides Council with an update on the outstanding debtors for the second quarter of the financial year 2020-21.

#### **PURPOSE**

To present to for consideration by Council the debtor report for the second quarter of the financial year 2020-21.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Council issues Rates & Water notices half yearly with a due date of 40 days from the date of the respective notice. Where payment is not made within the specified time period, Council undertakes a series of actions, in keeping with its legislative powers and obligations, to recover the unpaid monies. This can range from issuance of reminder letters to legal action and sale of property.

Council also has debtors related to the range of services provided by Council on both a commercial and non-commercial basis.

There will often be timing differences between when the accounts are issued and the timing of the payments where external agencies and other government departments are involved.

Changes in the accounting standards and as a result of upcoming software system changes, there is an opportunity to review the practices associated with recognising the revenue and receipts from infringements, due the volume and nature of these transactions. This will be further discussed with Auditors prior to any change being made. At present it is likely that the provision for doubtful debts will be drawn up in the next quarter.

#### STATUTORY/COMPLIANCE MATTERS

#### **ANALYSIS**

The outstanding debt remains comparable to last financial year with the timing of collections similar, noting a reduction in the rates and charges debts of over \$700k.

#### **General Commentary**

The amounts owing to Council from ratepayers and other third parties as at the report date stood at \$13.4 M, a decrease of around \$0.8M from the end of the year (30 June) debtors figure reported in councils' audited financial statements for the financial year 2019-20. This decrease is primarily from rates and charges. Although the rate arrears have decreased at the end of the second quarter from what was outstanding as at the 30 June 2020. General (Sundry) Debtors have increased by \$0.5M which is stemming from an increase in >60 days balance shown in Table 2 from \$1.1m in the first quarter to \$1.6 in the second quarter.

Another contributing factor is due to existing economic conditions, where there have been increases in sales in the property market and some of the outstanding rates and charges have been finalised through property sale and transfer process.

The second part of Table 1 reflects multiple accounting entries required as a result of accounting standard changes that came into effect from 1 July 2019. Council is not entitled to recover these amounts immediately and reflect amounts that Council will be entitled to receive at a future point in time.

The general debtor figure in Table 2 includes \$737k of Infringements Debts and \$896k General Debts. A provision for doubtful debts amounting to \$610k has been incorporated in the financial statements for 2020.

#### **Rates**

#### Levies and Collections

Summary of amounts levied and collected year-to-date appears in Table 4. The amounts shown in Table 3 are net of advance payments (credits) received. The breakdown between gross receivables and rates credits appears in Table 4.

#### **Sundry Debtors**

Table 7 provides an ageing of sundry debtors (non-rates & charges) by type of debtor. Around 38% of commercial debtors and 88% of infringement debtors are more than 60 days overdue.

Most of the infringement debtors are related to camping and parking infringements, with a significant portion of those debtors usually being either out of state or out of country(overseas) citizens.

Collection of overdue infringement debtors is a long drawn out process through the State Penalties Enforcement Register (SPER). Council has in the past (and most likely will be in the future) decided to write off significant amounts of infringements that are long overdue due to the difficultly of tracing debtors and seeking payment for small value debts.

Council officers are currently reviewing the process and system requirements for the infringement's module as part of the Civica Authority software upgrade and will report back in the coming months on how changes can be made to streamline current processes to allow for the recognition of revenue in line with changes to practices and accounting standards.

#### **SUMMARY**

To provide an overview the Corporate Services Directorate for the month of December 2020. The Directorate's purpose is to lead innovation and organisational change in information technology, information management, asset management, project management and procurement to improve organisational outcomes. It seeks to improve Council's organisational capability to augment resilience to future business disruption and increase productivity whilst demonstrating empathy where required.

#### **PURPOSE**

To provide an overview the Corporate Services Directorate for the month of December 2020.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Corporate Services Directorate has a vision to positively contribute to a prosperous, liveable, and sustainable Whitsundays.

The Directorate's vision is delivered by bringing together the functions of managing Assets, Procurement, Fleet, Property and Facilities, Project Management, Information Technology, Information Management, Rates and Finance, Strategic Finance and Governance.

#### STATUTORY/COMPLIANCE MATTERS

This report is provided to support enhanced transparency and accountability in accordance with the local government principles outlined in the Local Government Act 2009.

#### **ANALYSIS**

The month of December 2020 continues to see increased activity across Council as the momentum builds towards closing out the year.

The finance team has been focussed on developing reporting and preparing for budget review 2 and the preparation of the upcoming 2021/22 budget. The development of a budget module within the Technology One One-Council solution will provide for a smoother budget preparation as managers and responsible officers can input the budget details directly into the system and we will move away from the reliance of spreadsheet driven budget information. This change is a positive step in building maturity into the budget process. Council has been notified that it will receive a revaluation from the Department of Natural Resources and Mines, which will be the first for some years. This data is due to be received in March 2021 to allow.

for preparation of the general rates for the upcoming budget. Focus remains on the current budget and working within ourselves, to ensure that the budget remains on track.

With a significant number of projects underway within the ICT team, it was pleasing to see some of the projects being finalised, including the installation of the new parking solution with improved systems helping to simplify the parking experience with the use of technology. Work has also commenced on the upgrade of the Civica "Authority" solution with that project being driven predominantly inhouse with existing staff expertise. The majority of the settling in issues associated with the move to the new Proserpine Administration Building have also settled with staff resuming working in a more business as usual approach and technology is helping to support them with some new ways of working including the use of teleconferencing with external agencies and across the different work sites. The completion of the new website project lead by the communications team has seen a significant improvement to the Council website and staff across the organisation are to be recognised for refreshing content and for adapting to the new site, which continues to receive positive community feedback.

Governance continues to develop and review policies, with a focus across the organisation on reviewing all existing policies and bringing forward any changes to Council as needed. This will be a continuous process over the next few years. Changes to the legislation continue to be bedded down and again processes reviewed to ensure that we remain in compliance with our legislative obligations. The Audit Committee met for the final time that calendar year with changes coming forward for a new Committee Chair and a change in the contract internal audit function.

Leases remain one of the key priorities for the procurement, property, and fleet team, with community leases being reviewed and renewed along with managing the impacts of associated changes with existing leases. The Manager has been developing an implementation plan for procurement changes as a result of previous reviews and has redeveloped draft policies to guide procurement activities and these will be workshopped with Council in the coming months. Further time has been dedicated to reviewing the software system and how we can get better solutions from the existing product with recent enhancements or through alternate software to support the existing corporate approach. This work will be ongoing but will present significant opportunities to improve the way we do business both internally and with suppliers.

The workload remains constant and there is a number of staff taking leave through the Christmas/New Year period, which will be an opportunity to recharge after what has been an extraordinary year. Many staff have gone above and beyond in making sure that deadlines are met and that the support across the departments ensures that services remain uninterrupted for the community.

The Department continues to work towards delivering better solutions to ensure efficient and effective support to the operational and service delivery departments of Council.

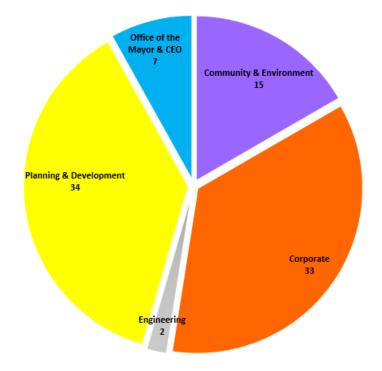

### Records System Review Project

This project aims to modernise the recordkeeping systems to improve usability and compliance across the organisation.

#### Review and recommendation

Investigation of available systems against Council's current applications architecture and functionality. A business requirements specification report has been reviewed by the ICT Governance committee and progressed to undertaking a proof of concept of the preferred solution. Proof of concept is complete with findings and recommendation to go to the January ICT Governance/Steering Committee.

#### Name and Address Data Improvement Project

This project aims to implement software that will improve the quality of customer and address data captured and maintained in Councils systems. It does this by forcing validation on addresses when they are entered, running processes to identify duplicate records and facilitating merging, standardizing the method of data presentation and adding addition checks to prevent duplicate data entry. This will improve customer experience as we will have better quality information available for communication and reduce administrative overhead as we will spend less time fixing incorrect address details.

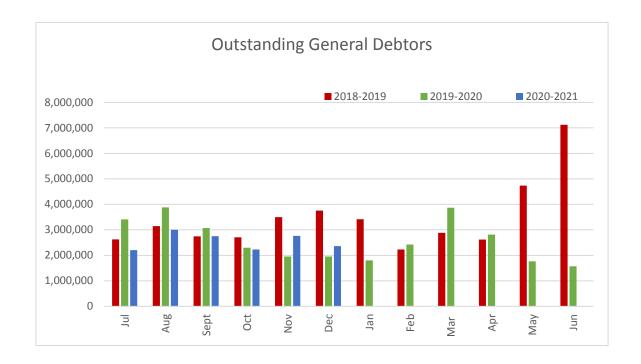

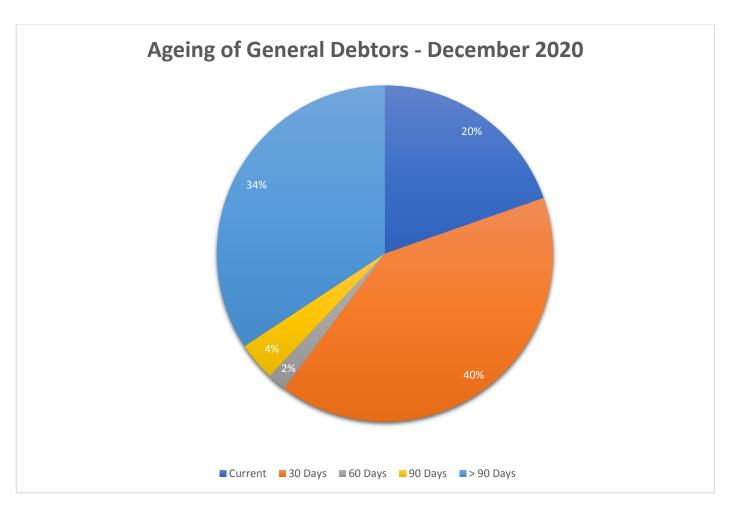

The final data set incorporating the updated road classifications has be submitted to the external valuers. It is expected that the revaluation will be finalised during the month of January 2021.

The vendors of the Asset Management System (AMS) have been engaged to undertake the upload of the revalued information into the AMS. The external values and the vendors are liaising on this task.

The external auditors have provided their initial comments on the draft report. The final draft will be submitted to the auditors for their comments before finalisation.

### Capitalisation

The information required for the capitalisation of completed work, including the required approvals are being compiled. However, no capitalisation is being conducted within the AMS, pending the completion of the revaluation process.

A review of the capital asset register for information and communications assets is being undertaken in conjunction with the Innovation and Technology team.

### Asset Management Leadership Advisory Group (AMLAG)

The Director Corporate Services and Director Infrastructure Services have been tasked with reviewing the format, composition, and structure of AMLAG. Based on the changes recommended by the two directors, the terms of reference may also see changes.

## **Legal Services**

In February 2018, Council moved to a model to entirely outsource legal services and repurposed the internal staff positions. This model was further refined in August 2018 when after briefing council, the CEO entered into a trial arrangement with McKays Solicitors for the provision of core legal services, at a largely fixed cost.

## **Ombudsman's Strategic Plan Review**

Council has been invited to provide comment on the annual review of the Ombudsman's Strategic Plan. The Ombudsman role is to:

- provide a timely, independent, effective and just way of having the administrative actions of government agencies investigated, and
- improve the quality of decision-making and administrative practices and procedures in agencies through making recommendations and providing information, advice and training.
- provide oversight for public interest disclosures (PIDs), providing an educational and advisory role.

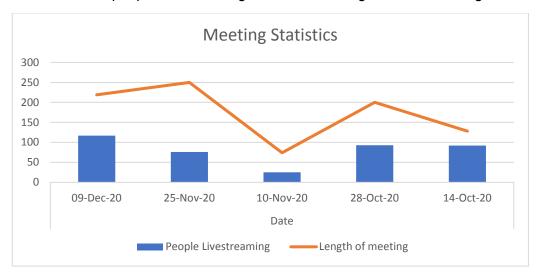
## **Human Rights Act Annual Report**

The first annual report on the operation of Queensland's *Human Rights Act 2019* was tabled in parliament in December 2020. Titled *Putting people first*, the report provides an important resource for government, parliament, and the community on the operationalisation of the Act and the degree to which it is achieving its objectives. It attempts to outline the work done across Queensland's public sector in implementing the Act, and identifies 7 key indicators to measure growth in Queensland's human rights culture.

The Queensland model of human rights protection promotes a human rights culture in the three arms of government – the executive, the legislature and the judiciary.

## **Council Meeting – Livestreaming**

The number of people livestreaming Council's meetings and the meeting duration are shown below:



The current average number of people livestreaming Council meetings has been 80, with a maximum of 117 (9 December 2020) and minimum of 25 (10 November 2020), noting that the 10 November meeting was brought forward from 11 November and had a significantly smaller agenda and duration. The meeting length



averages 2 hours 54 minutes with the longest meeting held running 4 hours 10 minutes (25 November 2020) and the shortest, 1 hour 14 minutes (10 November 2020).

#### **Council Policies**

Council has adopted policies to support its vision for the region and allow for good decision-making processes. At the conclusion of June 2020 Council had 89 Council policies, of which 11 were under review internally and to be reported to Council in due course.

## **Delegations**

To enable local governments to focus on strategic issues, reduce the amount of meeting time required and address circumstances in which the majority of Councillors must leave a council meeting due to a material personal interest or conflict of interest, local governments can delegate many of those decisions by resolution. The Chief Executive Officer can delegate most powers to an appropriately qualified local government employee.

The CEO did not delegate any powers to officers within the organisation during November 2020.

The Delegations are currently under active review and a report will be prepared for a meeting in 2021.

## Right to Information and Information Privacy Access Applications

The Right to information Act is the Queensland Government's approach to ensure that the community is provided with greater access to information held by government agencies – unless on balance it is contrary to the public interest to provide that information. The following report has been submitted for inclusion into Council's Ordinary Council Meeting to be held on 27 January 2021.

## **SUMMARY**

This application is for the construction of a dwelling house located within the recreation and open space zone. The dwelling exceeds the nominated building height for the zone and for building works. The application is recommended for approval, subject to reasonable and relevant conditions, on the basis that the constraints in constructing a dwelling on the site is consistent with adjoining development on Seaview Drive.

#### **PURPOSE**

Development Applications requiring decisions which are outside the Council officer delegated authority require Council consideration.

#### **BACKGROUND**

There is no previous Council decision relating to this matter.

## 2. Site Details

## 2.1. Location

The subject site is located at 31 Seaview Drive, Airlie Beach and forms an irregular shaped allotment having a total site area of 776m2.

## 2.2. Zoning

The subject site is zoned recreation and open space under the *Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme 2017.* 

## 2.3. Site description

The site is sparsely vegetated with no physical improvements on the site. The site has a significant slope which falls away from Seaview Drive with no defined drainage features.

## 2.4. Access

The site achieves access from Seaview Drive with an approximate 28 metre frontage.

## 2.5. Surrounding uses

The site is located in the immediate vicinity of adjoining residential uses along Seaview Drive.

## 3. Proposal Details

Council is in receipt of a development application for the construction of a three (3) bedroom dwelling house located at 31 Seaview Drive, Airlie Beach. The proposal provides for a maximum building height of 15.13 metres on a site that contains a slope greater than 15%, in excess of the height requirement for the Zone. The proposal provides a front boundary setback of 4.4 metres to the outermost projection and 7.8 metres to the garage wall.



A Preliminary Approval for a Variation Approval has been applied for to vary the Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme 2017 to assess the height relaxation requested and to permit the future building works application to be assessed as code assessable.

## 4. Planning Assessment

The application has been assessed against the relevant provisions of the *Planning Act, 2016* and the *Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme, 2017.* The proposal is considered to be generally in accordance with the Planning Scheme and is recommended for approval in accordance with the drawings and documents submitted, subject to reasonable and relevant conditions (Attachment 1).

## 4.1. State Assessment and Referral Agency (SARA)

The Application was not required to be referred to the State Assessment Referral Agency (SARA).

## 4.2. State Planning Policy - July 2017

The Application is consistent with the State Planning Policy 2017.

## 4.3. Mackay Isaac and Whitsunday Regional Plan - February 2012

The Mackay, Isaac and Whitsunday Regional Plan was established to provide the vision and direction for the region to 2031. The plan provides certainty about where the region is heading in the future and provides the framework to respond to the challenges and opportunities which may arise. The proposal is generally consistent with the provisions of the plan.

## 4.4. Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme, 2017

#### 4.4.1. Strategic Framework

## Liveable communities and housing

The proposal supports the settlement pattern of the region and the hierarchy of centres. The proposal involves the consolidation of land which subject to the adoption of Council's major amendment will be appropriately zoned.

## Economic growth

The proposal upholds the strategic intent for economic growth.

#### Environment and heritage

The proposal has not been identified as significantly impacting upon any cultural heritage or ecological features. Impacts to air, soil and water are to be managed by conditions of approval.

## Safety and resilience to hazards

The proposal is not considered to compromise the safety of the region's community, property, and infrastructure.

## <u>Infrastructure</u>

The proposal supports the coordinated, efficient and orderly provision of the region's infrastructure.

## 4.4.2. Overlay Codes

## Landslide hazard overlay code

A slope stability assessment report has been submitted to support the application. Conditions of approval have been imposed for the construction to be carried undertaking in per the recommendations of the report.

## Bushfire hazard overlay code

The bushfire hazard is considered to have been addressed at the time of subdivision of the land.

#### 4.4.3. Zone Code

## Recreation and open space zone code

The subject site is zoned Recreation and Open Space. The proposal is not supported by the zone, however it is important to acknowledge the circumstances which have resulted in the land being zoned as such. The site was created as part of the Airlie Summit development. When the land was included in the previous *Whitsunday Shire Planning Scheme 2009* it was included in the residential house zone. The site has remained in private ownership with no requirement on the Airlie Summit approval for the land to form a community or drainage function. Subsequently, Council has passed a resolution identifying the zoning in the current Planning Scheme as an administrative error and as such has resolved to change the zoning to low density residential. On this basis, other relevant matters are considered to exist which warrant approval of a residential use within the zone with no net community loss of recreation and open space.

#### 4.4.4. Development Codes

## Dwelling house code

The location of the dwelling house provides an acceptable streetscape that is consistent with the existing development on Seaview Drive and is responsive to the site constraints. The proposed dwelling provides for a front boundary setback of 4.354 metres to the outer most projection and approximately 7.8 metres to the garage wall. The adjoining site being 33 Seaview provides for a 2.0 metre setback off the front boundary to the garage. The proposal provides a side setback which is compliant with the requirements of the Code and will provide reasonable amenity protection to the adjoining development.

The proposal is acknowledged to exceed the building height requirements of the Code. It is considered the excess height is acceptable on the basis it will not unreasonably overshadow adjoining properties, unreasonably obstruct views or dominate the streetscape. It is noted the building height complies with the Community Design Guidelines. All remaining requirements of the Code are met by the development.

## 5. Public Submissions

The development application was placed on public notification between 25 June 2020 and 5 August 2020 in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Planning Act 2016. 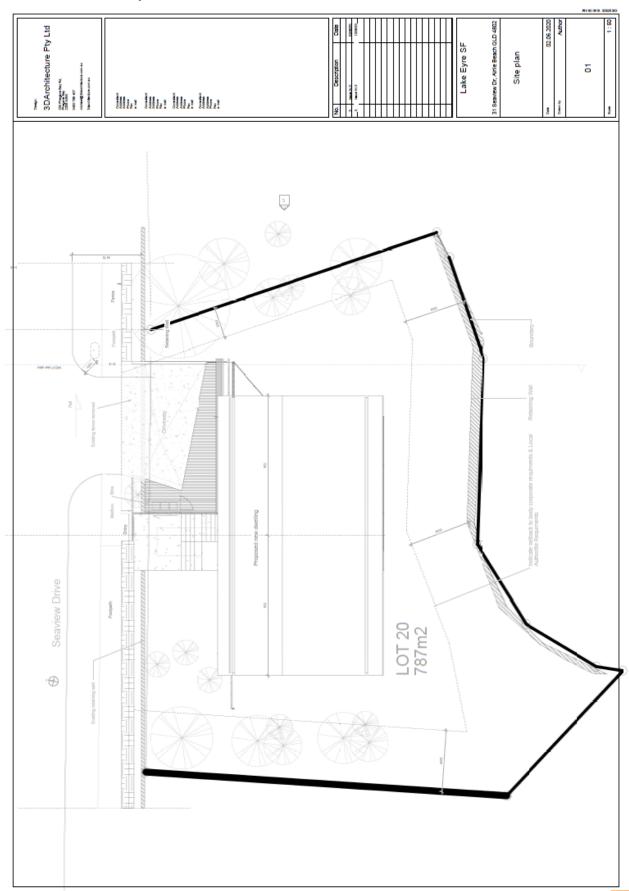

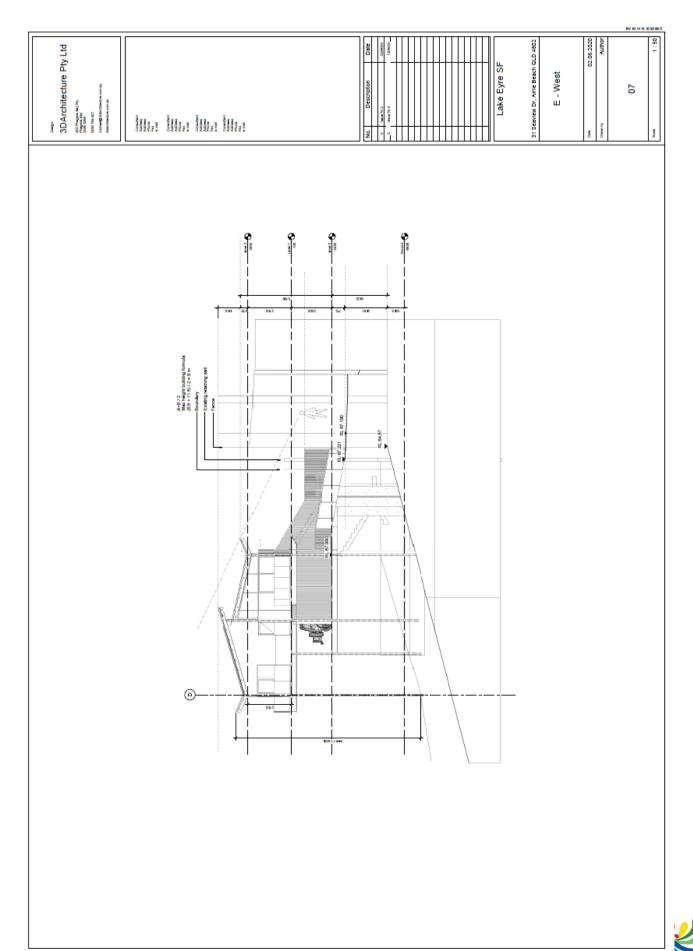




## Attachment 4 - Proposal Plan

# 14.2 20130767 - REQUEST FOR WAIVER OF INFRASTRUCTURE CHARGES - PROSERPINE SENIOR LIVING INC

#### OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council does not approve the request by Proserpine Senior Living Inc to waive infrastructure charges in relation to development at 13 Marathon Street Proserpine.

The following report has been submitted for inclusion into Council's Ordinary Meeting to be held on 27 January 2021.

## **SUMMARY**

In 2014 Proserpine Senior Living Inc (PSLI) received a development permit to construct six, one-bedroom units at 13 Marathon Street, Proserpine. Council was requested to refund the application fee and waive the infrastructure charges. The application fee was refunded but the infrastructure charges did not qualify for reduction under the Economic Development Incentives Policy (EDIP). In response to a request in October 2020 to pay the outstanding charges (indexed to \$134,927.70) a further submission has been made to Council seeking a waiver. The request is recommended for refusal as the development does not meet the criteria of the EDIP.

## **PURPOSE**

To seek Council decision on whether to waive \$134,927.70 in outstanding infrastructure charges.

## **BACKGROUND**

As advised by Proserpine Senior Living Inc, the organisation is a community-owned and operated, non-profit organisation which has been established in Proserpine for 46 years. It is run by a committee of volunteers and provides low-cost accommodation, enabling seniors to continue living independently in a secure and safe environment. Currently, PSLI operates 4 unit complexes, totalling 48 units. Being a community organisation, no government funding is received and revenue comes from rent, grants and donations. In order to retain non-profit taxation benefits, rents are required to remain below 75% of market rent

On 5 February 2014, PSLI received a development permit to construct six, one-bedroom units at 13 Marathon Street, Proserpine. A request was made at the time to refund the application fee of \$11,029. This request was approved on 28 January 2015. A request to waive the infrastructure charges of \$120,000.00 was received 24 July 2014, which was tabled at a Council meeting on 24 September 2014 pending finalisation of the Economic Development Incentives Policy (EDIP). When the policy was adopted, the development did not qualify for a reduction in infrastructure charges. This information was not communicated to PSLI and the charges remain outstanding. In October 2020 Council requested payment of the charges, which have increased by indexation to \$134,927.70. in response, PSLI have again requested a full waiver of the infrastructure charges in a letter included as **Attachment 2**.

#### STATUTORY/COMPLIANCE MATTERS

Planning Act 2016 Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme 2017

#### **ANALYSIS**

Council's Adopted Infrastructure Charges Resolution does not make provision for reductions or waivers. This is achieved through the application of the EDIP which is focussed on employment creating businesses mainly in commerce and industry. Residential uses and non-profit organisations do not qualify for consideration. Even if the use did qualify, there is no money in the EDIP budget which was used to fund COVID-19 relief measures. For this reason, the request cannot be recommended for approval.

By way of comparison, Council has previously approved two similar requests to waive infrastructure charges for developments at Murroona Gardens, run by Bowen Old Peoples' Homes Society.

- On 9 March 2016, Council resolved to waive \$100,000 in infrastructure charges triggered by the development of 39 units. The development did not qualify for consideration under the EDIP.
- On 8 May 2019, Council approved a Change application which triggered infrastructure charges of \$202.399.50. Councillors applied a different definition of the use, which reduced the calculated charge to \$23,217.75, all of which was waived.

No accounting for these funds being transferred to the Infrastructure Charges account has been undertaken. There is no allocation for funds to be transferred to the Infrastructure Charges account in lieu of payment from Proserpine Senior Living Inc.

#### STRATEGIC IMPACTS

Council's policies do not support the waiver of infrastructure charges for residential development or non-profit organisations.

Many of our residents need to move from outlying regional areas to be closer to medical and support services. #### **ANALYSIS**

Council has received an application from Whitsunday Fun seeking approval to the commercial hire of bicycles and electric trikes on Council footpaths, cycle ways, foreshores and boardwalks between Cannonvale and Airlie Beach.

The proposed equipment is supplied with safety helmets and safety equipment including a bell plus a rider instruction briefing is conducted prior to hire.

Ages are restricted to 12 years and older with any under 18 years riders required to have a guardian to accept responsibility of supervising a minor.

The proposed designated route of operation is between Cannonvale and Airlie Beach excluding designated roadways and the Airlie Main Street footpath (Electric trikes only).

It is suggested the speed of the tricycles be limited to no more than 12 km/h at all times.

The trikes maximum width is 70cm similar to the width of a standard bicycle. It is further suggested the electric tricycles utilise the lagoon pathway closest to the restaurants (the path dog owners use with the painted paw prints).

#### **SUMMARY**

Council is approached by community groups for donations and attempts to assist where possible.

#### **PURPOSE**

For Council to consider a request from the Bowen Collinsville Health Action Group (BCHAG) for financial assistance to engage a Project Officer Grant Writer.

## **BACKGROUND**

BCHAG is a collective of key not for profit organisations, community development entities and public and private health practitioners who are committed to improving access to allied health services for residents in the Whitsunday region.

## STATUTORY/COMPLIANCE MATTERS

Local Government Act 2009 Local Government Regulation 2012

#### **ANALYSIS**

BCHAG has the opportunity for Bowen to become a national pilot site for an Allied Heath Hub and implement allied health models across the Whitsunday region through a \$1.2B federal government regional, rural and remote health funding grant which will be announced in early 2021. The groups vision is to develop models of care over a variety of professions such as occupational therapy, mental health services, speech pathology and podiatry as well as the recruitment and retention of health professionals in the Whitsunday region.

Regional Council

BCHAG is seeking financial assistance of \$10,000.00 from Council to engage a Project Officer Grant Writer to compile and submit a federal government health funding grant on their behalf to ensure the application is comprehensive and of the highest quality.

Alternate financial assistance has been obtained from the Bowen Neighbourhood Centre and Bowen Flexi Care, while Abbott Point Operations have tentatively agreed to provide financial assistance based on the contributions from other key community organisations. See attachment 2 for budget.

Whitsunday Regional Council has approved in-kind support of providing a Council officer to assist the appointed Project Officer Grant Writer with data collation and the use of a Council pool vehicle accompanied by a Council officer to non-Bowen communities.

Council has the following options:

Option 1 – That Council approve the donation request and support the BCHAG.

Option 2 – That Council decline the donation request from the BCHAG.

Dear Mr Ferguson,

You may be aware of the Bowen and Collinsville Health Action Group (BCHAG), of which Councillor Mike Brunker is the chair. We thank the Council for its support to date for the work of BCHAG.

BCHAG has the opportunity to be very well placed to implement allied health models across Greater Whitsunday communities (as a national pilot site) as part of a \$1.2B federal government regional, rural and remote health funding grant that will be announced early in 2021. As one of a limited invitee list to hear the Rural Health Commissioner announce this opportunity (via videoconference approximately three weeks ago), BCHAG is cognisant of the need to act quickly to capture this opportunity.

As chair of BCHAG, Councillor Brunker arranged for BCHAG representatives to meet with the Mayor to discuss this funding opportunity. We meet with the Mayor and Councillor Brunker on 17 December and they, along with Ms Julie Wright of your office, were supportive of our verbal submissions. However, given the urgency of our request, they suggested we make a formal submission to you. We understand from them that Council is not formally meeting again until late January, and funding support is required before then. Accordingly, I write to you to provide you with advice about BCHAG and the funding opportunity that has presented itself.

BCHAG has been meeting for three years. It is a collective of key not-for-profit organisations, public health and community development entities, and private allied health practitioners. BCHAG meeting attendees include representatives from:

- Bowen Community Council Inc. including Bowen Neighbourhood Centre and Cooinda Family Centre;
- · Bowen Flexi Care Inc;
- Girudala Community Cooperative Society;
- Northern Australia Primary Health Limited (NAPHL);
- North Queensland Primary Health Network;
- Queensland Health (Mackay Hospital and Health Service) including the Bowen, Collinsville and Proserpine Hospitals;
- Regional Social Development Coalition (RSDC);
- · Several Registered Private Practice Practitioners; and
- · Whitsunday Regional Council.

BCHAG is committed to improving allied health services access for residents of Greater Whitsunday communities, including Collinsville (classified as a remote community under the Monash model), Bowen, Proserpine, Cannonvale / Airlie Beach, and the Whitsunday Island communities (classified as very remote communities). At present, our data analysis (qualitative and quantitative) show that most health practitioner practices wish to expand through employing more professionals. That analysis also shows that there are gaps in service provision with some health disciplines not locally available at all, or in very limited supply (examples include occupational therapy, mental health services, speech therapy and podiatry for residents of all ages). The challenge is retaining professionals, and their families, in the region.

There is considerable evidence that shows if health professionals believe they and their family will have a good income, while residing in a community with good education facilities, health services and housing, then it is likely that those professionals will form long term attachment to that community, contributing to community social and economic growth.

Last year, BCHAG representatives undertook considerable advocacy and consultation with national and state entities and institutions, who were supportive of the BCHAG vision. That consultation included:

- · Members of Parliaments Minister Coulton, Mr George Christensen, and Mr Dale Last;
- The Commissioner of National Rural Health and staff from the Commissioner's Office;
- · James Cook and Central Queensland Universities;
- National Rural Health Alliance;
- Queensland Health;
- Regional Australia Institute;
- · Growing the Local Care Workforce, including Boosting the Local Care Workforce Program;
- Check Up;
- · Regional Social Development Coalition; and
- The National Disability Insurance Agency.

Unfortunately, as a result of COVID-19, many of those entities' activities were diverted to supporting the response to COVID-19, and the momentum in advancing this vision was slowed. However, consultations have recommenced with most of those entities, and those that have been consulted remain supportive of the concept.

BCHAG is developing models of care and workforce recruitment and retention that is multi-factorial including:

- Providing a family liaison officer that supports new health professionals and their family members to
  quickly assimilate into their specific community and the Greater Whitsunday region such liaison and
  onboarding activities include helping the family to:
  - o find suitable accommodation,
  - o enrol in preferred schooling and childcare,
  - o investigate options for spouse employment,
  - making introductions to local sporting and social clubs that family members may be interested in joining, including providing free initial membership to such clubs,
  - o visit some of the Greater Whitsunday tourism attractions, through entry voucher provision, and
  - o find suitable business premises and making business introductions to community leaders;
- Providing health professionals that apply with an opportunity to experience their professional discipline across a range of service providers and service types including Aboriginal Health, Public Health, Disability Services and Primary Health. It is common (and preferable) for new graduates to be offered a range of practice experiences before settling on a speciality field. Under the BCHAG models, new professionals can be confident in their decision of which specialisation they would like to pursue, having had the opportunity for broad general experience initially;
- ✓ Offering a multi-disciplined team with a "multiple sliding doors" approach. This model of care utilises well-researched health processes, whereby the resident client is at the centre of a collective of allied and other health professionals, receiving integrated and person-centred care. For example, under this approach, a resident might visit a speech pathologist in Airlie Beach, a physiotherapist in Cannonvale, a psychologist in Bowen, and a GP in Collinsville, all of whom are linked through an integrated network. This ensures the resident is provided with "wrap-around" holistic care where all networked practitioners

communicate with the resident and each other to facilitate optimal health outcomes while breaking down the service "silos" that are so common within health systems;

- ✓ Ensuring adequate ICT capacity that enables:
  - oBCHAG communities to grow their own workforce of allied health professionals, including undergraduates and certificate level practitioners (therapy assistants) providing online learning opportunities for allied health students helps keep younger residents in their communities, connected to family and friends, while also gaining professional qualifications. Partnerships with Universities, TAFE or another RTO that offers online education will be pursued so that local residents can gain a needed qualifications; and
  - o Allied health professionals to provide telehealth services. For example, because of the expensive and very sensitive orthotics equipment podiatrists need to invest in, a podiatrist who is part of the integrated networked, may be place-based in Cannonvale, but have a client in Collinsville. That client can be supported by both the allied health assistant in Collinsville (under the supervision of the Cannonvale podiatrist) and via videoconferencing with Cannonvale podiatrist.

Such enhanced ICT capacity will not only reduce the considerable time, expense and stress for residents who have to travel regularly out of their communities for health services, but it will foster more employment opportunities for locals within their communities.

✓ Providing centralised office administration support to those integrated network members who seek such support - appointment bookings and automated reminders, rescheduling, invoicing, reconciliation, support with regulatory registration such as NDIS registration, insurance etc. Allied health practitioners are often sole traders or small business partnerships, where the owners may have limited business training and experience. By offering this administration service, this enables those practitioners to better spend their time delivering much needed health services, while also having the confidence of ensuring their business is operating efficiently.

BCHAG needs to engage an experienced health services project officer grant writer to develop the grant application, including:

- · collating very localised health data,
- developing infographics and through different media contextualising the models of care and workforce recruitment and retention in ways that impress the grant assessment panel, and
- draft a quality application, ensuring all grant criteria is fully and professionally addressed in the application.

We believe the project officer should be engaged as soon as possible – once the grant is formally announced by the federal government (anticipated for approximately late January), our experience is that there will only be a short timeframe in which to finalise a grant application (usually a period of 3 – 4 weeks). BCHAG wants to be well-prepared to ensure its grant application is comprehensive and of the highest quality. Accordingly, work on collating necessary information for that grant application should begin now.

In our submissions to the Mayor, we requested funding and in-kind support from Council. We have also approached Abbot Point Operations seeking funding from that company – it appears in conversation with those representatives, our application will be looked upon more favourably if key community organisations also contributed funding. Bowen Neighbourhood Centre and Bowen Flexi Care are both prepared to commit funding to support the engagement of that project officer. We hope the Council can see its way clear to also do so.

We appreciate it is a "difficult" time to be requesting funding support from Council, given we are going into the Christmas "close" period. However, given the timing of this federal government grant funding opportunity, we are seeking Council's support now towards the engagement of a specialist health services project officer grant writer. We anticipate that project officer engagement to commence mid-January (after formalising recruitment and establishing office infrastructure for the officer), and will continue until approximately mid-March (the time of application submission).

In addition to the funding the Neighbourhood Centre and Bowen Flexi Care will contribute to this officer's engagement, Bowen Flexi Care will also provide in-kind support of office infrastructure for the officer's use. In meeting with the Mayor, it was suggested by that (subject to formal submission) in addition to direct funding, Council may also be able to provide some in-kind support through the provision of a Council employee's time to assist the project officer in data gathering and collation, and use of a Council pool car should travel (with the Council officer) to non-Bowen communities be necessary.

Accordingly, we request the Whitsunday Regional Council provide BCHAG with funding in the amount of \$10,000 (or any lesser amount the Council may be able to afford at this time) and in-kind support (as detailed above). That funding would be required by mid January 2021 at the latest.

The money would be given to, and accounted for by, Bowen Flexi Care as the entity formally engaging the project officer, on behalf of BCHAG. As advised above, we do need to start the engagement of the project officer as a matter of urgency, so your advice regarding whether Council is prepared to commit such funds and in-kind support would be appreciated as soon as possible.

For full transparency, we attach to this letter a proposed draft budget for your information regarding the engagement of the project officer.

We also provide Ministerial brief that was provided to Minister Coulton and a link to the video by Whitsunday Regional Council for use in workforce recruitment. The information in that Brief has "moved on" somewhat from when it was drafted 10 months ago, and should be read subject to the information provided in this letter – however, it may provide you with some additional information you may find helpful.

We look forward to your urgent response, and thank you for this opportunity to make a formal submission to you.

We wish the Council team a very happy Christmas and all the very best for 2021 (it surely must be better than COVID-19 2020!). Thank you for your support to date by hosting BCHAG meetings at Council's offices.

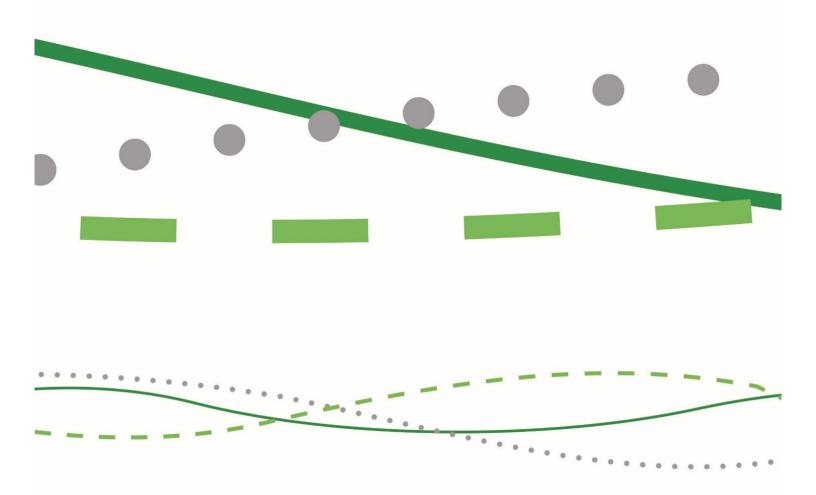

# **Director's Report**

Although a short month December 2020 saw several busy weeks for the Community Services team.

The following are the average monthly occupancy rates at each of Council's Caravan Parks:

- Proserpine Tourist Park 38.14%
  - an 8.54% increase from December 2019.
- Wangaratta Caravan Park 25.99%
  - a 5.29% increase from December 2019.

The Region's Libraries monthly attendance and borrowings have decreased & increased from December 2019.

- Attendance 6955 29.8% decrease
- Borrowings 17.656 39.7% increase

The e-Library borrowings had the highest figure with 5,324 for the month.

The regular First 5 Forever sessions finished the year with Christmas themed activities and stories, while the Book Club and Knit Wits groups enjoyed festive Christmas afternoon teas at their end of year get togethers.

After months of COVID-19 restrictions, it was great to offer school holiday activities, although there were challenges with social distancing and attendance limits. Both morning and afternoon sessions were held over three days. Library Staff commented how very rewarding it was to see children and families enjoying the libraries once again.

Aquatic Facilities totalled 28,417 attendance for December 2020 an overall total increase from November 2020 of 17.5% across the region with the exception of the Bowen and Collinsville Pools.

- Airlie Lagoon increased by 80% to 19,030
- Bowen Pool decreased by 34.3% to 6,955
- Collinsville Pool decreased by 25.2% to 2,721
- Proserpine Pool increased by 18.8% to 9,742

The Community Administration Officers' statistics for December 2020 include the following:

- Correspondence Generated 355 items
- Civica & ECM Registrations 1,181 tasks
- 1,067 Telephone Calls (internal & external)

Council's Off-Street Carparks generated \$83,531 for the month with transactions, an increase of 9.2% from November 2020. An average spend per ticket was \$9.52 compared to \$9.07 for the previous month. The Airlie Lagoon Precinct Carparks generated the highest number of transactions at 7,032 for the month with an average spend of \$4.42 per purchase.

The Community Team received 196 CRM's for December with the Environmental Health and Local Law units receiving 178 complaints/requests for the month.

NRM conducted 18 property visits to discuss Property Pest Management Plans (PPMPs) and/or feral animals with landholders.

A total of 1,054 customers visited the Customer Service Centres a decrease of 10.9% from November 2020.

Customer Service Counter receipts decreased by 42% from December 2019 to 459 for the month with the breakdown from each location listed below:

- Proserpine: 142 receipts a 55.4% decrease from December 2019
- Cannonvale: 124 receipts a 31.5% decrease from December 2019
- Collinsville: 23 receipts a 54.9% decrease from December 2019.
- Bowen: 170 receipts a 29.4% decrease from December 2019

Telephone calls received decreased by 21.7% (17 working days) from the previous month to 2,674 calls, with 78% resolved at the first point of contact. The After Hours Call Centre fielded 534 calls for the month an increase of 49% from the previous month (135 during Christmas Closure).

Customer Requests submitted for December totalled 682 across the organisation with 88.4% completed, a decrease of 215 CRM's (24%) from the previous month.

The replacement of Christmas Tree Decorations for 2020 due to theft and vandalism totalled \$6,776.00 with the breakdown for each township listed below:

- Airlie Beach \$533.00
- Bowen \$2,607.00
- Collinsville \$3,146.00
- Proserpine \$490.00

## 16.1 HYDEAWAY BAY ANZAC MEMORIAL PROPOSAL

**AUTHOR:** Adam Hagy – Deputy Director Infrastructure Services

**RESPONSIBLE OFFICER:** Matthew Fanning – Director Infrastructure Services

#### OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council deny the request due to the close proximity of the existing Dingo Beach Anzac Memorial and advise the Hydeaway Bay Progress Association that;

- a) It encourages the Progress association to hold a joint Anzac Day ceremony with the Dingo Beach community; and
- b) The placement of another Anzac Memorial on Council controlled land that is coastal foreshore would be disadvantageous due to the likelihood of the memorial being damaged from adverse weather events.

The following report has been submitted for inclusion into Council's Ordinary Meeting to be held on 27 January 2021.

#### **SUMMARY**

Council received a request from the Hydeaway Bay Progress Association Inc. to establish an Anzac Memorial at Hydeaway Bay.

#### **PURPOSE**

Council has received a request from the Hydeaway Bay Progress Association Inc., seeking Council approval to construct an Anzac Memorial on the Hydeaway Bay Foreshore. The Hydeaway Bay Progress Association Inc. have advised they will be funding the supply of materials and labour to construct the memorial.

#### **BACKGROUND**

On 18 April 2018, Council was briefed on the Anzac Memorial proposal and requested further information to consider approval on this request.

Council has now received further correspondence from the Hydeaway Bay Progress Association Inc., providing further information of design and location, as per Attachment 1.

#### STATUTORY/COMPLIANCE MATTERS

LSP CE 03 Memorials in Council Parks, Gardens, Open Spaces & Road Reserve Policy.

## **ANALYSIS**

In 2013, Council resolved to support the installation of a memorial at the Dingo Beach Foreshore, which is located approximately 1.5km (direct line) or approximately 7kms by road from Hydeaway Bay. For the most part all townships have one memorial with the exception being Airlie Beach which has two, (one in Cannonvale and one in Airlie Beach). Supporting this request may set precedence, by inviting others to put forth requests to install memorial in other areas such as Jubilee Pocket, Conway Beach, Mount Julian, Strathdickie etc. This may

defeat the purpose of having a singular gathering place for the public to come together and honour those who served.

Under the Memorials in Council Parks, Gardens, Open Spaces & Road Reserve Policy, it states the following:

- The final decision in relation to the location of memorials and monuments on Council controlled land or assets shall be made by Council. When determining the final location, Council shall place high regard on the Council Management Strategy for Parks, Gardens and Reserves, and other strategies where appropriate;
- Council shall only approve minor memorials within areas dedicated for minor memorials. Minor memorials must be in remembrance of persons or groups;
- The subject of the Memorial must demonstrate a high level of significance, such as the person or group has made an outstanding contribution to the cultural, political, economic or social development of the Whitsunday region;
- All costs associated with establishing a memorial are to be met in full by the donor. Costs include, but are not limited to:
  - o Council's application fee;
  - o community and stakeholder consultation;
  - o artist, project manager and/or engineering fees;
  - o all costs associated with Development Approval as required;
  - o all costs associated with construction and installation;
  - o all costs associated with site preparing and/or remediation;
  - estimated future maintenance and management costs including ongoing monitoring, cleaning, refreshing protective coating and minor damage repair, for a minimum of 15 years; and
  - costs of at least \$500 and up to the value of Council's insurance excess incurred as a result of any damage sustained to the memorial within the first 15 years.

The Association has indicated that they would like a memorial design like Dingo Beach. If approved Council will be required to consult with the Association to ensure an appropriate memorial is placed. The Association have chosen the Hydeaway Bay Beach Southern End as the proposed location for the following reasons:

- Car park within 50 metres of the chosen site;
- Bitumen walkway pedestrian access:
- Shelter shed and tables to locate electronic equipment and supportive material under cover;
- Within 30 metres of the beach from which to observe sunrise and place or throw floral tributes;
- The chosen site is central to most Hydeaway Bay residents;
- Is large enough to accommodate at least 100 people; and
- Is flat for the most part allowing the positioning of chairs as required.

Council's options regarding the request are as follows:

**Option 1** - Deny the request and ask that the Association combine their service with the Dingo Beach Progress Association & Residents, and together commemorate those who have served at the Dingo Beach foreshore memorial location, situated approximately 1.5km (direct line) or approximately 7km's by road.

**Option 2** - Support the installation of the Memorial, which will involve Council officers working with the Association to establish an appropriate memorial design and its placement.



#### STRATEGIC IMPACTS

Reputation – A number of Hydeaway Bay residents are involved with the Progress Association. If Council chooses not to support the installation of the Memorial, it may result in a number of adverse complaints.

Financial – Ensuring that the Policy is upheld so that Council does not commit in-kind support in relation to the maintenance of the memorial, as it is stated in the Policy that all costs associated with the maintenance and upkeep are the responsibility of the donor for the period of 15 years.

Infrastructure & Assets – In the instance where the memorial sustains damage, Council may be asked by the community to conduct repairs wherein this is the responsibility of the donor for a 15 year period. It is highly likely that at some point the memorial would incur damage from adverse weather as the placement is on a coastal foreshore and Council would be pressured to assists.

#### **ANZAC MEMORIAL**

The Anzac Memorial is significant for the community at Hydeaway Bay and attracts over 50 people at Dawn Service on Anzac Day.

The location is carefully chosen because it possesses the following supportive components.

- · Car park within 50 metres of the chosen site.
- · Bitumen walkway pedestrian access.
- Shelter shed and tables to locate electronic equipment and supportive material under cover.
- Within 30 metres of the beach from which to observe sunrise and place or throw floral tributes.
- The chosen site is central to most Hydeaway Bay residents.
- Is large enough to accommodate at least 100 people.
- Is flat for the most part allowing the positioning of chairs as required.
- · Is now associated closely with the Anzac Day program.

The Service was initiated by Rob Crocker in 2009. Rob was a serviceman in Vietnam in the Navy – later in the Police force & Water Police. Rob was involved with the community since coming to live here in 2003 & was office bearer on a number of occasions & contributed a generous amount of time to community projects. He is sorely missed.

The Service has been conducted at the same location since 2009 which infers that none better have been found

The Service is on tape so that specific requirements are provided consistently each year and service content in the form of a program is always distributed to all attendees.

The site is visited by many people throughout the year and provides evidence of the communities respect for all service personnel.

The memorial will be small about 4.0Sqm in total – comprising of a rock less than a meter high & a meter in diameter – a border of pebbles 30cm all around then paved on the outside. (Measurements are approximate) The memorial and related events, does not detract from the local environment or its existing use and comes within the Councils classification of a Minor Memorial or Monument.

The memorial will not be visible from the road therefore will not distract drivers of vehicles.

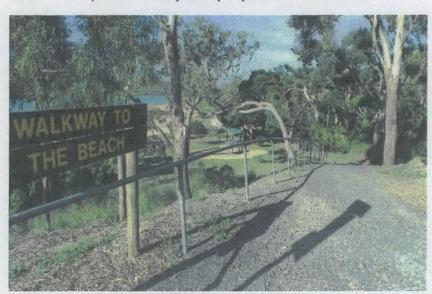

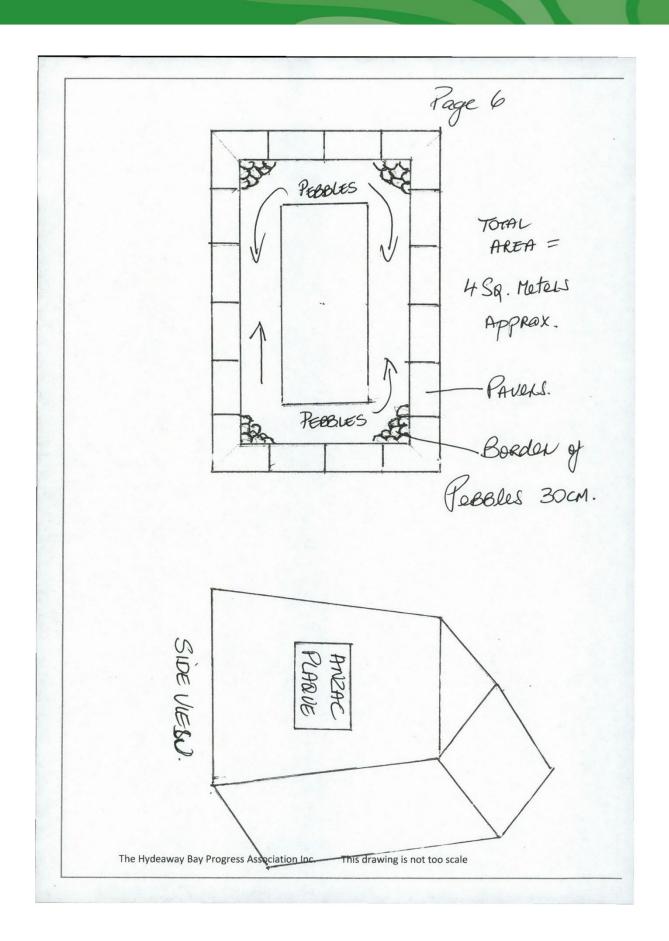

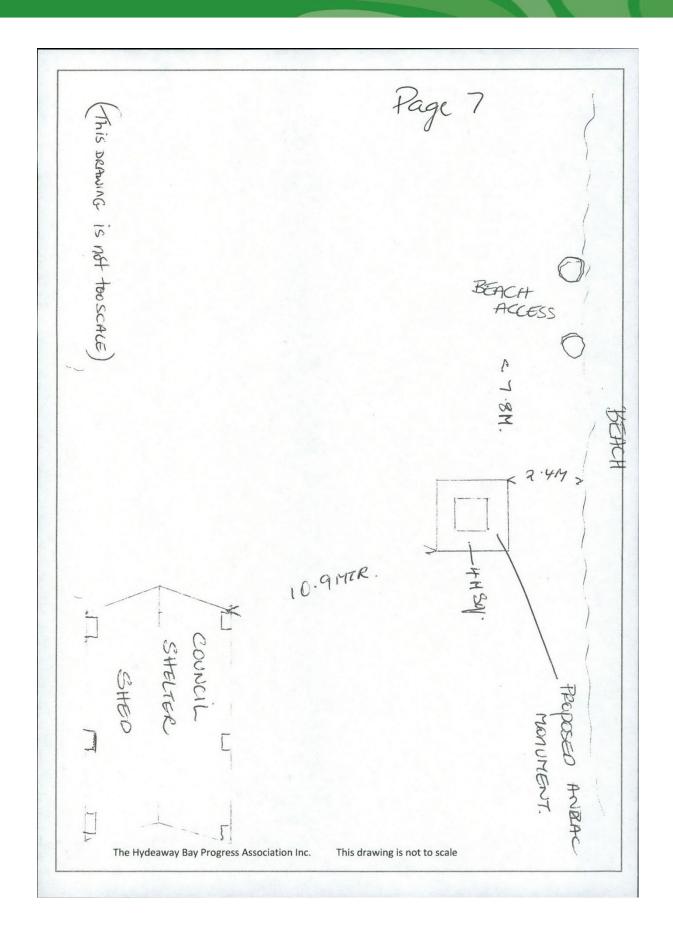

16.2 ROUND 3 WORKS FOR QUEENSLAND - CHANGE OF PROJECT SCOPE COLLINSVILLE

#### OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council resolves to approve the Round 3 Works For Queensland alternative projects identified in the report and forego the previously approved Railway Road Footpath Project. The alternative projects to utilise the \$400k available being:

- 1. \$179k to irrigate the Collinsville Showground Oval;
- 2. \$200k to complete the missing link of footpath and pedestrian footbridge along Scottville Road Collinsville; and
- 3. The balance of W4Q funds remaining be utilised towards street beautification in Stanley Street Collinsville.

The following report has been submitted for inclusion into Council's Ordinary Meeting to be held on 27 January 2021.

#### **SUMMARY**

Following Community Consultation in late 2020, alternate projects were proposed to ensure that Collinsville residents would receive projects delivered in the township that were valued and prioritised based on their feedback.

#### **PURPOSE**

To consider the officer's recommendation regarding the utilisation of Round 3 Works For Queensland funds for alternative projects as the Railway Road footpath was not deemed a priority by the community as a whole.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Under the previous Council prior to the March 2020 elections a project was identified and resolved to include a section of footpath along Railway Road Collinsville to be funded from the Round 3 Works for Queensland Project. The project was approved and a budget of 400k was set.

Upon further investigation the scope was expanded to route the path from Railway Road through to the Sodexo Mining Camp which would have required a total budget in the order of 1.4 million. It was also further discussed in the new term of the Council that the project may not have the support of the community. It was also demonstrated that the project was not the highest priority for the community following consultation held from 23 October 2020 - 20 November 2020.

Given the information on hand following feedback from the community it was determined to seek alternative projects to utilise the Round 3 Works for Queensland based on community priorities, bearing in mind that any new projects would need to be completed by June 30 2021 and meet the funding criteria.

The top 10 suggestions were as follows:

- Waterpark
- Cheaper Water
- Upgrade Park Equipment
- Bike Track and BMX track at Darcy Munro Park
- Collinsville Beautification
- Equal Treatment of all areas of WRC
- Park Play Equipment for older kids
- Upgrade sports facilities and programs for kids
- Upgrade and maintain tennis courts
- More road maintenance

Further details of these priorities and results of the consultation are included in Attachment 1.

## STATUTORY/COMPLIANCE MATTERS

N/A

#### **ANALYSIS**

Given the fact that the Railway Road footpath project was not identified as a community priority, in recent consultation several other options were considered. These options recommended by the officer would meet the Works For Queensland eligibility criteria as set out in Round 3 for projects to be constructed during the 2019/2020 and 2020/2021 financial years.

The number 1 suggested project by the community being a waterpark has been granted funding through the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Grant to the value of \$1.2 million and will require construction by the end of December 2021, therefore no funding is required through the Works for Queensland program. Council pro-actively sought this funding following the consultation carried out with the community.

Collinsville Beautification will also most likely be submitted for grant consideration for the Building Better Regions fund to the value of \$3.5 million subject to Council resolution and further community consultation.

The bike track and BMX track at Darcy Munro Park is also being considered by Bravus, formerly Adani, for funding through their Community Benefit Fund which will likely contribute \$300k as outlined in their Memorandum of Understanding with Council.

Council officers then looked to other projects that could be completed by June 30, 2021 and evaluations began on priorities set by the community as outlined in the Top 10, such as upgrade of sport facilities, elements of Collinsville Beautification. One other item mentioned in the top 20 of the consultation report and the submissions was more walking tracks/circuits. Based on this, and the fact that costings and design have been completed to finish the missing link of footpath and install a pedestrian bridge at Scottville Road, this project is proposed as well.

The officer's recommendation includes:



- 1. Irrigation installation for the oval at Collinsville Showground. During the construction of the showground in 2015 through Building our Regions funding the showground was upgraded to include the provision of facilities for RVs, amenities were also constructed along with a number of shelters, etc. During this time the funding allowed for the provision of a pump system and holding tanks for future irrigation of the oval. To complete the project in its entirety further funding would be required to run the remaining irrigation on the oval Therefore it is proposed to utilise \$179k towards the completion of this project.
- 2. Complete the missing link of footpath and pedestrian bridge at Scottville Road. The project has been costed to the value of \$200k.
- 3. Any remaining funds up can be utilised towards street furniture purchases or beautification of Stanley Street Collinsville.

## STRATEGIC IMPACTS

The projects proposed as above took into consideration the need to have minimal financial impact on Councils ongoing operational budget.

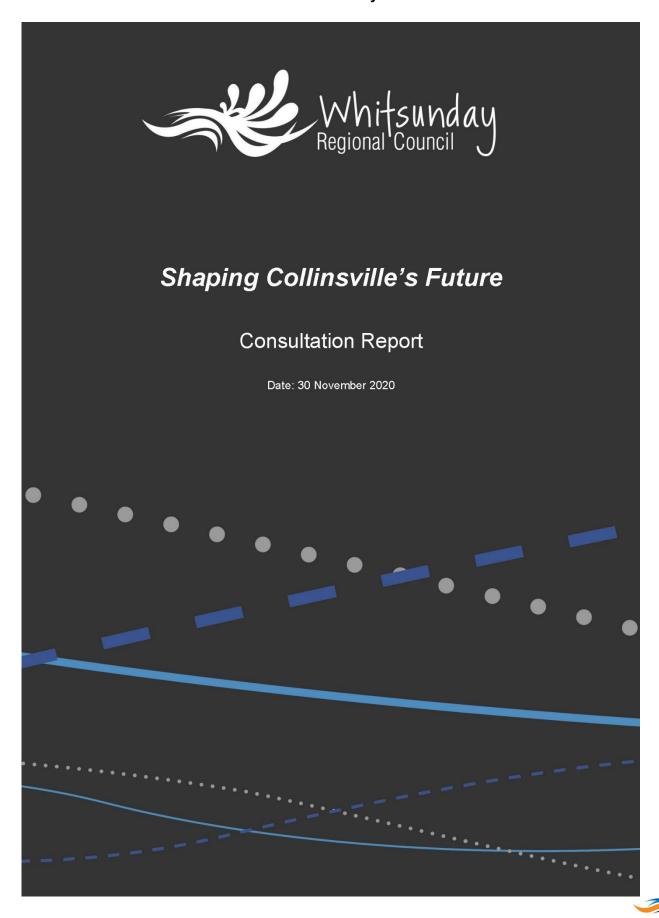

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# 1. Executive Summary

Whitsunday Regional Council (WRC) recently consulted with residents in Collinsville, Scottville and surrounds, to collate ideas and suggestions for improvements and planning for Collinsville's future.

The consultation period was open for a period of 5 weeks online on Your Say Whitsunday, between Friday 16 October and Friday 20 November, and was promoted via WRC's communication channels and distributed by local community groups.

A public consultation event was held on Friday 23 October at Lions Park in Collinsville, between 4pm – 6pm, and approximately 50 residents attended the event which included a brainstorming activity and sausage sizzle. The event was attended by the Mayor, Councillors, senior WRC executives and WRC project officers.

A total of 100 submissions were received during the consultation period, covering a wide range of ideas and suggestions for improvements. All ideas have been collated into this report and priority suggestions have been identified.

A waterpark was by far the most popular idea presented by the community, followed by cheaper water, beautification of the town and new play equipment in the parks. Road improvements, upgrades to sporting facilities and a pump track were also popular ideas.

Many participants expressed they do not feel they have received the same level of service as other areas within the region. The results also show that residents would prefer upgrades that enhance their liveability and beautify the town, rather than a focus on tourism projects.

Collinsville residents have clearly expressed they would like to see major upgrades and visible improvements in their town within the next few years.

# 2. Background

Whitsunday Regional Council is seeking community input into the development of the Collinsville Master Plan and looking for ideas to spend nominated Works for Queensland funding in the division.

The Master Plan will outline the vision for future planning and development of Collinsville, and this document will inform future WRC works programs and priority project selection for grant applications.

The Queensland Government's Works for Queensland (W4Q) program aims to stimulate the economy by providing jobs for locals in the construction of new infrastructure, such as playgrounds, street furniture, solar equipment and footpaths. WRC has received \$3.61 million in W4Q funding under Round 3 and an additional \$2.72 million in COVID stimulus funding. An equal portion of these funds have been split between the 6 divisions.

## 3. Overview of the Consultation

The consultation process occurred over a 5 week period from Friday 16 October through to 5pm, Friday 20 November 2020.

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#### 3.1 Purpose of the consultation

To consult with affected residents and key stakeholders regarding ideas and suggestions for Collinsville's future.

Under the IAP2 Public Participation Spectrum, WRC was seeking to inform and consult the affected communities.

#### 3.2 Who was consulted

All residents in Collinsville, Scottville and surrounding areas were targeted during the consultation process. Anyone could participate in the consultation activities.

## 3.3 Advertising and promotional activities

The consultation was promoted via WRC's Facebook page, in the Townsville Bulletin lift out, through the electronic sign at the Telehealth Centre, flyers on public noticeboards and via direct emails to Collinsville community groups. Feedback Forms were available at the Collinsville Customer Service Centre during the consultation period.

WRC promoted the consultation process via social media, with a Facebook post at the beginning of the consultation period. This post had a reach of 7074 people, with 133 likes/shares and 61 link clicks through to Your Say Whitsunday.



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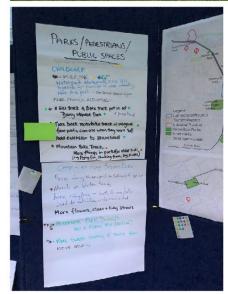
#### 3.4 Public Consultation Event

A public consultation event was held on Friday 23 October at Lions Park in Collinsville, between 4pm – 6pm, and approximately 50 residents attended the event which included a brainstorming activity and sausage sizzle.

A range of ideas and concerns were raised with the Mayor, Councillors and senior WRC staff in an open meeting forum during the event. Brainstorming activities with butchers paper was set up to record ideas, comments and preferences. Participants could vote for preferred ideas by placing stickers next to an idea on the butchers paper. The brainstorming activity was facilitated by WRC officers who directly engaged with residents throughout the event.

A list of Proposed Projects was presented to residents to gain feedback on the projects listed. Maps showing the location of a proposed footpath construction were also available for viewing on the day. Promotional merchandise was displayed and available as giveaways for residents to encourage participation. Feedback Forms were collected on the day and made available to any who wished to write their submission another day.







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# 4. Overview of the Responses

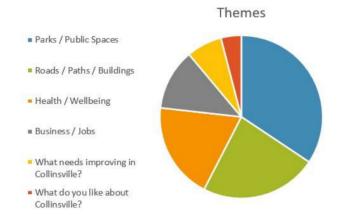
Overall, there were 100 submissions received during the consultation period, with a mix of online comments, in person feedback at the consultation event, feedback forms and written submissions received. All responses are detailed in full in Attachment A: All Submissions.

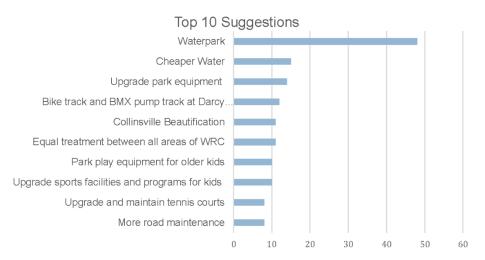
#### 4.1 Analysis of responses

The following graphs outline some of the key results from the surveys and comments. A full breakdown of all responses is in **Attachment B – Submission Analysis**.

The most popular idea by far is the installation of a Waterpark in Collinsville, followed by reducing water charges, upgraded park equipment and facilities, beautification of the town, upgraded sports facilities for kids and more road maintenance.

Another comment which was widely expressed is the feeling of unfair treatment and neglect compared to the other towns within the Whitsunday region. This sentiment indicates that residents have higher expectations of WRC's services than what is being delivered currently.



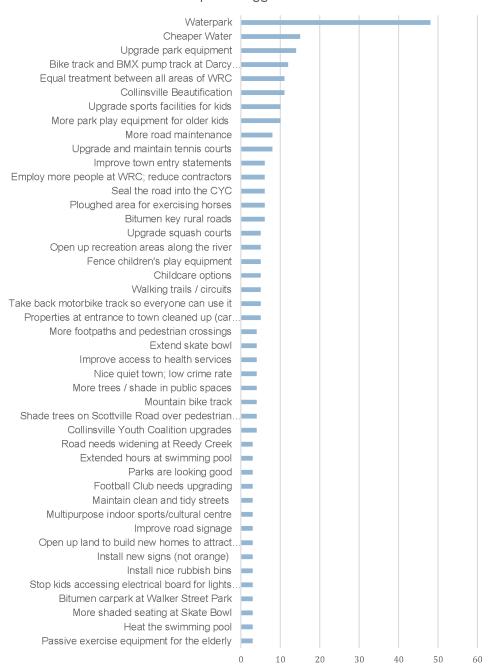

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# 5. Recommendations

As indicated by the results outlined in this Report, the Collinsville community have expressed a wide range of ideas and suggestions for improvements to their town. The consultation process received a lot of interest and engagement from residents, which is reflected in the large number of submissions received.

Despite so many different ideas put forward, it can be extrapolated that most ideas fall into several key themes:

- · Enhancements of public spaces
- Improvements to infrastructure and services
- · Increasing liveability for residents
- Improved health and wellbeing, and
- · Attracting more families and residents to Collinsville.

It is recommended these key themes and popular ideas expressed during the consultation process are considered by WRC moving forward, during the development of the Collinsville Master Plan, future capital budgets and funding opportunities.

Ongoing communication and engagement with Collinsville residents is recommended to keep the community informed of any planned upgrades and to demonstrate that Council has listened to the feedback provided in this Report.

# 6. Next Steps

This report will be considered by WRC officers for future W4Q projects and during the preparation of the Collinsville Master Plan. The report will be presented to Council for their consideration at an upcoming briefing session.

It is important to close the loop with residents and show how their input has affected the outcome. A Consultation Summary infographic document will be prepared which will be released to the public and distributed via the website and social media. The Summary will show some of the key statistics and outcomes of the consultation process.

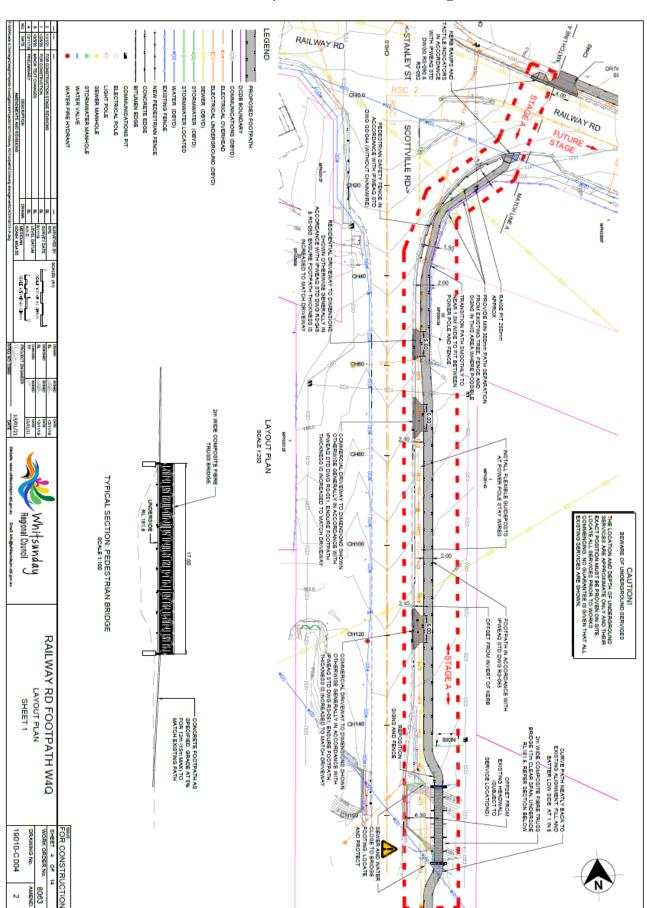
It is important there are ongoing activities to build awareness of the impacts of bushfire hazard, including more education around the roles and responsibilities of all parties to mitigate these risks.

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Works for Queensland 2019-21 Program Guidelines

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# Introduction

The 2019-21 Works for Queensland (W4Q) program is a \$200 million Queensland Government funding program over two years, to support eligible Councils undertake job-creating maintenance and minor works.

This initiative is delivered by the Department of Local Government, Racing and Multicultural Affairs.

# **Our Future State: Advancing Queensland's Priorities**

The 2019-21 W4Q program supports Advancing Queensland's Priorities through "Our Future Plan" by creating jobs in a strong economy and being a responsive government.

# **Alignment with Regional Plans**

Projects proposed to be funded from the 2019-21 W4Q are to align with Regional Plans.

# **Program aim**

The aim of the 2019-21 W4Q is to create and/or sustain jobs for Queenslanders.

# **Program objective**

The primary objective of the 2019-21 W4Q program is to support eligible Councils undertake jobcreating and/or job sustaining maintenance and minor infrastructure projects relating to assets owned or controlled by Councils.

#### **Employment of young people (NEET)**

As a secondary objective of the 2019-21 W4Q, eligible Councils are encouraged to provide employment opportunities for young (15-24 years) people who are currently not in employment, education or training (NEET).

Eligible Councils will be required to report the number of people in the NEET category who have been provided with employment opportunities through W4Q projects. Reporting is to be submitted monthly through the DLGRMA online W4Q portal.

All projects are to be delivered by 30 June 2021.

# **Funding period**

The Funding Period for the 2019-21 W4Q is from the date of formal advice of project endorsement to 30 June 2021.

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# **Eligible Councils**

Councils eligible for 2019-21 W4Q funding are listed in **Appendix 1**. The eligible applicants must be Local Government bodies constituted under the *Local Government Act 2009*.

# Eligible projects and eligible costs

The projects and costs listed at **Appendix 2** are eligible to receive funding under the 2019-21 W4Q.

# Ineligible projects and ineligible costs

The projects and costs listed at **Appendix 3** are ineligible to receive funding under the 2019-21 W4Q.

# **Funding allocation**

Approved funding will be made up of a \$1,000,000 base allocation, plus an amount reflecting unemployment levels in the Local Government area.

Eligible Councils will receive a Formal Advice of Funding Approval that will confirm the Local Government's 2019-21 W4Q allocation.

Eligible Councils may choose, but are not obligated to, contribute to the cost of projects.

# **Document preparation**

Eligible Councils should ensure all necessary plans, documents, permissions, approvals, specifications and estimates of costs have been prepared prior to submitting the List of Projects and prior to commencement of works.

Eligible Councils are required to cost projects accurately and must ensure, in delivery, normal procurement and value for money practices apply.

The Department may seek additional information on Councils' submitted List of Projects.

# **Native Title**

Eligible Councils receiving 2019-21 W4Q funding are responsible for ensuring Native Title issues are adequately investigated and addressed prior to works commencing on endorsed projects.

# **Project expenditure forecasting**

Eligible Councils will be required to provide a forecast of expenditure for proposed projects at the time of submitting the List of Projects. Eligible Councils are to monitor and update forecasts monthly and advise the Department of any variations.

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# **Payment schedule**

2019-21 W4Q Approved Funding will be paid to eligible Councils on the following basis:

PAYMENT SCHEDULE	
First Payment (50 per cent of Approved Funding)	The Department will make the First Payment upon endorsement of the projects by the Department.
Second and Subsequent Payments (40 per cent of Approved Funding)	Second and Subsequent Payments will be made after the eligible Council has expended 50 per cent of the Approved Funding and the prescribed acquittal form is received together with either (a) a photograph of the project signage installed at the project site or (b) an exemption approval from meeting the Department's Acknowledgement Requirements.
Final Payment (10 per cent of Approved Funding)	The Final Payment will be made after finalisation and acquittal of all Approved Projects, as per the Funding Deed of Agreement.

# Reporting and acquittal

Local Government recipients may be requested to provide additional information in relation to the management and delivery of specific projects.

Monthly reports are to be provided for all endorsed projects via the DLGRMA portal.

Local Government recipients will be required to acquit funds in accordance with Clauses 4.1.31-4.1.33 of the Funding Deed of Agreement. Acquittal involves verifying funds were expended in accordance with the 2019-21 W4Q Guidelines and the Funding Deed of Agreement, including validation of jobs sustained or created.

The Final Certificate Form for funds provided under the 2019-21 W4Q and any supporting documents must be provided to the Department within thirty (30) days of the Funding Period End Date.

As per clause 4.1.32 of the Funding Deed of Agreement unspent funding must be returned to the Department.

# **Variations**

Local Government recipients will be able to vary the amounts between endorsed projects and submit requests for consideration for new projects. In both cases the overall approved funding allocation will not be increased.

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# Conducting media opportunities/opening ceremonies

The Minister for Local Government – representing the Queensland Government – must be formally invited to officiate at any opening ceremony or other official celebration of an approved project. The Minister, at his or her discretion, may nominate another Minister or representative to attend on his or her behalf, or may request an alternative event date so that he/she can attend.

Formal invitations must be sent directly to the Minister with a minimum of 28 days' notice of the planned opening ceremony. Email formal invitations to <a href="LGRMA@ministerial.qld.gov.au">LGRMA@ministerial.qld.gov.au</a>

# Signage for endorsed projects

In accordance with clause 6.1 of the Funding Deed of Agreement recipient Councils must adhere to the Department's Funding Acknowledgement Guidelines recognising Queensland Government funding and the W4Q program in all media and other communications. This includes:

- · erection of signage at construction sites;
- acknowledgement in publicly made statements or appropriate documentation.

Further information on acknowledgement requirements, including the use of the Queensland Government logo, is available on the Department's website at <a href="www.dlgrma.qld.gov.au">www.dlgrma.qld.gov.au</a>

# **Project completion**

Projects funded under 2019-21 W4Q must be delivered by 30 June 2021. Extensions of time will only be considered under exceptional circumstances.

# How to apply

Eligible Councils will be invited to submit one (1) completed List of Projects form detailing all the projects to be considered for endorsement. Councils should ensure only those projects considered eligible under the W4Q 2019-21 Guidelines should be included in the List of Projects.

The Department's Regional Officers are available to assist Councils prepare and submit the List of Projects.

The Minister for Local Government has discretion in funding decisions and is under no obligation to consider submissions made after submission of Lists of Projects have closed.

# Project approval and endorsement

Lists of Projects submitted by eligible Councils will be assessed by the Department and evaluated by a moderation panel. The panel will submit recommendations to the Minister for Local Government, who will endorse the Lists of Projects.

Eligible Councils will be notified in writing following endorsement of projects by the Minister.

## Appendix 2 – Eligible project costs

## To be considered eligible under the 2019-21 W4Q program, projects must:

- create and/or sustain jobs in a local community or across a region (for example, this could mean creating new jobs, sustaining existing jobs that might otherwise have been lost, or jobs relating to an existing work program that can be expanded); and
- be able to be delivered by 30 June 2021; and
- not already be proposed for funding in the recipient Local Government's 2019-20 or 2020-21 budget.

#### In addition to the above, eligible projects must either:

- improve the condition (maintenance), quality or lifespan of a Local Government-owned capital asset such as, but not limited to; footpaths, kerb and channel works, roads, car parks, sewer, water and stormwater systems and networks, shade structures, playgrounds, community and sport facilities, halls, swimming pools and water play;
- be new minor infrastructure works; or
- be new maintenance or minor works for disaster resilience and preparedness such as works that protect existing essential public infrastructure and/or build resilience to future natural disaster events.

Notwithstanding the above, the Department may consider as eligible, projects where constructing a replacement asset can be demonstrated to be more economically viable in the short and long term, than performing maintenance or upgrading the asset.

In accordance with Section 1.2 j) of the Funding Deed of Agreement, all estimated project costs are exclusive of Goods and Services Tax (GST).





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## Appendix 3 - Ineligible project costs

Project costs ineligible to receive funding under the 2019-21 W4Q include:

- projects where physical works are not able to be delivered by 30 June 2021;
- projects to be constructed by Local Governments not listed in Appendix 1 of these Guidelines;
- projects already commenced or completed works (see Note 1 below);
- purchase of an asset or works to an asset that is not or will not be owned and/or controlled by the recipient Local Government;
- land purchases and/or costs associated with land purchases;
- land buy-back schemes:
- works constructed on land not owned or controlled by the recipient Local Government, except where it has permission to construct on Queensland Government-owned land (see Note 2 below:
- projects where land ownership has not been resolved at the time of submitting the List of Projects;
- projects with lengthy approval(s) requirements;
- works involving planning and design only;
- · temporary works;
- planning studies;
- purchase, lease or hire of core business equipment such as plant, motor vehicles and office equipment, unless directly required for construction (e.g. water trucks or excavators);
- temporary projects, except where required as part of the construction of the eligible works or required to enable completion of the proposed project;
- statutory fees and charges and/or any costs associated with obtaining regulatory and/or development approvals;
- legal expenses;
- house raising or relocation;
- official opening expenses;
- · ongoing costs for administration, operation and maintenance or engineering;
- corporate overheads and on-costs, including technical, professional and clerical salaries of Local Government employees (see Note 3 below);
- movable / portable furnishings, supplies and items (eg computers);
- costs associated with preparing the List of Projects and/or associated supporting material;
- any other costs as determined by the Department.

The above list identifies common examples of ineligible projects and costs and is not intended to be definitive. If there is any doubt about ineligible projects or costs, please contact the Department.

**Note** 1: Where a project commences, and the Local Government incurs costs towards the project (eg planning or detailed design), and the Local Government decides to not proceed with the project, the costs incurred will not be reimbursed.

**Note 2:** should Local Governments wish to undertake works of this nature, evidence of land tenure and or permissions must accompany the List of Projects submission).

**Note 3:** The remuneration of executive officers, such as the Chief Executive Officer (CEO), Deputy CEO and Chief Engineer should not be included in the project estimated costs.

2019-21 W4Q funds are not to be used by the recipient Local Government as their contributions towards other State or Commonwealth Government funding programs.

#### OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council receives the DRFA & Shute Harbour Project capital progress report for the month of December 2020.

The following report has been submitted for inclusion into Council's Ordinary Meeting to be held on 27 January 2021.

## **SUMMARY**

The report provides a summary of key Capital projects underway during the 19/20, 20/21 & 21/22 financial years. The attachments include multi-year projects that remain active or have been completed during this financial year. This month's report lists the DRFA Flood Event 2019, the Shute Harbour Project and the Qld Monsoonal Event 2020.

**Current Financial Progress:** 

<u>DRFA – Flood Event 2019</u> – Expenditure of \$35,278,773.47, to date with forecast of a further \$8,157,755.09 budgeted by the end of 20/21 Financial Year. Three submissions have been closed and reimbursed 100% with 15 now with the QRA for acquittal.

<u>Shute Harbour</u> – Expenditure of \$31,670,048.03 to date with a forecast of a further \$24,403,502.05 budgeted by the end of the project (September 2021). QRA budget \$48.7m plus \$2.8m Council contribution from insurance payout. The project has a current funding deficit of approximately \$3.66M based on the QRA budget of \$48.7M.

<u>Qld Monsoonal Flood Event 2020</u> – Expenditure of \$1,362,080.19 to date with a forecast of a further \$11,315,582.36 budgeted by the end of 20/21 Financial Year and \$4,436,195.14 budgeted for 21/22.

#### **PURPOSE**

To inform Council on Progress of Capital Projects being undertaken during the 2020-2021 Financial Year up to 31 December 2020.

#### **BACKGROUND**

This report describes works on the restoration of essential public assets from three distinct declared natural disaster events being:

In March 2017 our region was impacted by *TC Debbie*, NDRRA works is now complete and acquitted. Shute Harbour Redevelopment is currently underway, to be completed by 30/07/21.

January 2019 saw our region affected by *Flood Event 2019*, which we have picked up the damage on roads, culverts and airstrip. Submissions have now been approved by the QRA and awarded to Contractors, works underway.

Whitsunday

Regional Council

In February 2020, the Whitsunday region experienced a tropical low **QId Monsoonal Flood Event 2020** which was also declared.

#### STATUTORY/COMPLIANCE MATTERS

Financial Reporting is provided to WRC in Dashboards provided monthly to PLT – Disaster Recovery, PCG – Shute Harbour Project & PCG – DRFA.

## **Shute Harbour Project**

The geofabric Panels are all placed now with just a small amount of rock to be placed on the seawall before it will be complete. Vassallo Constructions have progressed well on the headstock works with only the Eastern Wharf Headstock left to be form up and be poured. All precast panels on the building wharf have been placed and the topping slab is scheduled to be completed by the end of January 2021.

The Pontoon refurbishment is progressing well with the first finger expected to be connected by end of February 2021.

Dependant on weather, rock will continue to be placed on the Seawall this month, this will see the seawall complete by the end of January 2021, except for the small section at the temporary pontoon system. The topping slab for the remainder of the Building Wharf is scheduled to be poured this month. This will form the floor for the Main Terminal Building to be built on. Eleven piles have displaced on the Eastern Wharf. The contractor is drilling out the natural material inside these piles and filling with concrete, as recommended by the designer.

Fishing Pontoon gangway absence affected some Small Tourism Operators (STO's). The Fishing pontoon had to be removed to complete the rock Seawall works and has been reinstalled. A gate has been installed on the Gangway and all STO's received a key for access. Fishing pontoon will not be open to the general public until the completion of the project due to being inside the construction site. The water will not be connected at the Fishing Pontoon and vessels will need to continue to use the water supply tap near the stairs at Snows Beach for the duration of the project. Vassallo's have made available water for use by STOs at STO office.

AECOM are continuing the redesign of the top floor of the main terminal building and the design of the new small tourism building. Owner's consent has been lodged with the State for the minor change to the small tourism building. Once the State has given landowners consent, the minor change application will be lodged with Council. This is expected to occur by the end of January.

The Council is working with the QRA to secure the full \$56.07M allocation for this project as these funds will be required for the completion of the works. The Council has documentation reflecting the full commitment from the Government for the \$54.5M. In addition to this are additional costs covered under the REPA B component of the project which are being finalised this month and will increase the project budget.

#### **Qld Monsoonal Flooding Event 2020**

Four submissions have been approved by the QRA with Strathalbyn Road approved by the QRA for \$2.2m. Two contracts were awarded for Proserpine Roads packages H3 & X3 and the Proserpine works crew is finalising package J3. The four packages in Collinsville closed on the 13 November and were awarded after the Council Meeting dated the 25 November 2020 with works to commence in January 2021. The three Bowen packages were awarded this month with works to commence in March 2021. The Trigger Point for this event will be \$349,118.00.

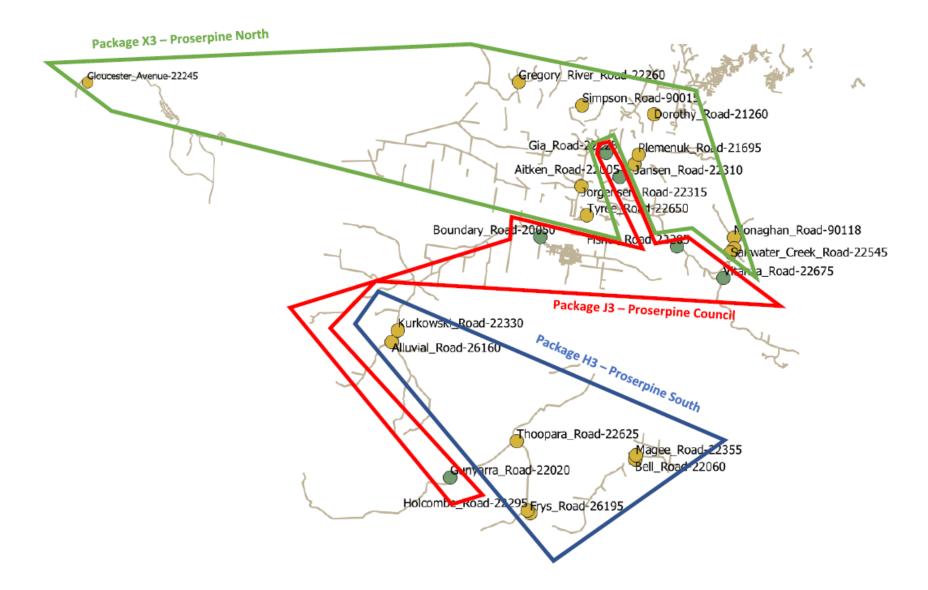

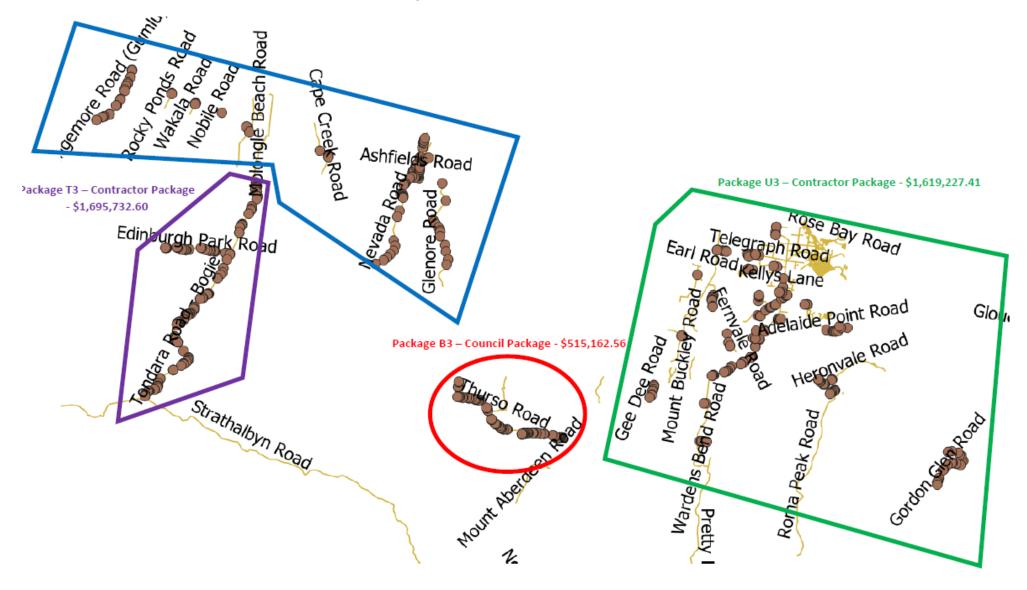

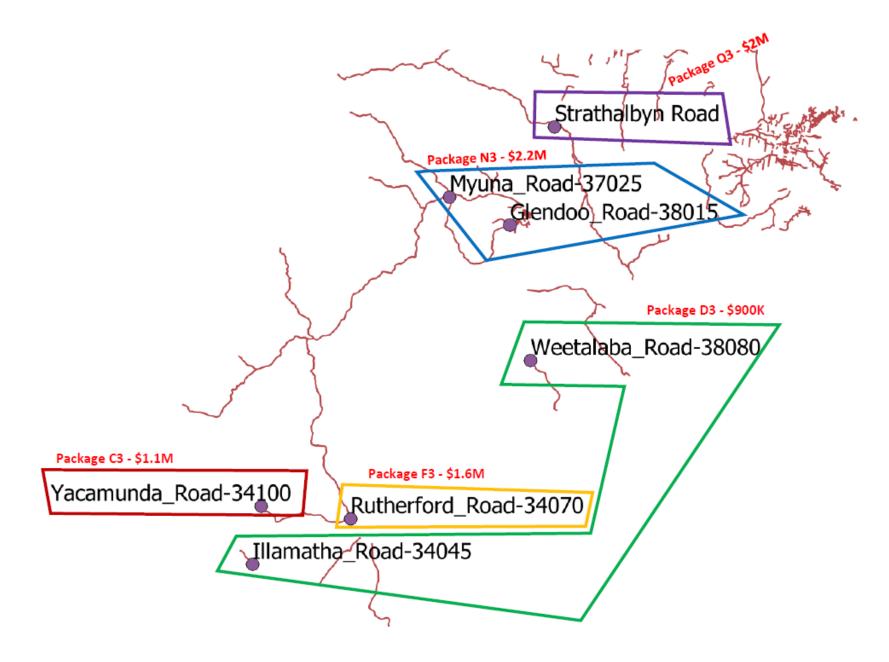

#### OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council receives the Infrastructure Services Capital Progress Report for the months of November & December 2020.

The following report has been submitted for inclusion into Council's Ordinary Meeting to be held on 27 January 2021.

#### **SUMMARY**

The report provides a summary of key Capital projects underway during the 2020/2021 financial year. The report also includes multi-year projects that remain active and carry over to the 2020/2021 financial year.

Current Financial Progress of Major Projects, W4Q programs, Infrastructure Capital Delivery is \$17.5 million actual out of a \$57 million overall budget.

Note: The status updates for Shute Harbour and DRFA works are the subject of a separate report.

#### **PURPOSE**

To inform Council on progress of Capital Projects being undertaken during the 2020-2021 Financial Year up to the end of December 2020.

## Major Projects

#### **Projects Completed to Date:**

- Proserpine Main Street Upgrade
- Proserpine Administration Building



#### **Projects Currently Underway:**

#### Lake Proserpine

With all of the funding requirements met and completed, variations to the funding agreements are being sort due to budget underruns, these will be used to improve the facility to a higher standard including vehicle pedestrian separation, installation of a grey water management system to decrease operational costs. Improvements to signage and delineation of areas in consultation with Sunwater. Provision of additional facilities such as dump stations and wash up facilities which will help improve the camping experience for visitors to the region. Pricing is being collated for these improvements to occur.

The risk management plan for the area is completed with the final issue under review by the required parties.

Externally to the project the operational plan is under draft for the long-term management of the area.

## **Proserpine Entertainment Centre (PEC)**

Works completed up to the end of December 2020 include all the inground services, casting of the precast panels pouring of the front foyer and footings and manufacture of the tower steel off site for installation in January.

Works programmed for completion in the coming month include the standing of the precast panels, installation of the blockwork to the front foyer and rear stage area to allow the progression of the concrete slabs to the rear stage and wet areas. Installation of the tower steel and suspended slabs will form the programme critical path going forward. Works are programmed for completion in October 2021 weather permitting.

## PAB - 7 Chapman Street - Carpark

By the Christmas shut down 4 of 10 concrete pours had been completed for the finished surface of the car park. The boundary wall has been finished and other pours carried out in preparation for the drainage to commence in the new year. With some efficiencies having been found it is also planned to progress with a security gate, CCTV and solar lighting under the funding agreement. Due to delays from rainfall works are now planned for completion 15 February 2021 weather permitting.





#### Flagstaff Hill

Contract for the Design and construction of the facility has been awarded with design works in progression, works are to commence on site in April 2021 once endorsement of the design is resolved by Council. Works are programmed for completion in September 2021 weather permitting.

Whitsunday Gardens Park Upgrade (Proserpine): Construction started 1 December 2020 with project reach practical completion on 24 December 2020.



Gloucester Sports Park Retaining Wall (Hydeaway Bay): Community Grant approved to Gloucester Sport & Recreation Association for shortfall of funds. Request for Quote issued, closing on 15 January 2021.

Henry Darwen Park Stage 2 (Bowen): Construction completed on the 11 December 2020 for footpath network and shelter slab. Footpath network is available for use, however temporary fencing still erected for construction of shelter, expected to commence week beginning 18 January 2021.





**Lions Park (Bowen):** Specifications currently being scheduled for tender with the procurement department for demolition of existing shelters and construction of new shelters.

Railway Road Footpath (Collinsville): Council are investigating other projects to utilise these funds for to ensure Collinsville residents receive something they most value. **Bowen Aerodrome Runway Repairs**: Works have been scoped and are included in the regional reseal program. The RFQ has been sent for quotes with a contractor expected to be awarded the works late in January.

**New Bowen Cemetery Columbarium Wall**: Consultant engaged to complete footing designs for the construction drawings.

**Assets Renewal Parks and Gardens**: List of projects to accompany future reports. Bulk of projects deal with renewal of sand soft fall and renewal of park signage.

**Heavy Formation Grading Program**: Individual road names where heavy formation grading will take place will accompany future monthly reports once list is finalised and compared against DRFA works.

**Bowen State High School safer transport upgrade**: Car park design is complete, with works planned for Q3, weather pending.

**Collinsville State High School safer transport upgrade**: RFQ currently out for design of works. Construction is planned to commence later in Q3, weather pending.

**St Mary's School safer transport upgrade**: Works are commencing after the Christmas break with a plan to complete within the school holidays, weather pending. The school principal has been in contact and staff will assist in providing advice to educate the parents to use the new drop and go area.

**Construction of Lagoon Deck and Shared Cycle Path**: RFQ to be prepared for composite material deck. This will be advertised early February.

**Dodd Street Shared Footpath**: TMR have approved design. Awaiting approval of variation to funding agreement as TMR have increased scope by approx. \$65k, this has been indicated to be expected for approval in January 2021, allowing works to be programmed for later in the year.

**Edgecumbe Heights Walking Tracks Upgrade (Design only):** Traditional owners have meet and they like the concept we have put forward, they have positive feedback, a meeting is scheduled with Council and Juru representative 14 December 2020.

**Forestry Road**: Scope is known, details of upgrades to be finalised. Approximately 40 culverts require repair of varying degree. GATT seal to be extended and further signage provided to direct the public to the Conway Circuit. Works expected to follow construction of car park at 7 Chapman Street.

**Gloucester Avenue Floodways**: Council has been successful in receiving betterment funding for the installation of two floodways on Gloucester Avenue. These works will be inserted into the program and will likely commence after the wet season.

**Hillview Road Kerb and Channel**: Design of the K&C has commenced and the inclusion of a solution to an ongoing drainage issue for the nearby motel is to be included in these works. Works are expected to commence late in Q3, weather pending.

**Moonlight Drive Kerb and Channel**: Replacement of approximately 40m of K&C. Works will progress in conjunction with maintenance works in the region.

**Port of Airlie Transit Terminal Upgrade**: Updated design submitted to Translink. Awaiting approval and funding agreement to cover 50% of cost. Design to be signed off once agreement in place and works scheduled in.

**Reflect Application Redesign and Implementation**: Currently rolled out to roads and drainage teams, future implementation will also see the software rolled out to Parks and Gardens and Water and Wastewater.

**Reseal Program**: RFQ has been sent to market with a contractor to be engaged by the end of January 2021.

**Roma Peak Road Floodways**: Council has been successful in receiving betterment funding for the installation of three floodways on Roma Peak Road. These works will be inserted into the program and will likely commence after the wet season.

**Unsealed Roads Creek Crossing Upgrade Program:** The creek crossings have been scoped and quotes are being sought to engage concreters to assist with delivery. Works will typically follow the wet season.

- Dinnie Road, Strathdickie
- Cooper Road, Kelsey Creek
- Brandy Creek Road 1
- Brandy Creek Road 2
- Muller Road, Myrtlevale
- Rosetti Road, Gregory River
- Wilson Road, Gregory River

**Unsealed Roads Re-sheeting Program**: Individual road names where re-sheeting will take place will follow the damage assessment and analysis of gaps from 2020 event.

**Wilsons Beach Rockwall**: Rock wall works completed. Will revise residual budget to look at completing footpath as part of this project.



**Flagstaff Hill Roadworks**: Works completed December 2020 with the road opened to traffic on schedule. A further surface treatment will be carried out towards the end of construction of the new building.

**Ted Cunningham Bridge Upgrade**: Tender documents are being compiled for a design and construct contract. This is expected to be advertised towards the end of January 2021 with design commencing around March 2021 and construction hoping to be carried out during the dry period and completed by December 2021.

## **Water and Wastewater Capital Projects**

**Bowen Sewerage Treatment Plant Upgrade** – Principal Contractor Aquatec Maxcon are currently in the commissioning stage. It is expected that commissioning completion to occur end of January 2021.

Cannonvale Bulk Potable Pipeline Stage 1: Works has been split into three separate tenders.

**Pipeline Materials Supply:** Delivered to site are now complete and the contract is complete.

**Pump Station and Generator Facility Construction:** Dowden's have completed construction of Pump House, electrical, pumps & pipe work. Commissioning of genset was completed on 12-11-2020. Flushing & disinfectant of pipe work were completed Nov/Dec20. We are awaiting permanent power connection & finish of minor building & civil works. Dowden's will complete performance testing March 2021 once pipeline is complete.

**Pipeline Construction:** The pipeline is continuing to progress, and it appears that the revised Date for Practical Completion of 30 April 2021 will be met. A severe wet season will affect progress and may impact the Date for Practical Completion. The current scheduling is prioritising completion in the areas most affected by wet weather.

The pipeline leading up to the future Cannon Valley reservoir site will be constructed early 2021.

**BWTP Low Lift Pump Renewals:** The low lift pump renewal project is currently under review following a project initiation meeting which identified additional risks relating to the existing electrical infrastructure and High lift pump station building. As the identified risks have the potential to impact significantly on the project budget it is likely that the project will be rescoped for staged delivery to ensure the appropriate budget is available for all facets of the works. It is noted that the there is no imminent risk of the existing low lift pumps failing due to the operations team managing to source enough parts to keep the existing pumps operational.

**Cannonvale Pump Station 1 Renewal:** A revised Practical Completion date is currently under review.

- Construction of new Switchboard Building (90%)

**Insurance - Bowen Reservoir:** Tender documents currently being developed. RFQ's for specific Engineered technical documentation has been developed. RFT to be issued in February for an April start date.

**Insurance - Collinsville Reservoir:** Miller Street reservoir completed.

**Collinsville reservoir roof renewal and Collinsville Solar Project:** RFT to be issued in February for an April start date and projected December 2021 completion date.

**Cannonvale Water Network Augmentation Stage 1A:** The Contractor (Roebuck Civil) is nearing completion of Stage 1A. Final connections have been made with testing undertaken on 3/5 segments. Works have essentially maximised the Project Budget however it is not expected that additional Budget will need to be found.

## **LGGSP Grant Projects**

**Cannonvale Water Network Augmentation Stage 1B:** works were slowed due to rock encountered on site and delays due to easement documentation. 95% of the pipeline has been constructed with only works at the Coyne Road reservoir site outstanding. These works are expected to be completed by 29th January 2020 pending weather conditions. This portion of the project is trending under budget.

**The Coyne road reservoir Upgrade:** The project is nearing completion with the steel panel tank installation having been completed in mid-December 2020. The final connection pipework is to be completed in early-mid January.

The Moonlight Drive Reservoir Upgrade: The project has commenced and is at approximately 80% complete. The water supply has been a changed over to the temporary poly tank, the existing tanks removed, and the new concrete slab poured in preparation for the tank installation in early-mid January 2021.

All projects under the LGGSP are expected to be completed by the end of January 2021 (dependent on weather conditions)

**Sewer Pump Capacity Upgrades Combined Rising Main:** Currently this project is waiting on Ergon approvals/upgrades to the existing infrastructure adjacent the site which will facilitate the switchboard on site. This is expected to be finalised late November / early December 2020 however the process has been delayed to 2021. It is expected that the civil and mechanical works package will be tendered in February for an April start date. Completion of the civil and mechanical works will aim to be completed to coincide with the Ergon upgrades.

**Thomas Street Drain Sewer Replacement:** The project involves replacing a short length of gravity sewer in Bowen through Thomas St drain to allow for relining of this section of sewer. Project commencement is expected to be mid-February – weather dependant.

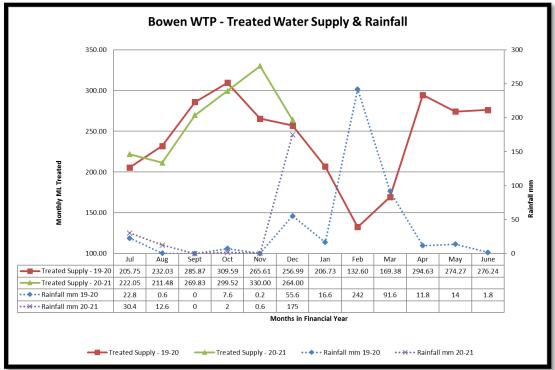

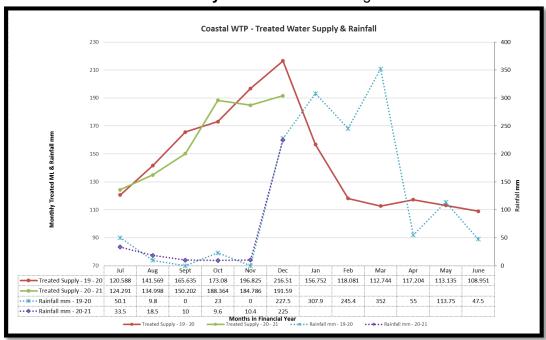

# Water Demand Statistics November & December 20

The Bowen WTP has produced an estimated average of **11.0 ML/day** of treated water during November 2020 and **8.51 ML/day** of treated water during December 2020.

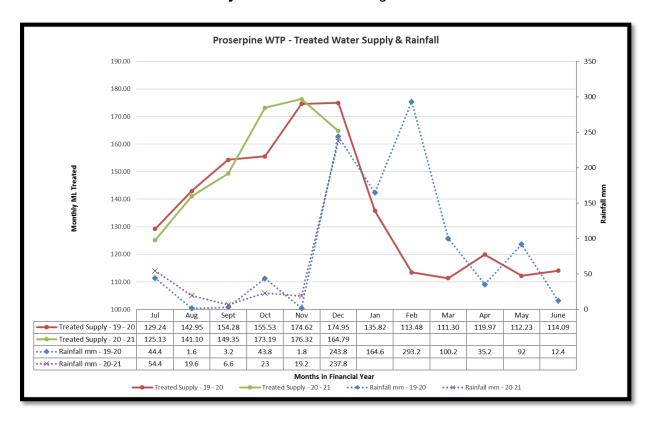


The Coastal WTP has produced an average of **6.16 ML/day** of treated water during November 2020 and **6.18 ML/day** of treated water during December 2020.

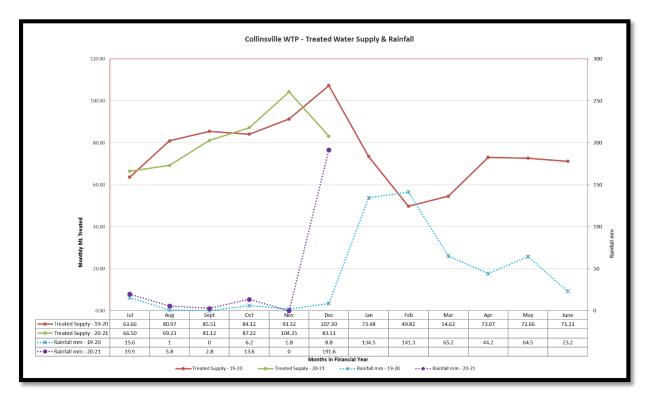




The Proserpine WTP has produced an average of **5.88 ML/day** of treated water during November 2020 and **5.32 ML/day** of treated water during December 2020.

# <u>Waste Management – November</u>

In November 2020, total tonnage of waste handled in the region was **4,368** tonnes.

- 3,429 tonnes were landfilled at Kelsey Creek & Bowen Landfills.
- **890** tonnes of waste were diverted from landfills (**32%** diversion achieved from Operational plan target of **20%**). An increase in waste volumes received across all waste categories with 87 tonnes more waste diverted compared to the 20/21 financial year average.
- 125 tonnes kerbside recycling collection (disposed at Materials Recycling Facilities -MRFs).

# Waste Management - December

In December 2020, total tonnage of waste handled in the region was **4,696** tonnes.

- 3,105 tonnes were landfilled at Kelsey Creek & Bowen Landfills.
- 1591 tonnes of waste were diverted from landfills (34% diversion achieved from Operational plan target of 20%). An increase in waste volumes received across all waste categories with 184 tonnes more waste diverted compared to the 20/21 financial year average.
- 131 tonnes kerbside recycling collection (disposed at Materials Recycling Facilities -MRFs).

# Waste Top 3 (November and December)

- Local Authority Waste Management Advisory Committee (LAWMAC): Hosted by Townsville City Council and attended by Cr Grundy and David de Jager (Waste Manager) on 20-21 November 2020.
- Cannonvale transfer station upgrade:
  - A number of improvements to the Resource recovery area were made with the following outcomes in mind:
    - New signage to facilitate correct placement and management of recyclables.
    - Reinstatement of hardstand area for safe placement of recyclables and preparation for confirmed La Nina event.
    - Increased awareness of available waste recovery services to increase volumes recovered.
    - Limit the number of areas for drop-off of recyclables to ensure greater level of convenience for facility users.



 Successful application for grant funding under the 2020-2021 Local Government Levy Ready Grant Program to the value of \$134,564.65. Funding will facilitate the transition for the closure of the current Mt. Coolon Landfill Facility by 30 June 2021 and establish

- a new Waste Transfer Station to ensure compliance with the Waste Reduction and Recycling Act 2011.
- Development of Request for Tender Documentation underway to procure management services for the Cannonvale Waste Transfer Station to replace the current contract which expires on 30 June 2021.
- Development of Request for Tender Documentation completed for advertising on 13
  January 2021 to procure kerbside Waste and Recycling Collection Services to replace
  the current contract which expires on 30 June 2021. The contract will be a short-term
  contract with the option to align the term with the Mackay Regional Council's contract
  and develop a potential joint tender for future years, if the regional approach is deemed
  beneficial after analysis undertaken.

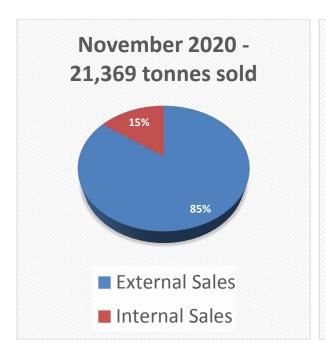
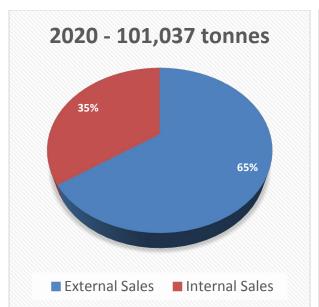




Fig 1. Overall Quarry sales for the month of November 2020 in Comparison to November 2019.

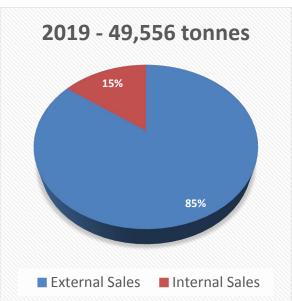


Fig 2. Graphs of overall Quarry sales for the financial year 2020 in Comparison to FY 2019

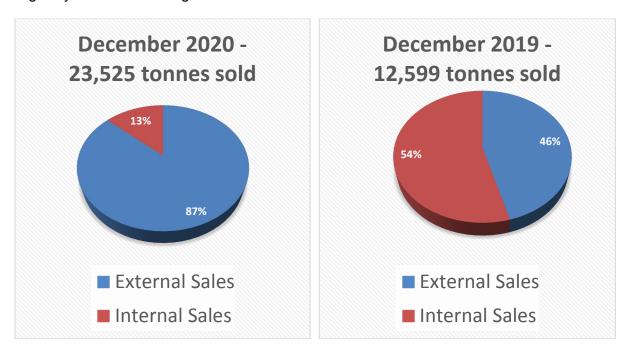


Fig 1. Overall Quarry sales for the month of December 2020 in Comparison to December 2019.

In comparison to this time last year, internal sales of material have decreased significantly. External sales are well above average.

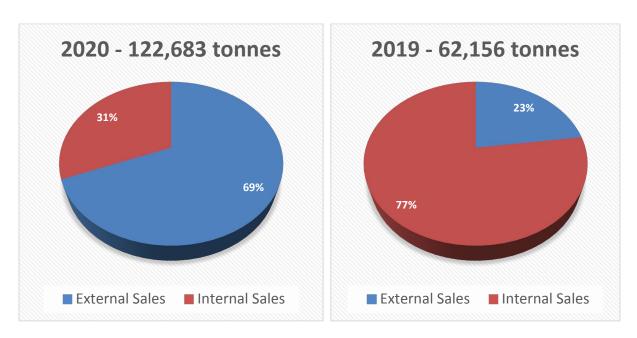


Fig 2. Graphs of overall Quarry sales for the financial year 2020 in Comparison to FY 2019

# Crusher

The crushing plant performed very well during the month of December and only one day was lost to maintenance. The following maintenance was undertaken:

- The Tips and liners of the vertical shaft impactor were changed,
- The swing jaw liner was rotated,
- Shutes in main screen tower were relined with benox plate.
- Repairs were undertaken on fatigue cracks in the main feed hopper.
- · Service and washout.

# **Mobile Plant**

Komatsu WA480 Loader – performed well during the month with minimal lost time.

Komatsu WA 470 Loader – This front-end loader was sold during December through auction and has now left the guarry.

Hitachi ZX350 Excavator – Performed poorly as seals on a number of hydraulic pipe fittings failed. The machine air conditioner failed, and it is now parked up awaiting repair. The machine was advertised on auction but did not meet its reserve and will be auctioned again.

A tender to contract-hire the quarry core fleet externally has gone to market and submissions received.

# 16.7 FOXDALE QUARRY - PURCHASE OF PUGMILL

**AUTHOR:** Quentin Prince – Quarry Manager

**RESPONSIBLE OFFICER:** Matthew Fanning – Director Infrastructure Services

### OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council invite tenders for the supply and installation of a Pugmill for the Foxdale Quarry to facilitate the supply of market demand materials currently not available with the existing plant and equipment configuration.

Furthermore, that the purchase for the pugmill be considered in the upcoming Budget Review 2.

The following report has been submitted for inclusion into Council's Ordinary Meeting to be held on 27 January 2021.

### **SUMMARY**

For some time, it has been anticipated that the Council would invest in a Pugmill for the Foxdale quarry to open new market opportunities currently not realised due to the limited current plant and equipment. This report recommends that the Council seek tenders for the supply and delivery of a Pugmill for the Foxdale Quarry and that the purchase be drawn from current reserves.

#### **PURPOSE**

The purpose of this report is to propose the purchase of a Pugmill for the Foxdale Quarry in order to expand on the product selection available and to move with current market expectations for the supply of OMC material for road pavement layer construction.

# **BACKGROUND**

In April 2020 Council undertook an internal review of the Foxdale Quarry's Business Plan 2017 – 2021 (Business Plan). The outputs of this review highlighted a number of recommeded actions of which the purchase of a quarry pugmill was supported.

ELT supported the implementation of the recommended actions outlined in the quarry Briefing Report. The outputs of this review included:

 A capex bid to be submitted for 2021-22 FY to purchase a Pug Mill including business case.

Given the nature of the investment, it has been considered that this purchase be funded from the current financial year through reserve funding, to prepare for future business opportunities that may occur in the short term, acknowldeing the lead time for the procurement.

### STATUTORY/COMPLIANCE MATTERS

Local Government Act 2009 S227 & S228 Local Government Regulation 2012

The procurement process will be conducted in accordance with Council's policy and legislative obligations.

### **ANALYSIS - BUSINESS CASE**

# **Description of a Pugmill**

A Pug Mill is a wheel or skid mounted machine that adds water into road base material at the Quarry and brings the material to optimum moisture content. The pugged material can then be spread and compacted at the customer's construction site without the need for additional water supplied by a water truck thereby significantly reducing construction time and costs for the customer. The addition of a cement additive bin to the pugmill can also enhance its capability to add and mix cement or other additives into road base materials for increased material strength and durability. Currently the Quarry does not own a pugmill to service this market.



# **Current Situation**

As the quarry does not own a pugmill, the following situation occurs when Pugged materials are required:

- A project volume below 20,000 tonnes when a prospective customer enquires about the supply of pugged material for projects under 20,000 tonnes the customer is provided a quotation that states the Quarry is unable to supply pugging services as a Pug Mill is not available on site.
- A project volume greater than 20,000 tonnes the Quarry provides a quotation including a weekly hire charge for a Pug Mill with stipulations the contractor will be liable for all the hire and running charges incurred.
- Negotiated arrangements for Large projects, the Quarry has negotiated arrangements whereby the contractor can install their own Pug Mill on the Quarry site.
   The Pug Mill is then operated by the contractor and Quarry staff at no additional cost to the contractor.

# **Commercial Opportunity and Revenue**

During the period of December 2018 to December 2019 the Quarry was requested to quote on projects requiring a total of 49,535 tonnes of pug milled road base. The quarry was unable to secure the contracts. Table 1 below lists the projects that required pug milled materials. It would be incorrect to believe that the quarry would be successful in winning all the contracts

if the Foxdale Quarry business owned a pugmill as the quarry faces local competitors and customers have their own loyalties and preferences.

However, If the Quarry owned a Pug Mill and were successful in the sale of 50% of the road base material quoted on in 2018-19, this would have resulted in an additional estimated revenue of \$524,327.97 in road base sales for the quarry.

These figures are significantly less than that of the current year's production and sales even without the pugmill which has resulted in the Quarry not being in a position to tender on several large works.

There are significant works to be tendered in the coming years on the Bruce Highway and Shute Harbour roads. The Council in order to capitalise on these projects will need to be in a position to supply the products required under these contracts all of which will generally require OMC controlled materials.

Below is a table of quantities required for projects currently being tendered by TMR which are in a 35km radius of Foxdale Quarry. In total the projects require a possible 128,443 tonnes of pug milled road base materials.

Overall, the tendered projects will require 230,339 tonnes of road base inclusive of pug milled material. At current materials sales value, the potential total road base material supply and sales is valued at approximately \$5.4M.

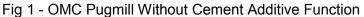

# **Configuration Options**

# Option 1 - OMC only configuration

There are several different applications for a pugmill, but the most common is utilising a pugmill to add precise percentages of water to road base material in order to bring the material to optimum moisture content (OMC). The pugmill configuration utilised to achieve is function is the most basic pugmill and requires few controls. This pugmill is therefore the lowest cost option to purchase in the order of \$250,000 to \$300,000.







# Option 2 - OMC and Cement - computer controlled

The second configuration of pugmill contains a PLC with a small cement additive bin. This pugmill allows for cement stabilised road base production in small quantities. The pugmill can undertake large OMC projects but will also allow the quarry to provide a limited amount of cement stabilised materials when required.

In the event a large contract for cement stabilised material is won, a cement ISO tanker can be hired from a supplier such as Cement Australia Pty Ltd or Wagner to store and provide the additional cement requirements.

This type of configuration costs in the order of \$350,000 to \$400,000.



Option 3 – complete automated cement stabilising Pugmill

The third option is a complete cement stabilising pugmill with load cells, PLC and cement additive silo which will undertake very large road construction contracts for both OMC and CTB material requirements. The Pugmill incorporates, belt scales, load cells on the cement silo storage, water flow meters, with all these functions being controlled by the PLC. The operator can pre-program the required cement and water percentages into the PLC and the pugmill will automatically pug material to the required design.

Pugmill price with the above features is \$400,000 to \$450,000 + silage for cement

# STRATEGIC IMPACTS

Reputation – The Foxdale Quarry in increasingly becoming known for its supply of very consistent and fully compliant product especially for work requiring high order specs such as the Bruce highway works.

# Financial – Cost Recovery basis

The percentage profit recovered from each tonne of road base sold is 10% at current up to 130,000 tonne per annum and ~40% over and above this quantity. Given the potential demand as shown above there is potential to recover the costs for this investment over time.

# **CONCLUSION**

It is recommended that the Council seek tender for a mid-range Pugmill as demonstrated in **Option 2** - The OMC / CTB pugmill without Silo - \$350,000 to \$400,000. This configuration allows the quarry to provide customers with OMC material in bulk and has the flexibility to addition cement when required without having to purchase the cement silo, compressor and additional equipment.

General maintenance activities carried out on Council's road network over the course of November and December were largely routine in nature including road inspections, pothole patching, grading and signage repairs.

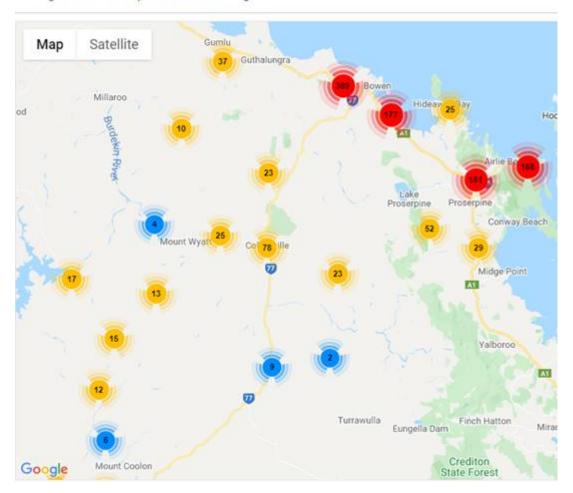
The Roads & Drainage Maintenance budget for FY2021 after Q1 review is set at \$7,360,372 spread over the following activity groups respectively, unsealed roads, vegetation, sealed roads, operations, road furniture, management, pathways, training, bridges & structure, kerb & channel.

At the end of December there were 1,374 identified defects on the local road network remain with 605 defects being rectified (accomplished) during the months of November and December. Table 1 provides specific details of the activities undertaken during the period.

Plot 1: Current known active defects on WRC Road Network

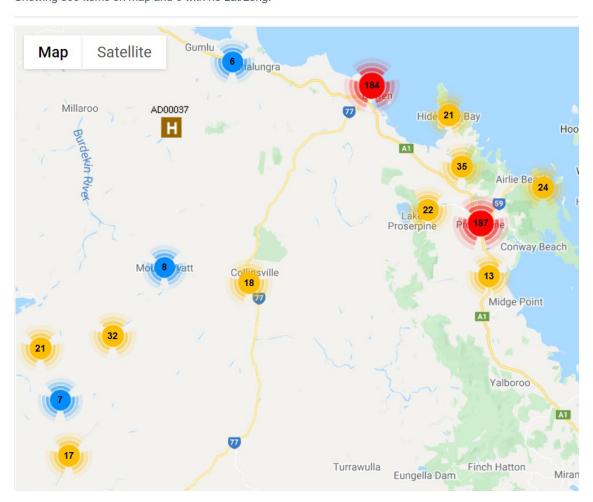




Plot 2: Total expenditure against overall budget for Roads & Drainage maintenance.

# Maintenance Management System (MMS) for Local Roads

Full acceptance testing of the REFLECT software has been completed and the teams are using the system across the local road network. Work is continuing to ensure both the defect backlog data and task accomplishment information is accurate. Ongoing training and mentoring is being provided to teams to improve validity of the reporting being generated.

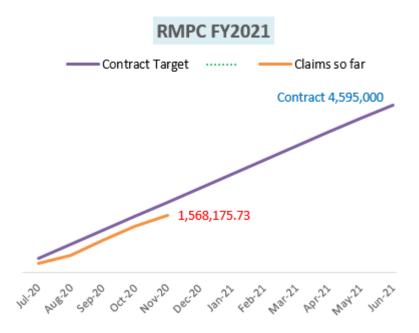


## Road Maintenance Performance Contract (RMPC) with TMR

Council continues to undertake routine maintenance on the National & State Highways within the Whitsunday Region as well as 2 roads in a neighbouring region. These works have a total contract value for the 2020-2021 FY of \$4,595,000. This is an increase from the previous years starting contract value of \$4,416,000.

Officers have had discussions with senior TMR staff regarding the identified concerns in the Mt Coolon area and the likelihood that a different approach to maintenance of the unsealed roads in this area will be needed than what has worked in previous years. At this stage the direction from TMR is to schedule additional maintenance grading as appropriate and to continue to monitor. Currently there are 3 (1 x Council and 2 x Contract) Grader Teams working on roads in the Mt Coolon area and we continue to monitor the situation to see if this level of resourcing can deliver the required expectations.

The total valued claimed for the year to date is \$1,568,175.73 which is slightly below the projected target of \$4,595,000.



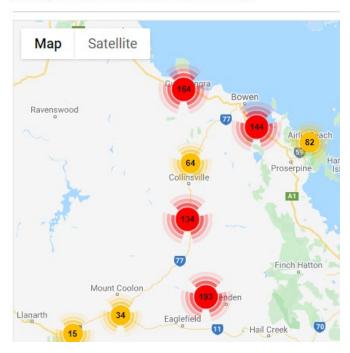

## **DEFECTS MAP VIEW**

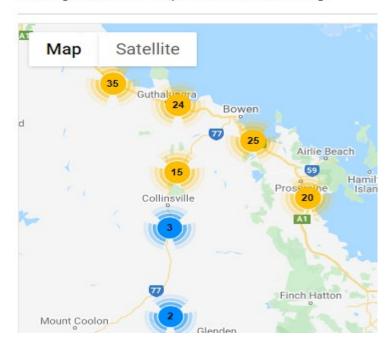
