Dear Ms Campbell,

RE: Response to Concerns About the Poisoned Ficus Tree at Cannonvale Beach

Thank you for your correspondence regarding the deliberate poisoning of the mature Ficus tree at Cannonvale Beach. We share your concern about this act of environmental vandalism and appreciate your suggestions on how to address and prevent such incidents.

I advise that your correspondence was advised to Whitsunday Regional Council at its Ordinary Meeting 29 May 2024 as a Question from the Public Gallery. Council has requested a response be provided to you.

The removal of the poisoned Ficus tree is scheduled for mid-June 2024, following the necessary approvals from Ergon due to the tree's proximity to power lines. After the removal, we will replant a new Ficus a few meters back from the original site. We are currently sourcing a semi-established tree that is between 3 to 5 meters tall to ensure the area continues to benefit from the shade and beauty provided by this species.

As per Whitsunday Regional Council Local Law 4 (Local Government Control Land and Facilities), it is an offense to damage vegetation. The Council is committed to investigating such offenses and gathering evidence where possible. While identifying offenders is often challenging, we have issued fines in the past when sufficient evidence was available.

We are aware that other councils implement visual barriers as a deterrent against the poisoning or damage of public trees. However, Whitsunday Regional Council does not currently have a policy to install visual barriers. Your suggestion to adopt similar procedures, like those of the Mackay Regional Council's Tree & Vegetation Management Policy, is noted and will be considered in our ongoing efforts to protect public vegetation.

The challenge with managing these incidents is often the impact on innocent parties. This location would be challenging given the block of units and residential properties that would be affected.

Concerning the CCTV network servicing the Cannonvale foreshore, the cameras are operated through the Cannonvale VMR building, which has recently undergone significant renovation works.

Although the cameras were renewed as part of the boardwalk project, reconnecting our service depends on finalising the cable connection at the VMR. The final step requires the use of a scissor lift, but this has been delayed due to wet ground conditions. We hope to get enough dry weather soon so the work can be completed, and the network will be restored.

PURPOSE

To present the assessment of the development application for Veterinary Services at 52 Main Street Proserpine and 56 Main Street Proserpine and to seek Council's determination.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The application is for a Material Change of Use for Veterinary Services within an existing two-storey office building at 52 Main Street, Proserpine. The premises is zoned Major centre, and the proposed development is consistent with the purpose of the zone.

The development will provide on-site and mobile based veterinary services, whilst having a maximum of three (3) staff and two (2) customers on-site at any one time. The proposal does not provide the required on-site parking spaces that is triggered by the Planning Scheme. The development has a shortfall of three (3) on-site car parking spaces when accepting the car parking assessments provided by the applicant. To justify the shortfall in parking, the applicant has provided a parking study that assesses the availability of parking within walking distance of the site.

In accepting the parking assessment provided by the applicant, the proposal complies with the Planning Scheme and is recommended for approval in accordance with the drawings and documents submitted, subject to reasonable and relevant conditions.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council approve the Development Application for Development Permit for Material Change of Use - Veterinary Services, made by Mansfield Farming Pty Ltd As TTE, on L: 1 RP: 718930 T: N0639/150, L: 21 RP: 908795 T: 50179988 and located at 52 Main Street Proserpine, 56 Main Street Proserpine, subject to the conditions outlined in **Attachment 2**.

BACKGROUND

The site was initially the old Commonwealth Bank building temporarily used by Council as an office after Cyclone Debbie. The building is currently vacant.

DISCUSSION/CURRENT ISSUE

This application is code assessable against the Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme 2017.

The proposal complies with the Major centre zone code. The zone allows for the intensification of Business activities such as the veterinary services in supporting the hierarchy of centres. The development and its operations are small in scale and intensity.

There is an existing carport at the rear of the building for two (2) cars. The development will have a maximum of three (3) staff on-site at any one time and two (2) customers at any one time except for unplanned emergency visits.

The applicant is proposing the use of the existing two (2) covered car parking spaces at the rear of the building and one (1) tandem parking space for a service vehicle. It is accepted that there is a shortfall of on-site car parking spaces required by the Transport and Parking Code (10).

A parking demand study was conducted by the applicant to determine whether sufficient parking exists within the vicinity to cater for the development. This study was done between 8am to 6pm at two (2) hour intervals, between Monday to Friday (18/09/2023 – 22/09/2023). Based on the findings, there is sufficient parking available in the location for the existing and proposed uses for the following reasons:

- There are approximately 179 parking spaces within the walking distance.
- Only one parking area (Dobbins Lane public car park) on a Wednesday between 10am and 12pm reached maximum capacity, with capacity from 12pm onwards.
- Public and on-street parking areas had sufficient capacity to cater for the development.
- The applicant intends to make the mobile aspect of the veterinary services most desirable to reduce the need for on-site attendance.

The proposal is recommended for approval as there is sufficient car parking available in the area to meet needs of the current and proposed uses.

2. Site Description

The development is located within an existing two-storey office building where the Gross Floor Area (GFA) is 350m².

Adjoining property 56 Main Street provides access to the rear of the subject site via Easements H and G.

The site was initially the old Commonwealth Bank building, temporarily used by Council as an office after Cyclone Debbie. Currently, the building is vacant. The building has direct frontage to Main Street and has a rear parking area that gains access from Dobbins Lane. An undercover area exists for parking at the rear of the building.

3. Proposal Details

The proposed development is for a Veterinary Practice. There will be a maximum of three (3) staff and two (2) customers at any one time. The intent of the practice is to offer mobile services primarily as well as on-site services when required.

The development cannot achieve the required number of parking spaces on-site in accordance with the Planning Scheme. The applicant's performance solution to address

the non-compliance is provided through a parking analysis of the surrounding public parking areas which suggests together with the two (2) proposed on-site car parks and one (1) service vehicle space, there is sufficient car parking available in the area to support the proposed development without impacting existing surrounding uses. The additional parking is in the surrounding Main Street public car parking areas which are not anticipated to be at maximum capacity at the expected peak hours of the proposed development.

4. Planning Assessment

The application has been assessed against the relevant provisions of the *Planning Act, 2016* and the *Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme, 2017*. The proposal is generally in accordance with the Planning Scheme and is recommended for approval in accordance with the drawings and documents submitted, subject to reasonable and relevant conditions (Attachment 1).

4.1. State Assessment and Referral Agency (SARA)

The application was referred to State Assessment Referral Agency (SARA) due to the location of the site being within 25m of a State Transport Corridor.

No conditions have been recommended by SARA.

4.2. State Planning Policy – July 2017

The State Planning Policy (SPP) includes interim development assessment requirements to ensure that State interests are appropriately considered by local government when assessing development applications where the local government Planning Scheme is appropriately integrated all the State's interests in the SPP. The most recent SPP has been reflected in the Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme, in particular Part 2 of State Planning Provisions.

4.3. Mackay Isaac and Whitsunday Regional Plan – February 2012

The Mackay, Isaac and Whitsunday Regional Plan is not applicable in Code Assessable development.

4.4. Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme, 2017

4.4.1. Strategic Framework

The Strategic Framework is not applicable in Code Assessable development.

4.4.2. Overlay Codes

Acid Sulfate Soils Overlay

No earthworks are proposed and therefore the overlay is not applicable.

Airport Environs Overlay

The development does not encroach into the airport's operational airspace. The development is also not associated with increases in wildlife strikes and hazards. The development complies with the overlay.

Infrastructure Overlay - Transport and Utility Infrastructure

The building is existing and any changes to the internal layout can be dealt at building works stage. The development is not a sensitive use that involves accommodation activity and therefore the development complies with the overlay.

4.4.3. Zone Code

Major Centre Zone

The proposed development is consistent with the purpose and overall outcomes of the zone. The zone allows for the intensification of Business activities such as the veterinary services in supporting the hierarchy of centres. The development is small in scale and intensity, considering the operations involve three (3) staff and a maximum of two (2) customers at the veterinary services at any one time.

Minor external building works are proposed however the building will remain compatible with the existing scale and character along Main Street. The development is supported by the existing pedestrian and vehicle networks of Main Street, Chapman Street and Dobbins Lane to access the site. There is a bus station located at Mill Street.

The proposal meets the necessary benchmarks of the zone and where necessary conditions of approval can be applied to protect the amenity of adjoining land uses.

4.4.4. Development Codes

Business activities code

The double-storey building is existing, with frontage to Main Street and encourages the continuous edge with adjoining commercial businesses. The main pedestrian entrance to the building is located facing onto Main Street where an existing awning provides adequate shelter for pedestrian access. An awning exists at the rear for customer access from the car park on Dobbins Lane. The car parking area at the rear of the property is accessed via the Dobbins Lane. The proposal complies with the code.

Infrastructure code

The

site is connected to reticulated water and sewer services. A plumbing and/or trade waste application may be required for changes to the internal drainage arrangements.

Landscaping code

It is not considered practical to condition the developer to provide additional landscaping on a constrained site. This is consistent with other commercial premises close by.

Transport and parking code

The development has an approximate Total Use Area (TUA) of 297m2 and triggers a total on-site parking requirement of 12 carparks and one (1) service vehicle space in accordance with Table 9.4.8.3.3 Minimum on-site parking requirements.

Existing Parking Arrangement

There is a carport at the rear of the building for two (2) cars.

Proposed Parking

Due to the proposed mobile veterinary services being offered, the applicant proposes the veterinary practice will generate a maximum demand of on-site parking spaces for five (5) cars and one (1) service vehicle. However, according to the supplied Car Parking Management Plan, use of mobile veterinary services is encouraged to the public, and therefore the need for additional parking is reduced.

The applicant has proposed one (1) tandem parking space for a service vehicle within the property boundary.

The applicant has undertaken a parking study to assess all available nearby car public parking areas and on-street parking areas to determine whether sufficient parking exists within the vicinity of the site to cater for the shortfall in on-site parking. The study also looked at the demand of these spaces and when they were utilised most.

The study was undertaken between 8am to 6pm at two (2) hour intervals, between Monday to Friday (18/09/2023 - 22/09/2023). The locations of the study include the IGA car park, Council owned car park, both sides of Mill Street, both sides of Main Street from the intersection of Mill Street down to the Reef Catchments building and Dobbins Lane car park.

The results of the study show have identified 179 parking spaces within the walking distance to the development. Generally, the parking areas do not reach its maximum capacity at any time during the week. The highest demand during business hours of 10am to 2pm, while the lowest utilisation was between 8am and 10am in the morning and between 4pm and 8pm in the evening. However, it was recorded that the nearby public car park on Dobbins Lane reached maximum capacity on a Wednesday between 10am to 12pm. This car park contains 53 parking spaces and was recorded to be filled, however additional parking availability was found in other nearby areas at the same time. Overall, surplus spaces exist in the area.

Based on the findings of the applicant's parking analysis, it is accepted that sufficient parking is available for users of the veterinary practice, without detrimentally impacting the parking available for surrounding land uses. Therefore, the proposal achieves compliance with the Overall Outcomes of the code.

- 1.2 The applicant is to comply with the Department of State Development, Manufacturing, Infrastructure and Planning's conditions as outlined in the Department's correspondence dated 28 March 2024.
- 1.3 The following further development permits are required prior to commencement of work on site or commencement of the use:
 - · Plumbing and Drainage Works; and
 - · Building Works.

All Plumbing and Drainage Works Development Permits must be obtained prior to the issue of a Building Works Development Permit.

- 1.4 Where a discrepancy or conflict exists between the written conditions of this approval and the approved plans, the requirements of the written condition(s) will prevail.
- 1.5 All conditions of this approval must be complied with in full to Council's satisfaction prior to the commencement of the use.
- 1.6 The applicant shall demonstrate and provide evidence that compliance with all conditions of this development approval and any other subsequent development approvals as a result of this development approval have been complied with prior to the commencement of the use.

2. CLEARING, LANDSCAPING AND FENCING

- 2.1 Any vegetation removed must be disposed of to the requirements of the Council. Transplanting, chipping or removal from site are the preferred solutions.
- 2.2 All vegetative waste cleared as part of the development of the site is to be either:
 - a) stored neatly on site and shredded within sixty (60) days of clearing; or
 - b) removed off the site to an approved disposal location.

3. BUILDING

- 3.1 Building and landscaping materials are not to be highly reflective, or likely to create glare, or slippery or otherwise hazardous conditions.
- 3.2 Buildings are to be finished with external building materials and colours to reduce scale and bulk.

4. WATER INFRASTRUCTURE

4.1 The development must be connected to Council's water supply network using the existing water main located in Main Street, Proserpine. The water service connection must be sized appropriately for the use. Any upgrading works must be completed by the developer at their full cost prior to commencement of the use.

5. <u>SEWERAGE INFRASTRUCTURE</u>

5.1 The development must be connected to Council's sewerage reticulation network, using the existing sewer main prior to commencement of the use. Any upgrading works to the existing sewer must be completed by the developer at their full cost prior to commencement of the use.

6. ACCESS AND PARKING

- 6.1 The applicant must provide and maintain the existing external access from the pavement of Dobbins Lane through the existing access easement to the property boundary of Lot 1 to a sealed standard so as to comply as a minimum with the levels, dimensions and specifications as shown on Councils Standard Drawings RS-049 and RS-051 prior to the commencement of the use.
- 6.2 A minimum of two (2) car parking spaces and one (1) SRV parking space must be provided on site prior to commencement of the use.

7. ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT PLAN (EMP)

- 7.1 Discharges of water pollutants, wastewater or stormwater from the site must not cause measurable levels of water pollutants in the receiving waters to fall outside the acceptable ranges specified in the 'Australian Water Quality Guidelines for Fresh and Marine Waters', ANZECC 2000.
- 7.2 No visible emissions of dust must occur beyond the boundaries of the site during earthworks and construction activities on the site. If, at any time during the earthworks and construction activities the dust emissions exceed the levels specified above, all dust generating activities must cease until the corrective actions have been implemented to reduce dust emissions to acceptable levels or wind conditions are such that acceptable levels are achieved.
- 7.3 The applicant must ensure that when undertaking any on-site or external works, including any filling and extraction, appropriate dust control measures are implemented in accordance with the Environmental Protection Act 1994 and complies with the relevant air quality objectives defined in the Environmental Protection (Air) Policy 2008.

8. OPERATING PROCEDURES

- 8.1 No more than three (3) staff and two (2) customers are to attend the veterinary services at any one time except for unplanned emergency visits.
- 8.2 All activities relating to the veterinary services are to be undertaken in accordance with the approved Car Parking Management Plan.

9. MISCELLANEOUS

9.1 If any item of cultural heritage is identified during site works, all work must cease and the relevant State Agency must be notified. Work can resume only after State Agency clearance is obtained.

The Applicant is reminded of their obligations under the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act, 2003 and the Torres Strait Islander Cultural Heritage Act 2003. Further information and

- 9.2 Any alteration necessary to electricity, telephone, water mains, sewerage mains, and/or public utility installations resulting from the development or in connection with the development, must be at full cost to the developer.
- 9.3 Any building materials, equipment and the like must be appropriately tied down, placed indoors and secured on site at the time of preparation for cyclone events. The on site supervisor is to ensure that all contractors/employees take the necessary steps to secure the construction site in the event of a cyclone.
- 9.4 All construction materials, waste, waste skips, machinery and contractors' vehicles must be located and stored or parked within the site. No storage of materials, parking of construction machinery or contractors' vehicles will be permitted in Main Street or Dobbins Lane or adjoining land unless written permission from the owner of that land and Council is provided.
- 9.5 It is the developer's responsibility for the full rectification of any damage caused to neighbouring public infrastructure (such as footpaths, driveways, fences, gardens, trees and the like) caused by contractors, including clean up of any litter or waste that is a result of the subject development.

10. ADVISORY NOTES

10.1 Hours of work

It is the developer's responsibility to ensure compliance with the Environmental Protection Act 1994, which prohibits any construction, building and earthworks activities likely to cause nuisance noise (including the entry and departure of heavy vehicles) between the hours of 6.30 pm and 6.30 am from Monday to Saturday and at all times on Sundays or Public Holidays.

10.2 Dust Control

It is the developer's responsibility to ensure compliance with the Environmental Nuisance of the Environmental Protection Act 1994 which prohibits unlawful environmental nuisance caused by dust, ash, fumes, light, odour or smoke beyond the boundaries of the property during all stages of the development including earthworks and construction.

10.3 Sedimentation Control

It is the developer's responsibility to ensure compliance with the Environmental Protection Act 1994 and Schedule 9 of the Environmental Protection Regulation 2008 to prevent soil erosion and contamination of the stormwater drainage system and waterways.

10.4 Noise During Construction and Noise in General

It is the developer's responsibility to ensure compliance with the Environmental Protection Act 1994.

10.5 General Safety of Public During Construction

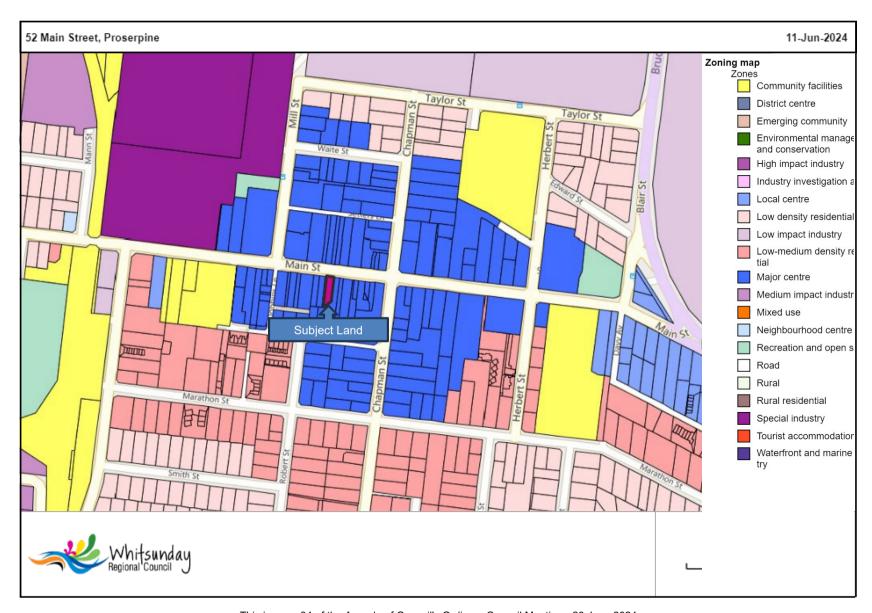

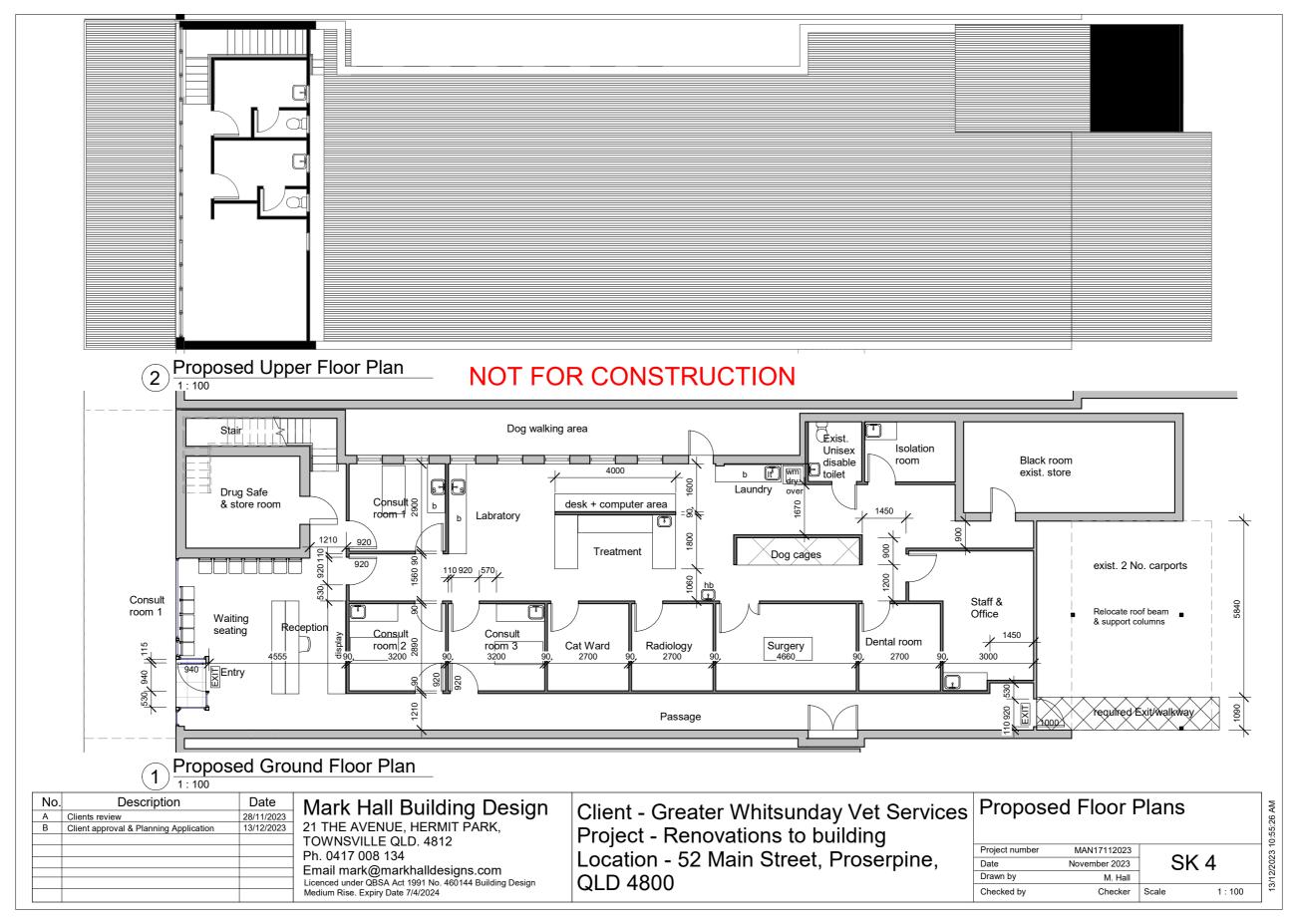

PURPOSE

To present the assessment of the request to extend the Development Permit and to seek Council's determination.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The applicant has requested a twelve (12) month extension to a reconfiguration of a lot permit. The applicant has taken steps to complete the development, with a development permit for the related operational works being approved on 4 June 2024. Based on the applicant's representations, the development will likely proceed should an additional twelve (12) month extension be granted. On this basis, the request is recommended for approval.

The development is considered to achieve consistency with Council's adopted Extension of Time policy in that a related Operational Works application has been lodged and approved.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council approve the request for an extension of the currency period of the Development Permit for Reconfiguration of a Lot - One (1) Lot into Six (6) Lots, made by Deloma Pty Ltd, on L: 5 RP: 738979 T: N1207/239 and located at Allan Road Conway Beach, to **1 July 2025**.

BACKGROUND

The development has previously received an extension of currency period to 1 July 2024 via officer delegation in accordance with the *Requests for Extension of Time – Development Permits Policy*. A full list of all approvals and relevant timeframes, including the Ministerial COVID-19 extensions, can be found in **Attachment 2**.

In the recent Planning Scheme major amendment to v4.7, Council approved (Resolution Number: 12.4 2018/03/14.12) the future rezoning of the smaller lots to Rural Residential while the zoning of the larger lot remains Rural which reflects the subdivision approval. The rezoning that has occurred does not conflict with the Regional Plan, compromise good quality agricultural land, future urban growth land, or infrastructure servicing to the site.

DISCUSSION/CURRENT ISSUE

This application is assessed against the *Extension of Time – Development Permits Policy*, submitted under Section 86 of the *Planning Act 2016*.

The development is required to lodge a subsequent Operational Works application. The Operational Works application (Council ref: 20231258) associated with this Development Permit was approved on 4 June 2024. The applicant has undertaken a detailed survey for the proposal and completed the proposed Survey Plan for the development.

A detailed assessment of the request is provided in **Attachment 1**.

2. Site Description

The subject land is surrounded by mix of rural and rural residential allotments with protected forests to the North and East.

3. Proposal Details

The applicant requested an extension of the currency period until 1 July 2025 - a period of twelve (12) months.

The approval is required to remain current to enable the applicant to complete outstanding components of the development permit, including completing the approved development permit for Operational Works associated with the construction of the external access driveways.

4. Planning Assessment

The application has been assessed against the *Requests for Extension of Time – Development Permits Policy*. As the request is for the third extension of the currency period the request cannot be decided via delegation as per the policy.

4.1. Approval History

The Planning and Environment (P&E) Court issued a Court Order on 1 April 2016 and approved a development application for Reconfiguring a Lot for One (1) Into Six (6) Lots subject to conditions.

Most recently on 9 October 2023, Council approved a second extension whereby a short extension was requested. The approval complied with Council's *Extension of Time – Development Permits Policy* and therefore the currency period was extended from 21 April 2024 to 1 July 2024. A full list of all approvals and relevant timeframes, including the Ministerial COVID-19 extensions, can be found in Attachment 2.

4.2. Requests for Extension of Time - Development Permits Policy

The applicant has advised of delays due to competing demand for relevant contractors and service providers.

The policy requires for a third extension, the lodgement of a relevant operational works application as required under the conditions of approval of the permit. Council's records detail that a development application for development permit for Operational Works (Council Ref: 20231258) associated with the approved ROL was approved on 4 June 2024. Additionally, the applicant has undertaken a detailed survey and preparation of the proposed Survey Plan.

The applicant has therefore demonstrated continued efforts to undertake the development.

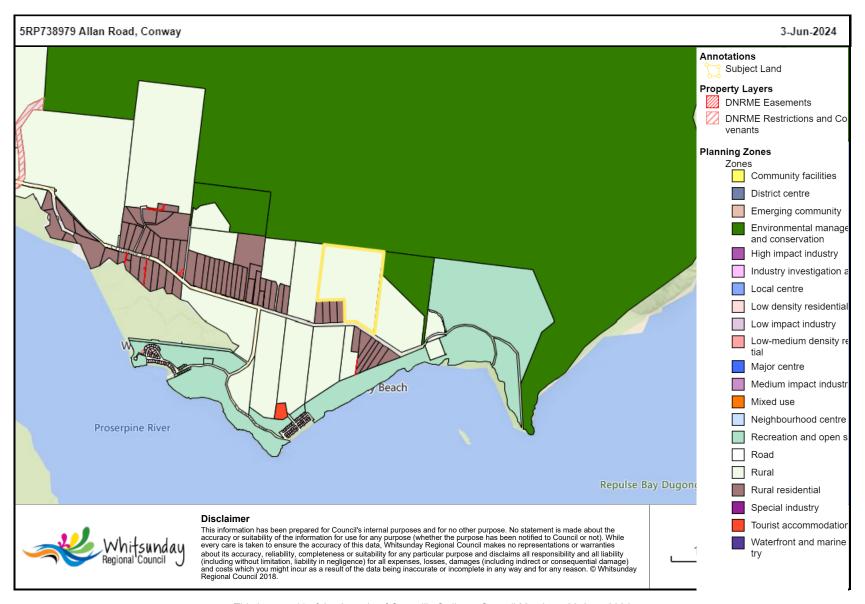

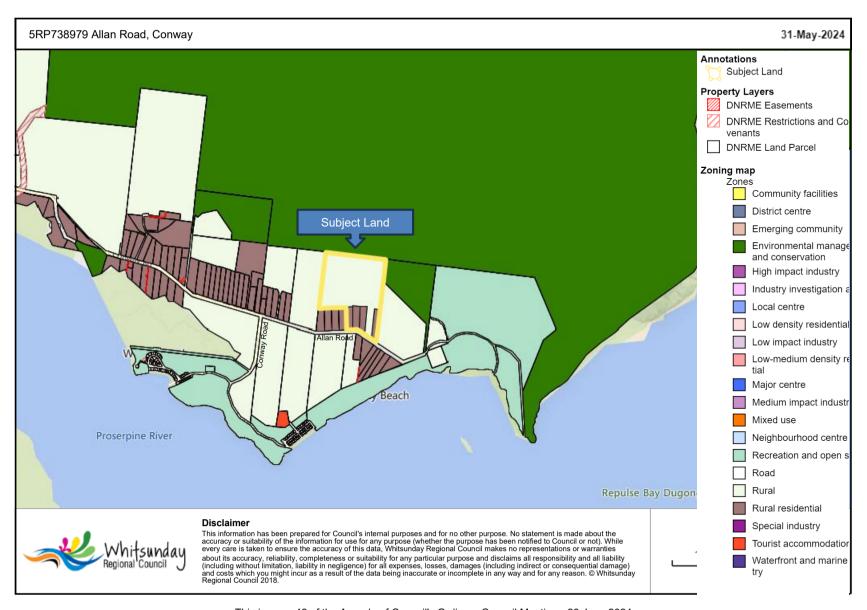

PURPOSE

To present the assessment of the development application for a short-term accommodation at 22A Rattray Avenue, Hydeaway Bay, and to seek Council's determination.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The application is for the Short-Term Accommodation (STA) of an existing one-storey residence at 22A Rattray Avenue, Hydeaway Bay. The dwelling has 3 bedrooms and provides 2 car parks and 1 boat parking space underneath the house. The premises is zoned Low density residential. Rainwater tanks and an effluent disposal system are available on-site and sized appropriately.

There are twenty-six properties with approval from Council to undertake STA within Hydeaway Bay as shown in the map in **Attachment 3**.

No physical changes to the existing dwelling house are proposed which means the proposal will not result in a change to the visual character and amenity of the streetscape.

To address the potential for the development to cause undesirable amenity impacts, standard conditions of approval have been recommended, including appointing a property manager to be available 24/7. A maximum of six persons will be permitted to stay at the premises at any one time.

One submission was received during the public notification period. The submission centres around the noise and light that emanates down on the immediate neighbourhood. There is also a concern on the potential to have more guests than what is permitted due to the size of the dwelling house. The submitter is a resident along Rattray Avenue.

The Planning Scheme does provide for the STA use of a property in the Low-density residential zone provided it is compatible with the character and amenity of the area. Compatibility is achieved as no physical alterations to the house are proposed besides the addition of the property management sign, and appropriate conditions of approval are recommended to mitigate any potential amenity impact. A condition of approval is recommended limiting the number of bedrooms used to three with a maximum of six persons permitted to stay at the property (two per bedroom).

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council approve the Development Application for Development Permit for Material Change of Use – Short-Term Accommodation, made by M & S Robinson, on L:10 SP:184795 and located at 22A Rattray Avenue, Hydeaway Bay, subject to conditions outlined in **Attachment 2**.

BACKGROUND

The application is not a response to any compliance actions.

DISCUSSION/CURRENT ISSUE

The application is assessable against the Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme 2017, including the Strategic Framework and relevant codes.

The purpose and overall outcomes of the zone provide for 'other accommodation activities', in this case short-term accommodation, being established within the zone where compatible with the prevailing residential character and amenity of the zone.

No physical changes to the existing dwelling house are proposed which means the proposal will not result in a change to the visual character and amenity of the streetscape. To address the potential for the development to cause undesirable amenity impacts suitable conditions of approval have been recommended. Importantly, the approved use shall not be run as a party-house and strict noise and operating conditions monitored by a property manager 24/7 are suggested.

Therefore, the proposal complies with the Low-density residential zone code.

The proposal complies with the other applicable requirements of the Planning Scheme including the short-term accommodation and multi-unit uses code and Transport and parking code as the required number of car parks are provided.

A detailed assessment of the four submissions and assessment benchmarks is provided in **Attachment 1**.

The application fee has been paid in full. The development does not incur an infrastructure charge.

2. Site Description

Rattray Avenue is a road in Hydeaway Bay where residential properties are situated on a slope that predominately falls towards Hydeaway Beach. The site has been developed for a residential dwelling and includes a shared driveway access with other sites in a body corporate arrangement. Access to the premises is achieved via a fully sealed concrete driveway to an access easement connecting to Rattray Avenue. Uses within the general area include houses and other short-term accommodation premises.

3. Proposal Details

The proposal is for the STA of an existing three-bedroom dwelling house.

Carparking is provided underneath the house for two cars and a boat. The driveway also has additional space for carparking as shown on the Site Plan.

The applicant has provided documentation demonstrating compliance with the STA Guideline, being a Code of Conduct, Property Management Plan, Statutory Declaration and Fire and Evacuation Plan for the proposed use.

One submission was received during the Public Notification Period, from the neighbouring property 20 Rattray Avenue, and is considered a properly made submission. Section 5 of this report contains the Submission Analysis.

4. Planning Assessment

The application has been assessed against the relevant provisions of the *Planning Act, 2016* and the *Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme, 2017*. The proposal generally in accordance with the Planning Scheme and is recommended for approval in accordance with the drawings and documents submitted, subject to reasonable and relevant conditions (Attachment 1).

4.1. State Assessment and Referral Agency (SARA)

The Application was not referrable.

4.2. State Planning Policy – July 2017

The State Planning Policy (SPP) includes interim development assessment requirements to ensure that State interests are appropriately considered by local government when assessing development applications where the local government Planning Scheme has not yet appropriately integrated all of the State's interests in the SPP. As the most recent SPP (July 2017) has been reflected in the Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme, Part B of the SPP is not applicable.

4.3. Mackay Isaac and Whitsunday Regional Plan – February 2012

The Mackay, Isaac and Whitsunday Regional Plan was established to provide the vision and direction for the region to 2031. The plan provides certainty about where the region is heading in the future and provides the framework to respond to the challenges and opportunities which may arise. The proposal is generally consistent with the provisions of the plan.

4.4. Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme, 2017

4.4.1. Strategic Framework

The strategic framework sets the policy direction for the Planning Scheme and forms the basis for ensuring appropriate development occurs in the Planning Scheme area for the life of the Planning Scheme.

4.4.2. Strategic Intent

The Planning Scheme sets the policy direction to ensure that to 2036 and beyond, the Whitsundays is a prosperous, liveable, and sustainable region which will be achieved through the integration of the unique attributes and competitive advantages of each township. The region's townships and communities have a strong and proud social identity. The promotion and protection of the region's environmental values is significant to the expressed identities, including the unique scenic values, which consist of key urban gateways, views, and vistas.

The proposal does not conflict with the strategic intent to any degree which warrants refusal.

4.4.3. Overlay Codes

Bushfire Hazard Overlay

Dwelling house is existing and bushfire overlay was considered during the construction of the building. No further assessment required.

Landslide Hazard Overlay

Dwelling house is existing and landslide overlay was considered during the construction of the building. No further assessment required.

4.4.4. Zone Code

Low Density Residential Zone

The proposal complies with the zone code. The purpose and overall outcomes of the zone provide for other accommodation activities, in this case STA, being established within the zone where compatible with the prevailing residential character and amenity of the zone.

No physical changes to the existing dwelling house are proposed which means the proposal will not result in a change to the visual character and amenity of the streetscape. To address the potential for the development to cause undesirable amenity impacts conditions of approval have been recommended. Conditions of approval for a maximum of six guests (two per bedroom) at any one time are recommended. Importantly, the approved use shall not be run as a party-house and strict noise and operating conditions which are monitored by a property manager 24/7 are advocated.

4.4.5. Development Codes

Short-term accommodation and multi-unit uses code

The proposed development provides for the property manager to manage rubbish disposal. It is conditioned to be included in the Code of Conduct together with having a visible sign which displays the contact details of a local property manager to respond to complaints in a timely manner.

Infrastructure code

No additional infrastructure is required to support the development.

Landscaping code

No additional landscaping is required to support the development.

Transport and parking code

The proposal complies with the requirements of the code and the STA Guideline. The proposal has a requirement of two parking spaces as required by Table 9.4.7.3.3 Minimum on-site parking requirements.

Short-Term Accommodation Guideline

- Site plan;
- Property management plan;
- Code of Conduct;
- Fire and emergency plan;
- Statutory declaration;
- Four on-site car parking spaces.

5. Public Submissions

The development application was placed on public notification between 18 April 2024 and 15 May 2024 in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Planning Act 2016. The Notice of Compliance was received on 16 May 2024. One submission was received during

this period of Public Notification. Submissions have been received and summarised in the below table:

The sign is to be no larger than 0.3 square meter in sign face area, professionally made and weather-proof. For a unit, this sign can be displayed on the door of the unit. For a dwelling house, the sign must be displayed where it can be clearly read by the public.

- b) Prior to the commencement of the use, inform in writing, the occupants of every neighbouring dwelling that the property has been approved for short-term accommodation and provide contact details including a 24-hour contact number.
- c) Establish and maintain an accommodation register, recording names and contact details of allguests and duration of stay. The register must also include details of any complaints received and a copy of the signed acceptance of the Code of Conduct document. This register is to be provided to Council on request.
- d) Prepare a Code of Conduct which must be provided to and agreed-to in writing by all adult guests prior to occupation. The Code of Conduct must include as a minimum:
 - i. The maximum permitted number of overnight guests on any one day.
 - ii. A set of 'good neighbour' rules, to prevent anti-social behaviour and excessive noise after 9pm, in accordance with Schedule 1 of Environmental Protection (Noise) Policy 2019.
 - iii. Information for guests, including the 24-hour contact details of the nominated propertymanager, on-site carparking and waste bin arrangements.
 - iv. Rules requiring eviction or forfeiture of money in the event of a significant breach of the Code of Conduct.
- e) To meet and greet every guest prior to occupation (in person or electronically) to explain the Code of Conduct and other applicable rules.
- f) To have two (2) 24-hour contact number that must be answered, not with a recorded message.
- g) To attend to any complaint about anti-social guest behaviour reported to the contact number, within 30 minutes. Agent response may include attendance by a private security firm.
- To immediately evict any guests whose behaviour repeatedly breaches the Code of Conduct.
- i) A maximum of **six (6)** overnight guests (two guests per bedroom) will be permitted to stay in short-term accommodation at any one time.
- j) Prior to the commencement of the use, a license under Local Law No. 1 (Administration) 2014 for the operation of short-term accommodation must be obtained.

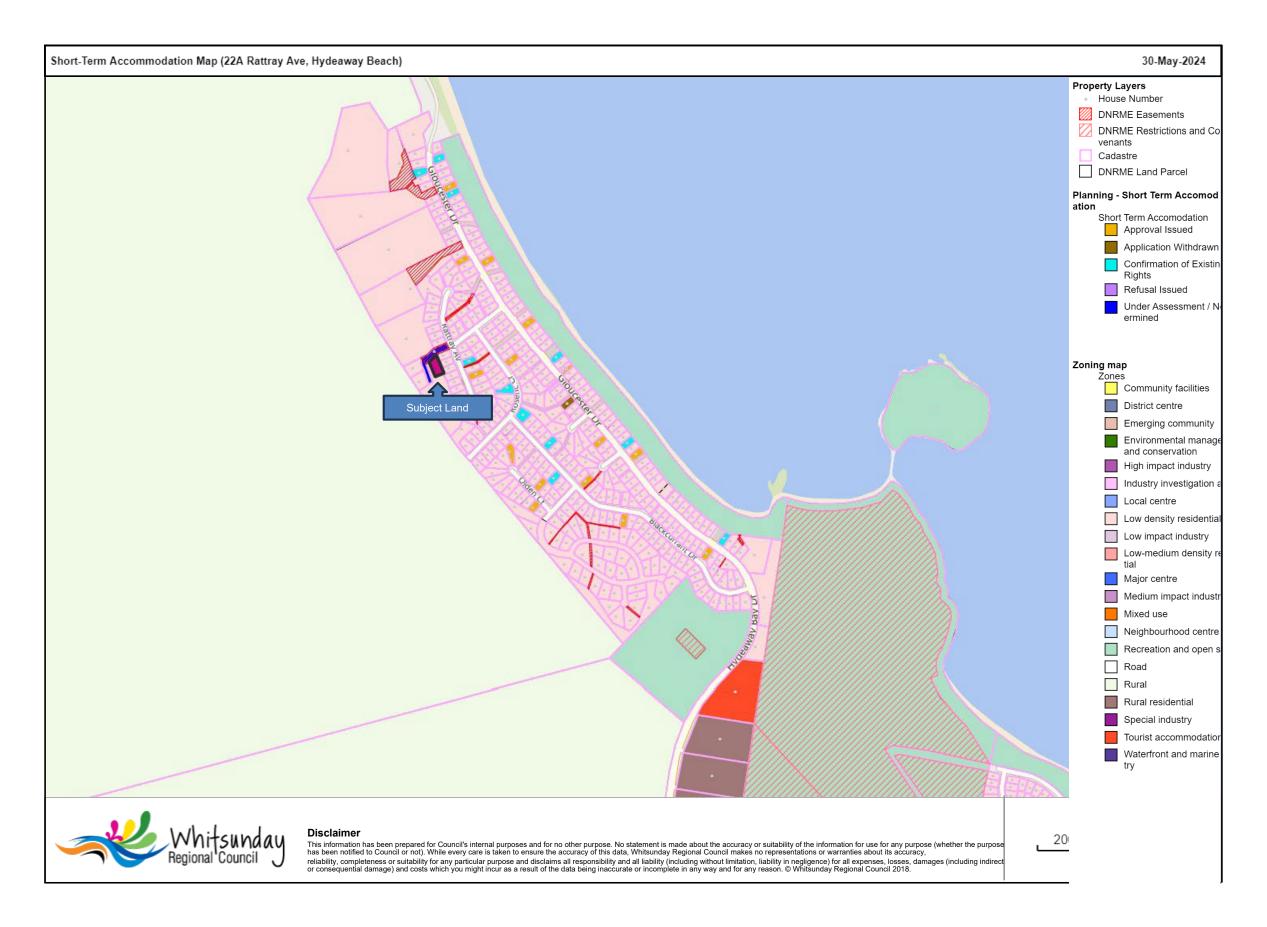
5. MISCELLANEOUS

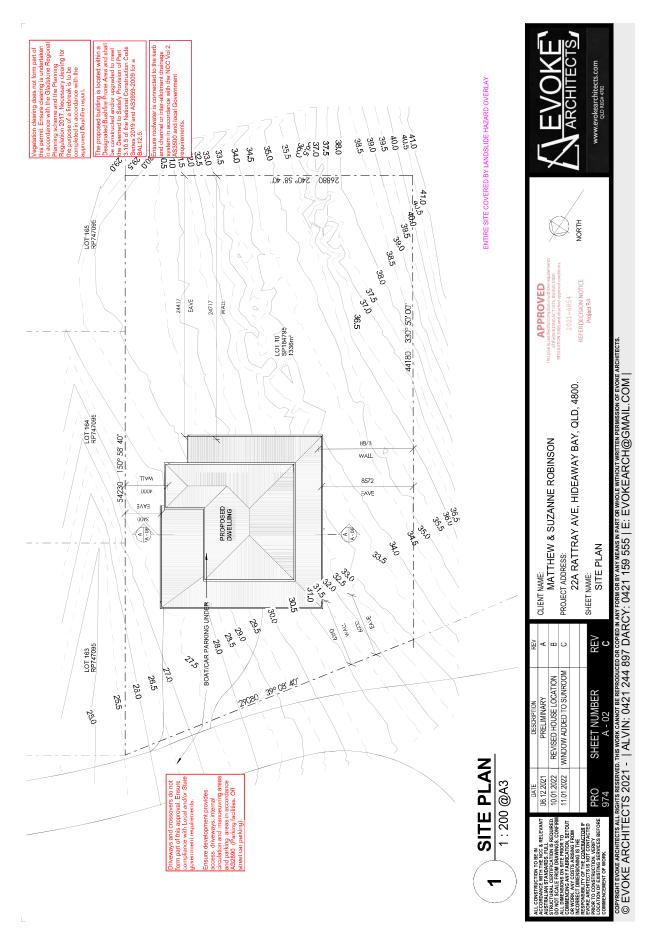
HOLIDAY HOME - SITE PLAN

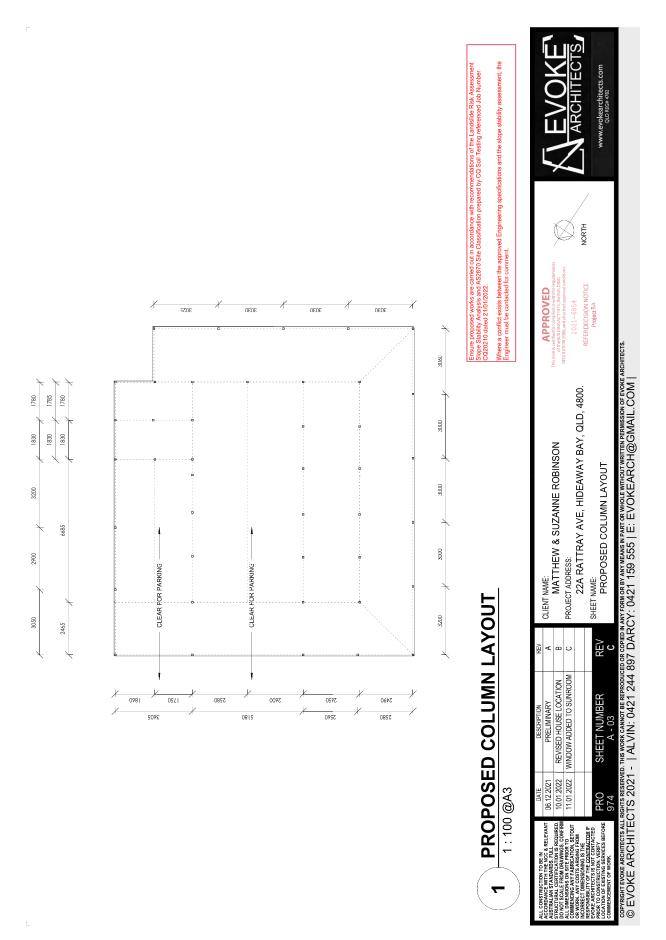
HOLIDAY HOME - FLOOR PLAN

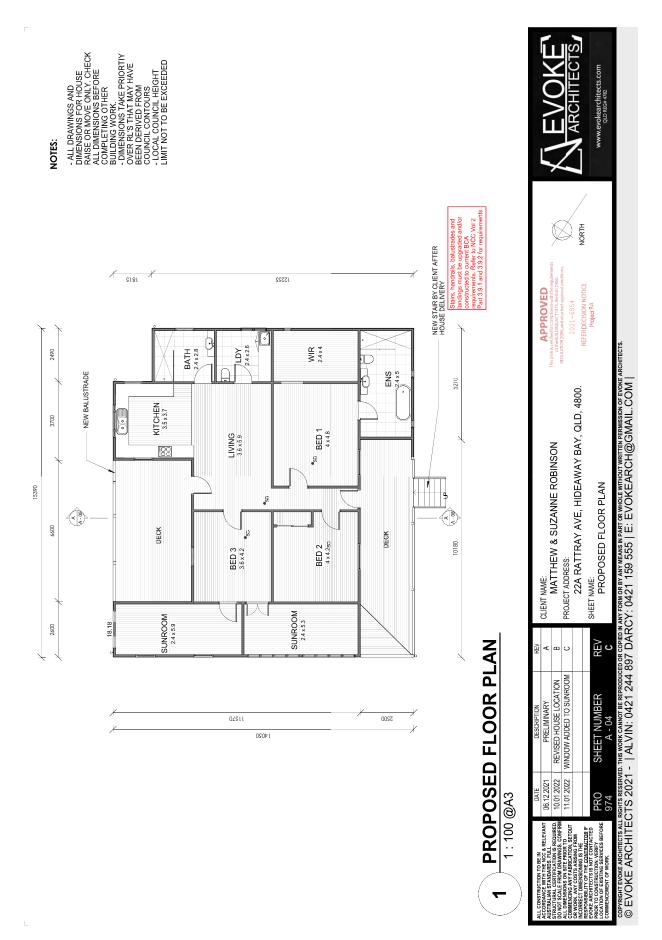

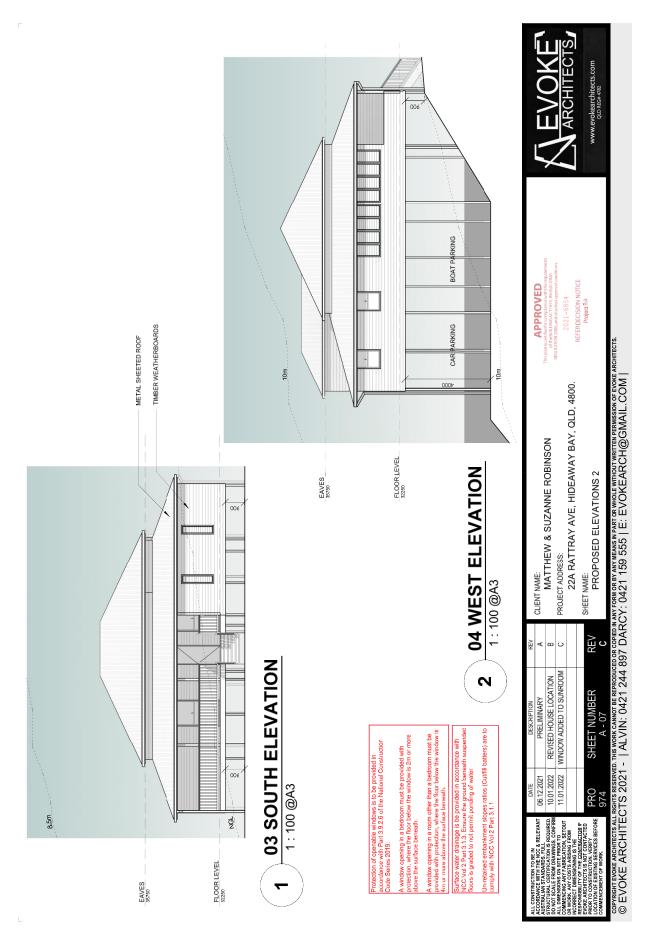

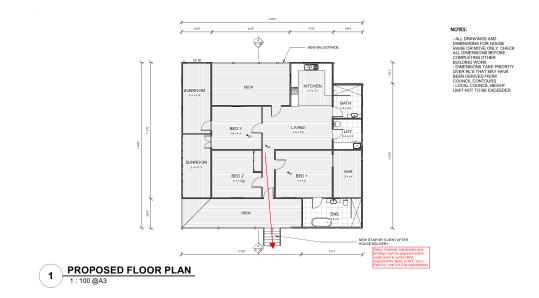

PURPOSE

To present the assessment of the development application for a shop (pharmacy) and health care services (medical centre) at 37 George Street Bowen, and to seek Council's determination.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The application is for a Material Change of Use for a Shop (Pharmacy) and a Health Care Services (Medical Centre) within an existing single-storey showroom (old furniture store) building. The Medical Centre has a proposed Gross Floor Area (GFA) of 203m² and the Pharmacy has a proposed Total Used Area (TUA) of 202m². The premises is zoned Major centre, and the proposed development is consistent with the purpose of the zone.

There are limited cosmetic external changes to the built form which means the proposal will not result in a change to the visual character and amenity for the centre of Bowen.

The proposal does not provide the required on-site parking spaces that is triggered by the development. The development has a shortfall of eight (8) car parking spaces and two (2) service vehicle parking spaces. Therefore, the development is unable to comply with the Transport and Parking code. To justify the shortfall in parking, the applicant has provided a parking study that assesses the availability of on-street parking close to the site. The applicant has also advised that service vehicles will utilise the general parking within the proposed car parking area as justification for no provision of service vehicle spaces. The proposed access to the on-site car park via George Street will remove one (1) on-street parking bay. Conditions of approval are recommended to address potential safety impacts on the proposed access off George Street.

The proposal complies with the Planning Scheme and is recommended for approval in accordance with the drawings and documents submitted, subject to reasonable and relevant conditions.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council approve the application for Development Application for Development Permit for Material Change of Use - Shop (Pharmacy) and Health Care Services (Medical Centre), made by Bowen Property Investments Pty Ltd, on L: 4 RP: 720849 and located at 37 George Street BOWEN, subject to the conditions outlined in **Attachment 2**.

BACKGROUND

The application was not lodged following any compliance action from Council.

A previous application for material change of use for rooming accommodation and communal facilities was withdrawn.

DISCUSSION/CURRENT ISSUE

This application is Code assessable against the Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme 2017.

The proposal complies with the Major centre zone code. The zone allows for a mix of accommodation, commercial and health services. Both uses of a Medical Centre and Pharmacy are complementary to each other and are adjacently located to service the health needs of the Bowen community whilst supporting the hierarchy of centres.

Limited cosmetic external changes to the built form will allow the existing building to retain its single storey built form that complements the scale and character along George Street and Herbert Street. The removal of the dwelling house will improve the streetscape appearance on George Street, being the sole remaining residential dwelling on this block. The development is supported by the existing pedestrian and vehicle networks of George Street, Herbert Street and Dalrymple Street. There are also two hail 'n' ride stops nearby on George Street.

The previous showroom did not provide any on-site car parking, with all customers having to park in the on-street public parking.

The development triggers a requirement to provide parking for 17 cars, one (1) emergency service vehicle and two (2) service vehicles. The applicant proposes on-site parking spaces for nine (9) cars and one (1) emergency service vehicle, which is the maximum amount of parking that can be provided in the space available. Therefore, there is a shortfall of eight (8) car parking spaces and two (2) service vehicle parking spaces.

A parking demand study was conducted determine whether sufficient parking exists within the vicinity to cater for the car parking demand generated by the development. This study was done between 7am to 7pm between Sunday to Saturday (03/03/2024 – 09/03/2024). Based on the findings, there is sufficient parking available in the location for the existing and proposed uses for the following reasons:

- The highest utilisation of parking areas was between 9.30am to 11.30am, from Tuesday to Friday.
- The busiest recorded day was a Tuesday, when vacant spaces were still available.
- The applicant has advised that the service vehicle will utilise the proposed on-site car
 parks and a service vehicle bay is not required due to the temporary nature of the
 service vehicles in delivering goods and services to the development.

The location of the proposed 5.5m-wide access to the on-site car park will remove one (1) on-street parking bay on George Street.

Despite being unable to provide the required number of on-site parking spaces, the proposal is recommended for approval as there is sufficient car parking available in the area to meet needs of current and the proposed uses.

2. Site Description

The site has been developed primarily as commercial premises located at the corner of George Street and Herbert Street. The premises also includes a dwelling house and ancillary building which are tucked at the rear of the showroom building and has a driveway access off George Street. Fronting the premises are on-street parking spaces, with central parking at George Street. Surrounding uses are hotel, shops, offices and food and drink outlets. There is a dental clinic at the opposite end of the George Street.

3. Proposal Details

The development is located within an existing showroom (old furniture store) building with 203m² of Gross Floor Area (GFA) at the western most section of the building will be converted to a Medical Centre and the rest of the building (232m² of Total Use Area (TUA)) will be used for a Pharmacy.

The development cannot achieve the required number of parking spaces on-site and seeks a performance solution. The applicant's solution is provided through a parking analysis which suggests together with nine on-site parking spaces, there is sufficient car parking available. The additional parking is in the surrounding George Street public car

parking areas which are not anticipated to be at maximum capacity at the expected peak hours of the proposed development.

The existing dwelling and ancillary building will be demolished to establish the proposed on-site parking at the rear of the existing commercial building.

4. Planning Assessment

The application has been assessed against the relevant provisions of the *Planning Act, 2016* and the *Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme, 2017*. The proposal is considered to be generally in accordance with the Planning Scheme and is recommended for approval in accordance with the drawings and documents submitted, subject to reasonable and relevant conditions (Attachment 1).

4.1. State Assessment and Referral Agency (SARA)

The application was not referrable.

4.2. State Planning Policy - July 2017

The State Planning Policy (SPP) includes interim development assessment requirements to ensure that State interests are appropriately considered by local government when assessing development applications where the local government Planning Scheme is appropriately integrated all of the State's interests in the SPP. The most recent SPP has been reflected in the Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme, in particular Part 2 of State Planning Provisions.

4.3. Mackay Isaac and Whitsunday Regional Plan - February 2012

The Mackay, Isaac and Whitsunday Regional Plan is not applicable in Code Assessable development.

4.4. Whitsunday Regional Council Planning Scheme, 2017

4.4.1. Strategic Framework

The Strategic Framework is not applicable in Code Assessable development.

4.4.2. Overlay Codes

There are no applicable overlays.

4.4.3. Zone Code

Major Centre Zone Code

The proposed development is consistent with the purpose and overall outcomes of the zone. The zone allows for a mix of accommodation, commercial and health services. Both the uses of Medical Centre and Pharmacy store are complementary to each other and are conveniently located to service the health needs of the Bowen community whilst supporting the hierarchy of centres.

Limited cosmetic external changes to the built form will allow the showroom building to retain its single storey built form that complements the existing scale and character along George Street and Herbert Street. The removal of the dwelling house will improve the streetscape appearance on George Street, being the sole remaining residential dwelling on this section of the street. The development is supported by the existing pedestrian and

vehicle networks of George Street, Herbert Street and Dalrymple Street to access the site. There are also two hail 'n' ride stops nearby on George Street.

The proposal meets the necessary benchmarks of the zone and where necessary conditions of approval can be applied to protect the amenity of adjoining land uses.

4.4.4. Development Codes

Business Activities Code

The single-storey building is existing, located close to all street frontages and encourages the continuous edge with adjoining commercial businesses. While retaining the existing awning and colonnade, the building will provide adequate shelter for pedestrian throughfare from Herbert Street and George Street. An on-site car parking area and driveway is replacing the footprint of the existing dwelling and will now give the appearance of a commercial building with associated car parking, assimilating with the existing character of the centre of Bowen. The proposal complies with the code.

Infrastructure Code

The subject site is connected to all reticulated services. No stormwater drainage impacts from the proposed car parking area are expected due to the impervious condition of the ground created by the existing buildings and driveway area. Conditions of approval will require Operational Works for stormwater to be collected and discharged to a lawful point of discharge.

Existing reticulated infrastructure connections to the dwelling are to be disconnected at the time of removing the dwelling building under a future demolition permit.

Landscaping Code

It is not considered practical to condition the developer to provide additional landscaping on a constrained site. This is consistent with other commercial premises close by.

Transport and Parking Code

The development triggers a total on-site parking requirement for 17 cars, one (1) emergency service vehicle and two (2) service vehicles. The existing dwelling and ancillary building will be demolished to accommodate an on-site car parking area which will be accessed off George Street. Currently there is no existing car parking provided on-site for the existing Showroom use.

A breakdown of the proposed car parking is as follows:

Required Parking as per Table 9.4.7.3.3 Minimum on-site parking requirements.

- Shop (Pharmacy) 203m2 of Total Usable Area
- Health Care Services (Medical Centre) 232 m² of GFA
- Required parking spaces 17 car parks, one (1) emergency service vehicle and two (2) service vehicles.

Proposed Parking

Nine (9) parking spaces including one (1) disabled car and one (1) emergency service vehicle. As a result, the development is short eight (8) on-site car parking spaces and two (2) service vehicle parking spaces.

A parking study was undertaken to assess all the available on-street parking within the area to determine whether sufficient parking exists within the vicinity of the site to cater for the shortfall in on-site parking. The study also looked at the demand of these spaces and when they were utilised most.

The study was undertaken between 7am to 7pm between a period of Sunday to Saturday (03/03/2024 - 09/03/2024). The locations of parking areas included in the study are highlighted green in the following image:



The results found that the highest car parking demand was between 9:30am to 11:30am from Tuesday to Friday. Importantly, the study found that there was a surplus of parking spaces available on the week the study was undertaken. The busiest recorded day was a Tuesday, where approximately 21 parking spaces remained available in the parking areas shown above at the busiest time, indicating surplus spaces exist in the area to cater for the eight (8) parking space shortfall generated by the proposal.

The applicant has advised that the service vehicle will utilise the proposed on-site car parks and a service vehicle bay is not required due to the temporary nature of the service vehicles in delivering goods and services to the development.

The location of the proposed 5.5m-wide access to the on-site car park will remove one (1) on-street parking bay on George Street.

Based on the findings of the applicant's parking analysis, it is accepted that sufficient parking remains available for users of the Pharmacy and Medical Centre, without detrimentally impacting the parking available for surrounding land uses, of which many in the area have their own on-site parking to cater for their needs. Therefore, despite being unable to achieve the required on-site car parks, the proposal achieves compliance with the Overall Outcomes of the code as there is sufficient availability of on-street parking in the vicinity.

Recommendations have also been provided by the applicant's consulting engineer to protect pedestrian safety on the proposed access which are included as recommended conditions of approval:

- Install speed humps within both entry and exist lanes to limit the potential speed of exiting vehicle (vehicles with compromised sight lines) approach the verge/pathway.
- Install a convex mirror immediately opposite the verge / pathway in front of the
 exiting driver's path to provide opportunity for the driver to sight/view any
 approaching footpath traffic.

- 1.2 The following further development permits are required prior to commencement of work on site or commencement of the use:
 - Operational Works:
 - a) Stormwater Drainage;
 - b) Access and Parking; and
 - c) Erosion Prevention and Sediment Control;
 - Plumbing and Drainage Works.
 - Building Works.

All Operational Works, Plumbing and Drainage Works Development Permits must be obtained prior to the issue of a Building Works Development Permit.

- 1.3 Where a discrepancy or conflict exists between the written conditions of this approval and the approved plans, the requirements of the written condition(s) will prevail.
- 1.4 All conditions of this approval must be complied with in full to Council's satisfaction prior to the commencement of the use.
- 1.5 The applicant shall demonstrate and provide evidence that compliance with all conditions of this development approval and any other subsequent development approvals as a result of this development approval have been complied with prior to the commencement of the use.

2. CLEARING, LANDSCAPING AND FENCING

- 6.2 All accesses, driveways, circulation roads, aisles, parking bays and manoeuvring areas are to be provided generally as indicated on Carpark Layout and Linemarking - Northern Consulting Engineers – MJ2535/01- V05 – 03/06/2024 and must be designed and constructed so as to comply with the criteria described in AS2890 and AS1428.
- 6.3 The internal access and carpark must be constructed to a concrete standard prior to commencement of the use.
- 6.4 The external access from the pavement of George Street to the property boundary must be constructed to comply with the dimensions, gradients and specifications as indicated on Council's Standard Drawing RS051 prior to commencement of the use.
- 6.5 The external access must include provision for all drainage from within the property and along the driveway surface to be collected at or inside the property boundary and discharged by way of a pipe or other approved means to Council's drainage system.
- 6.6 A minimum of nine (9) car parking spaces including one (1) disability parking space and one (1) ambulance parking space are to be provided and maintained prior to commencement of the use. All accesses, parking bays and manoeuvring areas must be designed and constructed so as to comply with the criteria described in AS2890 and AS1428.
- 6.7 All driveways and carpark must be constructed prior to commencement of the use and maintained thereafter to the requirements of Council.
- 6.8 Prior to commencement of the use, the applicant is to install speed humps within both entry and exist lanes as per the recommendations of the Access and Parking Assessment by Northern Consulting dated 24/04/2024.
- 6.9 Prior to commencement of the use, the applicant is to install a convex mirror immediately opposite the verge / pathway in front of the exiting driver's path as per the recommendations of the Access and Parking Assessment by Northern Consulting dated 24/04/2024.

6.10 At completion of construction and prior to signing of plan of survey, the Supervising Engineer shall provide certification that all External and Internal access works constructed on site comply with Council's Development Manual and this Decision Notice of Approval. The documentation for the proposed Access Easements must include statements with the regard to ownership and responsibility for future construction and ongoing maintenance requirements of the access within the Easement.

7. STORMWATER AND FLOODING

- 7.1 Prior to commencement of any work on site an Operational Works development permit must be obtained in relation to Stormwater Drainage.
- 7.2 All site works must be undertaken to ensure that there is no increase in flood levels and/or flood frequency at any locations where existing landowners and/or users are adversely affected by waterway flooding for all events up to and including Q100.
 - All stormwater drainage works must be designed and constructed in accordance with the Queensland Urban Drainage Manual current at the time of development and Council's Development Manual (or equivalent replacement document current at the time of development).
- 7.3 The applicant must demonstrate that the developed flows from the land drain to a lawful point of discharge.
- 7.4 Prior to commencement of use on the site the applicant must lodge with Council, a civil engineer's design, and construction certification (by an experienced and qualified engineer). The certification must be addressed to Council and must certify that the drainage works have been constructed in accordance with the requirements of Queensland Urban Drainage Manual current at the time of development, Councils Development Manual (current at the time of development) and this Decision Notice and will not cause adverse effects to adjoining or downstream properties or infrastructure.

8. ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT PLAN (EMP)

8.1 A Development Permit for Operational Works (Erosion Prevention and Sediment Control) must be obtained prior to commencement of work on site.

The Erosion Prevention and Sediment Control Plan must be prepared in accordance with Council's Development Manual and best Practice Erosion & Sediment Control – November 2008 (IECA White Book). The strategy of the plan must be implemented and maintained for the duration of the operational and building works, and until exposed soil areas are permanently stabilised (e.g., turfed, concreted).

- 8.2 Discharges of water pollutants, wastewater or stormwater from the site must not cause measurable levels of water pollutants in the receiving waters to fall outside the acceptable ranges specified in the 'Australian Water Quality Guidelines for Fresh and Marine Waters', ANZECC 2000.
- 8.3 No visible emissions of dust must occur beyond the boundaries of the site during earthworks and construction activities on the site. If, at any time during the earthworks and construction activities the dust emissions exceed the levels specified above, all dust generating activities must cease until the corrective actions have been implemented to reduce dust emissions to acceptable levels or wind conditions are such that acceptable levels are achieved.
- 8.4 The applicant must ensure that when undertaking any on-site or external works, including any filling and extraction, appropriate dust control measures are implemented in accordance with the Environmental Protection Act 1994 and complies with the relevant air quality objectives defined in the Environmental Protection (Air) Policy 2008.

9. MISCELLANEOUS

- 9.1 If any item of cultural heritage is identified during site works, all work must cease and the relevant State Agency must be notified. Work can resume only after State Agency clearance is obtained.
 - The Applicant is reminded of their obligations under the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act, 2003 and the Torres Strait Islander Cultural Heritage Act 2003. Further information and databases are available from the Department of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships at: www.datsip.gld.gov.au
- 9.2 Any alteration necessary to electricity, telephone, water mains, sewerage mains, and/or public utility installations resulting from the development or in connection with the development, must be at full cost to the developer.
- 9.3 Any building materials, equipment and the like must be appropriately tied down, placed indoors and secured on site at the time of preparation for cyclone events. The on site supervisor is to ensure that all contractors/employees take the necessary steps to secure the construction site in the event of a cyclone.
- 9.4 All construction materials, waste, waste skips, machinery and contractors' vehicles must be located and stored or parked within the site. No storage of materials, parking of construction machinery or contractors' vehicles will be permitted in George Street or Herbert Street or adjoining land unless written permission from the owner of that land and Council is provided.
- 9.5 It is the developer's responsibility for the full rectification of any damage caused to neighbouring public infrastructure (such as footpaths, driveways, fences, gardens, trees and the like) caused by contractors, including clean up of any litter or waste that is a result of the subject development.

10. ADVISORY NOTES

10.1 Hours of work

It is the developer's responsibility to ensure compliance with the Environmental Protection Act 1994, which prohibits any construction, building and earthworks activities likely to cause nuisance noise (including the entry and departure of heavy vehicles) between the hours of 6.30 pm and 6.30 am from Monday to Saturday and at all times on Sundays or Public Holidays.

10.2 Dust Control

If a facility has more than one sport utilising the facility but does not reach the 201 active participants minimum threshold, they will not be eligible for funding from the Facility Management Grant.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

PURPOSE

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Whitsunday Regional Council has participated in the Regional Arts Development Fund since its inception in 1994. The Queensland Government, through the Arts Office, operates the RADF program in partnership with local government. The RADF program provides funding for development of cultural activities through locally determined policy and assessment procedures.

RADF has been introduced to foster and promote professional development and employment of artists in regional Queensland.

The program supports locally determined regional arts and cultural development opportunities by providing discrete, short term, project based financial assistance.

Individuals, groups, and organisations are encouraged to seek assistance for:

- · Professional services to amateur arts activity
- Strategic arts & culture initiatives in local communities i.e. increasing amenity, community pride and liveability through infrastructure, public art and place-making projects.
- Travel costs associated with local artists attending specialised seminars/workshops in major centres for the purpose of Individual Professional Development
- Professional components of projects such as residencies, productions, commissions, exhibitions, short term workshops, research, and promotion
- Networking, training, and professional development for local arts workers
- Development and delivery of diverse, exciting, and accessible arts and cultural activities, projects, and initiatives for, by and with local communities

The RADF Local Committee advised that at its recent meeting the committee assessed the applications for funding received and have recommended the applications below subject to conditions being endorsed by Council for approval.

Council's responsibilities for RADF operations are promotion, endorsement, and administration. Before RADF payments can be distributed Council is required to endorse RADF committee decisions at a council meeting.

BACKGROUND

RADF invests in quality arts and cultural experiences across Queensland based on locally determined priorities.

Local Arts and Cultural workers submit an application to Council for funding grants. Applications are assessed by an elected committee against the criteria based on program guidelines and priorities identified in Council's Arts and Culture Policy.

All projects and activities receiving RADF funding are required to report on their contribution towards RADF 2023/24 Key Performance Outcomes (KPOs) included in the RADF guidelines.

The 2024 funding Round 4 closed on Friday 3 May 2024 for projects commencing after Monday, 10 June 2024.

DISCUSSION/CURRENT ISSUE

The following applications were submitted:

Whitsunday Writers Festival Inc. – Julia Evans - Stand-Alone Special Event 'Local Author Long Lunch' featuring 5 writers in conversation.

Requested \$6,520 – Recommended \$6,520

The festival will contribute to positive change and innovation by bringing the community together in their love of reding and writing, celebrating diverse stories. The local author lunch will feature five writers in conversation, and throughout the festival program additional local authors will be included in the national media campaign.

The festival will strive to deliver a high value event and experience that strengthens local community. This will be measured by the festival's ability to:

- 1. Foster literary projects and collaborations amongst local authors
- 2. Financially contribute to local businesses and tourism operators prior and following the festival
- 3. Attract volunteers, deliver a satisfying and rewarding experience, and retain a volunteer- force for future Festivals.
- 4. Quantify health and wellbeing benefits from attending the festival, and
- 5. Quantify pride in the 2024 Festival's accomplishments.

The RADF Committee's recommendation was to fully fund the application, being an ongoing commendable project.

Trudy Hastings – Exhibition and Workshop Requested \$1,810 – Recommended \$1,810

The exhibition aims to boost the visibility as an emerging artist and inspire fellow artists in the region. Crafting over 20 new artworks to enrich local culture, spur innovation, and enhance community well-being. Open to the public, the event will foster an artistic community addressing the scarcity of private artist exhibitions in recent years. The workshop is on exhibition planning for budding artists fostering their development and contributing to the growth of the artistic landscape.

From this event the artist expects:

- 1. The success of a private art exhibition will demonstrate the support and appreciation of the local community for the arts.
- 2. Sense of community backing can inspire other artists to pursue their artistic endeavours with confidence.
- 3. The exhibition to leverage past events and enhance the burgeoning arts and culture in the Whitsundays.

The RADF Committee's recommended was to fully fund the application. The project serves as an excellent opportunity for artists to exhibit their creative endeavours.

TARTS Gloucester Textile Artists – Sewing Machine Free Form Embroidery Requested \$1,547 – Recommended \$1,545

TARTS are a group of women in the Gloucester, Hydeaway Bay, Dingo Beach area and wider Whitsundays who are passionate about working with textiles and have done so for 16yrs. They love learning new techniques, and Michelle Mischkulnig is a teacher par excellence in this area., using all the vibrant colours and fabulous fabrics, like silks and organza's that inspire them. Michelle teaches and exhibits worldwide her Sewing Machine Free Form techniques, bringing wealth of new vistas in textile arts to the group.

The RADF Committee's recommended was to fully fund the application. This project will provide a wealth of knowledge and techniques using textiles to create works of art and have ongoing benefits for the local artists.

Whitsunday Songwriter Festival – Emerging songwriters' workshop, professional residency, and public performance of new work Requested \$8,800 – Recommended \$8,800

The Whitsundays Songwriter Festival will engage professional songwriters and artists to guide and mentor local emerging songwriters to tell their own stories and develop musical skill through workshops, and to create performance opportunities within the Whitsunday region. To build local cultural capacity and revitalise and expand the music scene in the region through this annual event.

The Concert and Conversation event features new musical works written during the festival performed live to a local, interstate, and international audience.

The RADF Committee's recommendation was to fully fund the application. This annual event will create a new generation of local songwriters through the development of songwriting skills, creation of new work, learning music industry best practices, local community performances, and networking with national songwriters increasing opportunities nationally.

Young Whitsundays Inc. - NQLD Battle of the Bands

Requested \$6,732 - Recommended \$6,730

To provide the opportunity for young people from the Whitsundays region to express themselves creatively through music in the Battle of the Bands. Participating in the Young Whitsundays Got Talent (YWGT) has helped past participants to kick start their careers and meet other artists to inspire them to believe in themselves and their own success. To provide healthy and positive alternative pathways for young people through music as a diversion from cycles of addictions.

NQLD Battle of the Young Bands is kicking off this year at Northerlies Bar and Grill. And has been held there for the past three years with young bands a prominent contender. This year, it has been decided to give Young Bands their time to shine starting their own battle to be held annually in June at Northerlies. Battle of the Bands will bring the community together collaboratively in a safe, friendly, uplifting, and positive environment through music, including young people, families, friends, community members, local businesses, donors, supporters, and visitors to the region.

The RADF Committee's recommended was to fully fund the application. The project serves as an excellent opportunity for an emerging group to develop skills and professional development.

Michelle teaches and exhibits worldwide her Sewing Machine Free Form techniques, bringing wealth of new vistas in textile arts to the group.

The RADF Committee's recommended was to fully fund the application. This project will provide a wealth of knowledge and techniques using textiles to create works of art and have ongoing benefits for the local artists.

Whitsunday Songwriter Festival – Thomas Hudak Requested \$8,800 – Recommended \$8,800

The Whitsundays Songwriter Festival will engage professional songwriters and artists to guide and mentor local emerging songwriters to tell their own stories and develop musical skill through workshops, and to create performance opportunities within the Whitsunday region. To build local cultural capacity and revitalise and expand the music scene in the region.

The RADF committee's recommendation was to fully fund the application. This annual event will create a new generation of local songwriters through the development of songwriting skills.

Young Whitsundays Inc. – Paula Hovey Requested \$6,732 – Recommended \$6,730

To provide the opportunity for young people from the Whitsundays region to express themselves creatively through music in the Battle of the Bands. Participating in the YWGT has helped past participants to kick start their careers and meet other artists to inspire them to believe in themselves and their own success. To provide healthy and positive alternative pathways for young people through music as a diversion from cycles of addictions.

The RADF Committee's recommended was to fully fund the application. Agreed that it is a very commendable activity for youth.

BACKGROUND

The Paul Bowman Challenge is a well-established Junior Rugby League competition that has been played in Proserpine for over 10 years. Council has provided \$30,700 in financial support since 2015.

The Paul Bowman Challenge is expected to bring over 5,000 visitors to the Whitsunday region and the carnival dates have been chosen to coincide with the September school holidays, allowing the opportunity for visitors to stay on after the carnival and experience all that the region has to offer.

DISCUSSION/CURRENT ISSUE

The Paul Bowman Challenge consists of 70 teams that come to our region from throughout Queensland. There are approximately 1000 players who participate in this carnival, all accompanied by their families and extended families. 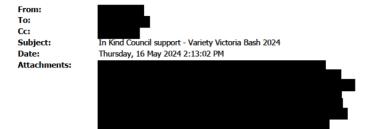

For Council to consider a request from Bowen Meals on Wheels for a donation on their Rates and Service Charges for the period of 1 January 2024 to 30 June 2024.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Bowen Meals on Wheels have applied for a donation on their rates and service charges in line with Councils Donations on Rates and Service Charges for Not-for-Profit Organisations policy.

Bowen Meals on Wheels entered into a lease agreement with Council in 2022 for their property at 17 Williams Street, Bowen. Rates were unable to be applied to the property until the Department of Natural Resources conducted a valuation. Council recently received notification that the valuation had been completed and so rates are now able to be applied and the request for donation processed.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council approve a donation of \$1,650.13 to Bowen Meals on Wheels which is equivalent to 100% of the nett General Rate and 75% of the nett Service Charges for the period of 1 January 2024 to 30 June 2024.

BACKGROUND

In accordance with Councils Donations on Rates and Charges for Not-for-Profit Organisations policy, Council may grant a donation, in the form of a rebate of a percentage of certain Council Rates and Charges, for particular categories of Not-For-Profit organisations. Eligible organisations may receive a donation of 100% of the general rates and 75% of the service charges incurred for the current financial year.

DISCUSSION/CURRENT ISSUE

The donation to be provided to Bowen Meals on Wheels is equivalent to 100% of the nett general rates and 75% of nett service charges levied for the period from 1 January 2024 to 30 June 2024. The below table provides a breakdown of the charges:

Dear Sir/Madam

Our organisation has just entered into a new lease from Council for our premises at 17 Williams Street, Bowen. We wish to apply for a donation from Council for the rates, annual lease payment and water charges. We provide regular, nutritious meals to the aged, infirm, people with disabilities and those recuperating from illness. Our aim is to keep charges as low as possible. Council has assisted us by donating rates, lease and water charges since we commenced operations almost 50 years ago.

As you may know, all of our meal deliveries and administrative tasks are carried out by volunteers using their own vehicles. We have also been active this year raising funds at the Grand View which has been quite rewarding. Our overheads have risen substantially in the past year, with food, fuel and electricity costs skyrocketing. PURPOSE

For Council to consider a request from the Bowen Community Centre for a donation on their Service Charges at 42 Gregory Street, Bowen for the period of 1 January 2024 to 30 June 2024.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Bowen Community Centre have applied for a donation on their rates and service charges in line with Councils Donations on Rates and Service Charges for Not-for-Profit Organisations policy.

Recently, Council awarded a donation on the rates and service charges for the newly constructed property at 34-40 Gregory Street which houses the Bowen Community Centre. The organisation has now requested a donation on the adjacent property at 42 Gregory Street which they also hold a lease over. This will be the third property owned or leased by the Bowen Community Centre receiving a donation on the rates and service charges.

The property of 42 Gregory Street is awaiting valuation from the Department of Resources and as such only the sewer and water base charges are currently being applied to the property. Once Council receives the valuation, general rates will be applied to the property and a donation of 100% of the charges will be granted.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

- a) Approve a donation of \$892.50 to the Bowen Community Centre which is equivalent to 75% of the nett Service Charges for the period of 1 January 2024 to 30 June 2024 and;
- b) Approve a 100% donation on the Rates charges, once the property valuation has been received from the Department of Resources and a general rate is applied to the property.

BACKGROUND

In accordance with Councils current Donations on Rates and Charges for Not for Profit Organisations policy, Council may grant a donation, in the form of a rebate of a percentage of certain Council Rates and Charges, for particular categories of Not-For-Profit organisations. Eligible organisations may receive a donation of 100% of the general rates and 75% of the service charges incurred for the current financial year.

DISCUSSION/CURRENT ISSUE

The Bowen Community Centre have applied for a rates and service charges donation for their property at 42 Gregory Street, Bowen.

Currently, only sewer, water base and water usage charges are rated on this property. A valuation has been requested to be provided by the Department of Resources however it

has not been received to date. As such, no general rate is currently charged to this property. Once the valuation is applied to the property a 100% donation of the rates charged will be provided.

The donation to be provided to Bowen Community Centre will be equivalent to 75% of nett service charges levied for the period from 1 January 2024 to 30 June 2024. The below table provides a breakdown of the charges:

PURPOSE

To review the Council's Policy Framework and reset for the current term of Council.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Policy Framework provides a structure and process for the initiation, development, adoption, and review of Council's policy documents ensuring policies:

- are developed in a consultative, comprehensive, and consistent manner;
- underpin and support Council's strategic objectives;
- provide a clear understanding of the Council's and Administration's responsibilities in policy development and review; and
- are consistent with the compliance requirements outlined in legislation.

As a fundamental component of good governance, Council uses policies to:

- set direction;
- guide decision making by Elected Members and the Administration;
- provide consistency; and
- inform the public.

The Policy Framework differentiates Strategic Policy, which is set by Council, Operational Policy set by the Chief Executive Officer and Guidelines which support the implementation of policies by the Administration.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

- 1. Adopt the reviewed and updated Policy Framework included as **Attachment 1**; and
- 2. Rescind the current Policy Framework adopted on 13 April 2022

BACKGROUND

The Local Government Act 2009 sets out several principles that a local government must follow to ensure it is accountable, effective, efficient and sustainable. Good governance of and by the local government is one of the principles we must follow. Good governance concerns the way decisions are made and the way services are provided to the community.

Good governance includes having effective structures, systems, processes, procedures, and culture in place to ensure the council is operating optimally. It is more than just complying with minimum requirements and having clearly documented arrangements in place. It involves continually embedding the right practices in the right way into council and understanding that everyone plays a role in this. Through this, overall performance will be improved, and council will deliver better value to the community.

The objectives of the Policy Framework (the 'Framework') are to govern the development, establishment, amendment, and review of policies to ensure relevance, authority, and consistency with internal and external legislation; and define the roles, responsibilities, and authorities in relation to the development, establishment, amendment, and review of all policies.

This Framework applies to all policy and processes developed for and on behalf of the Council and the Framework is made under the *Local Government Act 2009* and associated legislation.

DISCUSSION/CURRENT ISSUE

One of the most important roles of councillors is to make policy decisions on behalf of the community, in accordance with their role of providing strategic direction. An essential element of policy making is identifying current and future community needs, setting objectives to meet those needs, consulting relevant stakeholders and analysing the options to establish priorities between competing needs, and allocating appropriate resources. It is important that roles and responsibilities and a framework for efficient and effective policy and procedure development and management is established.

Public facing policies are adopted by council resolution and set out council's strategic position, viewpoints and values, and assists decision making on matters that impact on, and are of concern to the community. Operational policies provide direction from the CEO (Chief Executive Officer) to the administrative arm of the council to provide direction on the day-to-day operational matters of council. Guidelines and Procedures are the internal processes or steps required to either achieve Strategic policies and Operational policies or are required in their own right. Supporting documentation can also be developed and includes factsheets, manuals and process maps designed to aid in efficient and effective delivery of programs or services.

Policy Sources

Elected Councillors - Issues may be brought to the attention of Councillors by community members. A Councillor should direct these issues to the Chief Executive Officer or raise them at appropriate briefing sessions or committees that might be held by Council.

Community - The Chief Executive Officer and Council staff may receive written and verbal requests from the community which may require the application of policy. In the day-to-day operations of Council, policy issues will be raised through the service interactions between staff and the community. Where policy gaps are identified, the Chief Executive Officer or staff member may request consideration of a formal policy to cover the situation.

State/Commonwealth government responses - Council may also wish to develop policies to respond to issues raised by the State and Commonwealth Government. Any regulation oversight i.e. ombudsman may also be interested in policy currency and oversight which regularly sees requests that Councils' amend, review, or develop a policy position or procedure on a range of matters.

Legislative requirements - There is a raft of State and Commonwealth legislation which require Council to develop a policy position on issues across the spectrum of Local Government responsibilities.

Policy Setting Principles.

- Meets a need to enable transparency and accountability, good governance, risk management, legislative and legal compliance, and efficient operations.
- Is clear, consistent, accessible, and complete provides clarity on Council's intentions and integrates with the broader strategic framework.
- Is evidence-based and reflects Council's values grounded in contemporary, best practice and a commitment to pride, accountability, safety, unity, trust, and leadership.
- Prepares for the future outcome driven and reflective, flexible, and responsive to opportunities for continuous improvement.
- Is for the whole region meaningful to our local context: for our strong community, environment and liveability, resilient economy and embodies service excellence, as an outstanding organisation.
- Is people-centred our customers, community and employees are heard by policy processes and represented in policy settings.
- Is sustainable we take a balanced approach that meets the social, cultural, economic, and environmental needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations.

Policy Development Principles

- Are initiated in response to identified need and well-understood problems.
- Are guided by Council's Community Engagement Framework to ensure fit-forpurpose stakeholder engagement.
- Are informed by full and frank advice and are decided by an appropriate authority in a transparent and accountable manner.
- Communicate and publish policy positions to make them readily accessible.
- Monitor the effectiveness and efficiency of implementation activities to enable future reflection.
- Regularly review and evaluate how relevant a policy is working, and how well it
 is achieving its purpose in the ever-changing policy environment.

Review Frequency and Process

Policies need to be reviewed on a regular basis.

Comprehensive reviews should be scheduled to occur at least every 4 years. A review may be triggered ahead of a scheduled review based on a policy risk assessment of the following factors:

- risk to compliance or statutory requirements;
- risk to finances;
- risk to health and safety;
- risk to Council employees;
- risk to operational effectiveness and efficiency;
- risk to achieving strategic objectives;
- risk to reputation;
- related to another identified strategic risk; and/or
- high likelihood of a material or non-material change being required due to the presence of a policy amendment trigger listed in this policy, and urgency.

Policy Review Triggers

Policy should not be triggered by ad hoc reactions to isolated incidents, complaints, or issues.

New policy or policy amendments may be triggered by:

- legislative change;
- · Council objectives changing;
- changing or emerging community needs or expectations;
- patterns of need emerging from incidents, complaints, or issues presenting reviews;
- governance review or audit recommendations (for example: Audit and Risk Committee, Crime and Corruption Commission, Office of the Information Commission, etc.);
- identification of a policy gap and associated risk;
- development in best practice;
- identified policy document conflicts;
- formalisation of common practice, to increase transparency, consistency, and accountability; or
- making a policy setting more inclusive and accessible.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

When policy positions are developed an analysis of the financial impacts is undertaken to ensure that the policy can be effectively managed with current resources and where necessary other resources are identified for consideration in policy implementation. This includes any future impacts as consequence of the policy where phased implementation has been identified.

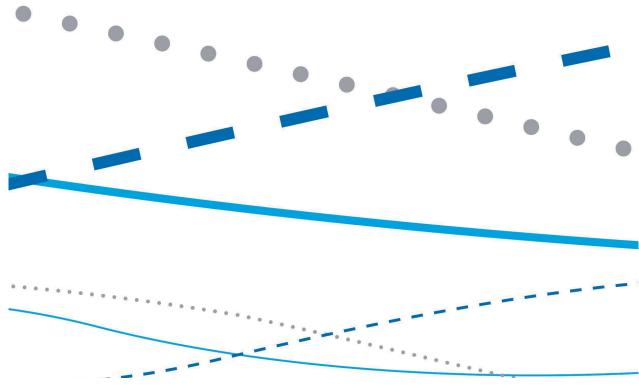

Aim

The purpose of this Framework is to provide guidance on the types of policies within Council, the approval authority process and instructions on how to develop/review policies – i.e. a corporate approach (Framework) to developing and reviewing Policies.

This policy framework applies to the elected Council and Council employees developing, drafting and setting policy.

What is a Policy?

Policy is a statement of intent to guide action and decision-making. Policy sets principles or standards that apply to the practice and conduct of Council's operations, employees and Councillors.

Policy is developed and set to meet a community or organisational need. This may be in response to legislation, the community's reasonable expectations or Council's strategic intentions.

Policy can be identified in common practice (or precedented action). Policy settings may be represented in principles, commitments, statements, goals or aspirations. Policy may be supported by guideline and/or procedure documents which outline how a policy setting will be operationalised.

Council is committed to policy settings which support legislative and regulatory compliance, enable efficient and effective decision-making, and establish clear accountabilities and responsibilities.

Policy must assist decision-makers to reflect reasonable community expectations, balanced with Council's responsibilities and capabilities.

Council understands that trust in the currency, consistency and functionality of a policy setting is related to the rigour and appropriateness of its related policy development process.

Policies support the achievement of quality outcomes and reduce institutional risk by establishing standards and internal controls. The principles outlined in policy are shaped by:

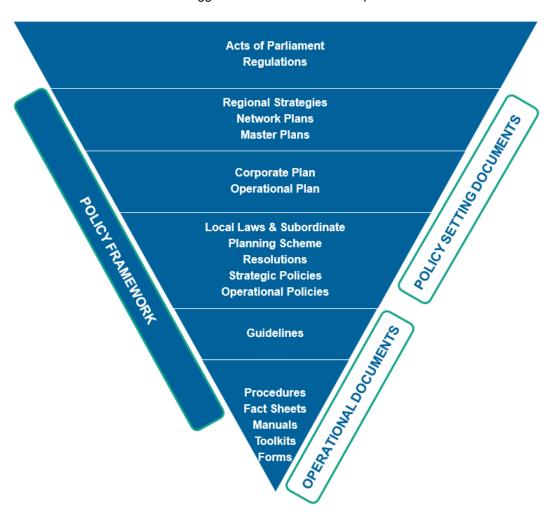

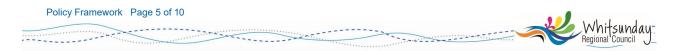

Policy Commitment

Council employees and Councillors covered in the scope of any policy must consistently demonstrate and uphold the intent, purpose, and principles of that policy. Council policy must not require or authorise a Council employee or Councillor to act in any way that is contrary to law. Any instances of non-compliance will be managed in accordance with any relevant codes of conduct, policies and legislation dealing with conduct and/or disciplinary action.

All policy must be read and complied with in accordance with associated guidelines.

Policy Application

Business Area Obligation

Each business area must be able to easily locate, articulate, implement and review the Policy Framework relevant to their work (i.e. the sum of relevant policy positions, and any supporting guideline or procedure documents).

New Policies

Before seeking to establish a new policy, consolidation with existing policies is to be considered, and amendments to existing policies be fully explored.

At initiation of a strategic or organisational policy development process, the policy holder must provide a brief report to Council's ELT to advise of proposed policy development process.

Policy Naming

Policy names must be concise and plainly state the relevant policy topic. The first word of the name should be the most commonly searched term related to the policy topic.

PURPOSE

For Council to consider revoking and adopting policies, due for review, based on the recommendations of Council Officers.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Council is required to review and update policies to meet legislative requirements and to ensure the currency of policies.

In April 2024, findings and recommendations of an internal review of Councils support of community groups was provided by OCM. The recommended changes to the policies outlined in this report are based on the recommendations within the internal review findings. Although changes are being proposed, Council will continue to provide financial support to the community through grants, donations and sponsorships.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

- 1. Adopt the following amended policies:
 - a. Community Donations Policy (Attachment 2)
 - b. Community Sponsorship Policy (Attachment 1)
 - c. Community Grant Policy (Attachment 3)
- 2. Revoke the Financial Support for a Junior Elite Athlete Policy (Attachment 4)

BACKGROUND

For many years Council has administered a number of donation, sponsorship and grant funding policies to enable not for profit organisations, sport and recreation clubs and junior elite athletes to apply for and receive funding to assist with the operation of clubs and ability to attend sporting events within Queensland, Australia and overseas.

DISCUSSION/CURRENT ISSUE

Council Officers have undertaken a review on the existing policies following the internal review on the financial support Council provides to the community. The key changes below are reflective of the recommendations made in the internal review:

Community Donations Policy

- a) All donation proposals with a value up to and including \$20,000 (including cash and/or in-kind contributions), can be approved under delegation by the CEO and/or Director.
- b) For all donation proposals with a value over \$20,000 (including cash and/or in-kind contributions), approval must be by Council resolution.
- c) Submission of an agenda report will be provided to monthly Ordinary Council Meetings for noting of donations that have been approved for the respective months.

- d) Applications for donations must be in writing on the approved Donation Application Form and be specific as to the type and amount of donation and how the support will be used.
- e) Item (ii) under Eligible Community Organisation Definition amended to read: a community organisation with a licence under the *Gaming Machine Act 1991*, a licence under the *Keno Act 1996* and/or a licence under the *Wagering Act 1998*.

Community Sponsorship Policy

- a) All sponsorship proposals with a value up to and including \$20,000 (including cash and/or in-kind contributions), can be approved under delegation by the CEO and/or Director, provided that such sponsorship complies with this policy.
- b) For all sponsorship proposals with a value over \$20,000 (including cash and/or in-kind contributions), approval must be by Council resolution.
- c) Submission of an agenda report will be provided to monthly Ordinary Council Meetings for noting of sponsorships that have been approved for the respective months.
- d) The acquittal must be signed by two committee members of the organisation e.g. President and Treasurer. Failure to provide an acquittal by the given due date will exclude the sponsorship recipient from receiving funds from Council in the future.
- e) Eligible Community Organisation added to Definitions.

<u>Donations on Rates and Charges for Not-for-Profit Organisations Policy</u>

This policy has been reviewed and will be presented and included with the budget policies review.

Community Grant Policy

Financial Support for a Junior Elite Athlete Guidelines

- a) The applicant must be selected to represent North Queensland, Queensland or Australia (or equivalent as assessed by Council's nominated Officer) in an officially recognised State, National or International event. Applications where an athlete has nominated themselves or chosen to participate in the sports program or event will not be eligible. Athletes must be selected through trial games or matches or meet qualifying times to attend competition.
- b) Funding amounts are no longer approved on a progressive scale. All approved applicants will receive \$250.

Sport and Recreation Club Grant Guidelines

- a) Recommended Progressive Funding Scale
 - i. Band 1 12 to 50 members \$1,000
 - ii. Band 2 51 to 100 members \$1,500
 - iii. Band 3 over 100 members \$2,000

Financial Support for a Junior Elite Athlete Policy

This policy is recommended for deletion, contents of the policy have been incorporated into the Grants policy, and a guideline will be developed to detail the process for Financial Support for a Junior Elite Athletes.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to provide a framework that defines the parameters under which Council will provide sponsorship to eligible community organisations, including measures that ensure risks are managed and commitments do not exceed annual budgetary limits, as well as protecting the reputation of Council.

Scope

This policy applies to all sponsorships where Council is the sponsoring entity. It applies to Councillors, employees of the Council and those organisations wishing to obtain a sponsorship from Council.

Policy Statement

Councillors and employees must be mindful at all times of their obligation to maintain public confidence in Council administration and must be aware that acceptance of any gift or benefit from an external party may, or may be seen to, affect the performance of official duties, or influence, or be seen to influence, their decision-making or behaviour.

Councillors and employees must not ask for or encourage the giving of any form of gift or benefit in connection with the performance of their official duties. This includes entering any discretionary competitions which involve a prize.

Any gift or benefit accepted, regardless of monetary value, implies, or may imply, a relationship which may interfere with objectivity and independence.

Guiding Principles

- 1.1 Council may invest in a sponsorship which provides identified benefits to the Whitsunday community and aligns with Council's Corporate Plan, statutory requirements and in accordance with budgetary allocations, policies and procedures.
- 1.2 If a request for sponsorship is received by Council, the request is to be assessed against the following key principles:
 - 1.2.1 Community Benefit sponsorships must provide an identified economic, social, cultural or environmental benefit to the Whitsunday community.
 - 1.2.2 Corporate Plan sponsorships must align with the Corporate Plan and Council policies.
 - 1.2.3 Risk Assessment Council must consider issues such as reputational risk, potential conflicts of interest and financial investment versus return.
 - 1.2.4 Fairness and Consistency sponsorship commitments will take into consideration the need to support activities or programs across all townships in the region.
 - 1.2.5 Not for Profit Council will have the right to prioritise sponsorship commitments to activities or programs managed by not for profit groups.
 - 1.2.6 Sponsorship is separate from Council's other funding programs stipulated in the Community Grants Policy and the Community Donations Policy as grants and donations are provided to recipients with no expectation of a commercial return for Council and/or the community.

- 1.3 A Sponsorship proposal and associated documents must be submitted to Council for review at least eight (8) weeks prior to the event.
- 1.4 All sponsorship proposals with a value up to and including \$20,000 (including cash and/or in kind contributions), can be approved under delegation by the CEO and/or Director, provided that such sponsorship complies with this policy.
- 1.5 For all sponsorship proposals with a value over \$20,000 (including cash and/or in kind contributions), approval must be by Council resolution.
- 1.6 Submission of an agenda report will be provided to monthly Ordinary Council Meetings for noting of sponsorships that have been approved for the respective months.

2. Suitable Sponsorship Recipients

2.1 Council shall only enter into sponsorships with potential recipients if the objectives and activities of the potential recipients are compatible with Council's legislative requirements, vision, plans, policies and cultural values

3. Eligible Activities/Events or Programs

- 3.1 Council may consider sponsorship for:
 - 3.1.1 Major sport/recreation events.
 - 3.1.2 Community/cultural events.
 - 3.1.3 Trade shows.
 - 3.1.4 Business awards/conferences; and
 - 3.1.5 Initiatives from other Government Agencies.

4. Ineligible Activities/Events or Programs

- 4.1 Council will not consider sponsorship for activities/events or programs that:
 - 4.1.1 Are organised by political or religious organisations (not including charities that are run by religious groups);
 - 4.1.2 Conflict with State or Federal legislation or directions.
 - 4.1.3 Excludes or offends minority community groups.
 - 4.1.4 Could present a hazard to the community or the environment.
 - 4.1.5 Promotes gambling, smoking and/or consumption of other addictive substances.
 - 4.1.6 May misrepresent Council's sponsorship motives.
 - 4.1.7 Are held outside the region's boundaries or, where the majority of the audience is external to the region.

5. Levels of Sponsorship

- 5.1 For the purposes of this policy, a sponsorship will be defined as:
 - 5.1.1 Minor the sponsorship has a value up to and including \$5,000 or
 - 5.1.2 Major the sponsorship has a value of more than \$5,000.6.

6. The Agreement

- 6.1 For all sponsorships above \$5,000 the sponsorship recipient must enter into a contract with Council, in writing, that sets out:
 - 6.1.1 The mutual benefits of entering into this agreement.
 - 6.1.2 The terms and conditions of the sponsorship for both parties.
 - 6.1.3 The financial accountability requirements.
 - 6.1.4 The agreed performance measure for assessment, post the activity/event or program.
 - 6.1.5 The consequences of change of circumstance of either party.
 - 6.1.6 The provision for termination or suspension of the agreement; and
 - 6.1.7 The acquittal requirements.

7. Recognition of Council's Contribution

- 7.1 As part of any sponsorship, Council will be publicly acknowledged as a contributor. This recognition may include, but is not limited to:
 - 7.1.1 Acknowledgement in media releases and promotional activities.
 - 7.1.2 Brand exposure at events or associated functions.
 - 7.1.3 Opportunities for Council to do onsite promotion during events; and
 - 7.1.4 Opportunities for Council participation in formal ceremonies.

8. The Acquittal Process

- 8.1 As part of any sponsorship, the successful recipient must acquit the use of Council's contributions in a method determined by Council. The acquittal will require, but is not limited to, the provision of a report to Council detailing:
 - 8.1.1 How the sponsorship funds were expended; and
 - 8.1.2 Council's recognition at the event.

The acquittal must be signed by two committee members of the organisation e.g. President and Treasurer. Failure to provide an acquittal by the given due date will exclude the sponsorship recipient from receiving funds from Council in the future.

 - 1.2.2 The receiving community organisation or entity meet the eligibility criteria set out in this policy.
 - 1.2.3 The donation will be used for a purpose that is in the public interest.
 - 1.2.4 The donation will meet a community and/or social need in the local community.
- 1.3 Council may consider providing donations for:
 - 1.3.1 Development Application Fees
 - 1.3.2 Event Application Fees
 - 1.3.3 Food and Local Law Licence Fees
 - 1.3.4 Green Waste Disposal Fees
 - 1.3.5 To support activities/events and endeavours of eligible Community Organisations.
- 1.4 The donation may be any of the following types:
 - 1.4.1 a monetary payment; or
 - 1.4.2 in-kind support undertaken by the Council to a specified value.
- 1.5 Eligible Community Organisations may make more than one application for a donation, per financial year, but can only apply for assistance up to a total of \$3,000.00.

- 1.8 For all sponsorship proposals with a value over \$20,000 (including cash and/or in kind contributions), approval must be by Council resolution.

2. Conflict of Interest

2.1 To ensure an accountable and transparent assessment process is maintained, Councillors, and Council Officers assessing donation applications are required to declare any declarable and prescribed conflict of interests prior to the assessment process commencing. This may include a personal connection with any applicant or personal involvement with any organisation. Anyone having a conflict of interest should not debate, be involved in any discussions, or vote on any matter relating to the application.

3. <u>Donation Application Process</u>

3.1 Applications for donations must be in writing on the approved Donation Application Form and be specific as to the type and amount of donation and how the support will be used.

- 6.5 An entity that is funded or subsidised by the State or Federal governments, including educational organisations.

Funded entity means an eligible community organisation approved by the Council to receive a grant. Grant Agreement means a written agreement between a funded entity and the Council about giving a grant.

Financial Support for a Junior Elite Athlete Policy

Community Services - Community Development COMM_16

Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to provide a framework for Council to financially assist junior elite athletes living in the Whitsunday Regional Council area. The support will be specific to alleviating the costs of representing North Queensland in elite sporting competitions within Queensland, representing Queensland in National competitions or representing Australia at International events.

Scope

This policy applies to Councillors, employees and contractors of the Whitsunday Regional Council if the Whitsunday Regional Council gives, or proposes to give, financial support to an individual junior elite athlete.

Policy Statement

Financial Support for an Individual Junior Elite Athlete

Council may give financial support to an individual junior elite athlete only under this policy and may be for any of the following -

- a) Representing North Queensland in State level competition \$250.00
- b) Representing Queensland at a National competition held in Queensland \$500.00
- c) Representing Queensland at a National competition held Interstate \$1,000.00
- d) Representing Australia in an International event up to \$2,000.00

Guidelines

Council may make guidelines about -

- a) the criteria for an individual elite athlete to be eligible for financial support from Council; and
- b) the form in which documents may be given under this policy; and
- c) other matters Council considers appropriate for the administration of this policy.

If a guideline is made, Council must:

- a) publish the guideline on Council's website; and
- b) notify the making of the guideline in a conspicuous place in Council's public offices.

Eligibility

The applicant must be:

- a) 18 years or younger at the time of competition.
- a permanent resident of the Whitsunday Regional Council local government area for at least 12 months prior to application.
- representing North Queensland, Queensland or Australia (or equivalent as assessed by Council's nominated Officer) in an officially recognised State, National or International event.
- d) be amateur in status.





Financial Support for a Junior Elite Athlete Policy

Community Services - Community Development COMM 16

Applicants who have successfully received funding under this program, and are chosen to represent at a higher level, may be eligible for further funding, but this will be at the discretion of Council.

Funding is not provided for applicant (s) representing religious organisations or government departments.

Applying for a grant

An eligible individual junior elite athlete, or their representative, may make an application to Council for financial support.

Financial support applications must be—

- a) made on the approved form to Council; and
- b) accompanied by any documents required under the form to be attached to, or given with, the application including written verification of selection from the relevant organisation, evidence of associated costs and a statutory declaration of the applicant's financial contribution.

Council must accept an application that complies with subsections a) and b).

Assessing an application for a grant

The Council may give financial support only if:

- a) The grant is appropriate having regard to other priorities and available resources.
- b) The receiving individual meets the eligibility criteria set out in this policy and in the supporting guidelines for the specific funding program.
- c) The grant will be used for a purpose that is in the public interest.
- d) The grant will provide opportunities for local junior elite athletes to excel in their chosen sport.

Conflict of interest

To ensure an accountable and transparent assessment process is maintained, Councillors, and Council Officers assessing grant applications are required to declare any declarable and prescribed conflict of interests prior to the assessment process commencing. This may include a personal connection with any applicant or personal involvement with any organisation. Anyone having a conflict of interest should not debate, be involved in any discussions, or vote on any matter relating to the application.

Deciding an application for a grant

Council must give written notice of the decision to the applicant.

The decision notice must be given within 5 business days after the day the decision is made.

 - ii) representing a political party under the Electoral Act 1992; or
 - iii) a religious body or religious organisation declared by the Governor-General by proclamation pursuant to the Marriage Act 1961 (Cwlth) to be a recognised denomination for the purposes of the Commonwealth Act.

PURPOSE

For Council's consideration to align all Council owned and managed holiday parks under one brand.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Council currently operates 3 holiday parks under separate branding and it is proposed to align all these together under the one brand of Whitsunday Holiday Parks.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

- 1. Endorses the alignment of Council owned and managed holiday parks under the brand Whitsunday Holiday Parks; and
- 2. Endorses the rebranding of:
 - a) Wangaratta Caravan Park to Whitsunday Holiday Parks Queens Beach Bowen;
 - b) Lake Proserpine Campgrounds to Whitsunday Holiday Parks Lake Proserpine; and
 - c) Proserpine Tourist Park to Whitsunday Holiday Parks Proserpine

BACKGROUND

Council's owned and managed Parks being Wangaratta Caravan Park, Proserpine Tourist Park and Lake Proserpine Campground were consolidated under the management of the Commercial Businesses Directorate on the 1st of October 2023 as part strategic business planning, ensuring long term growth and expansion which was identified as a key priority for these facilities.

To achieve this, a unified rebranding of all the parks is being proposed. As part of the proposed brand implementation, a modern Whitsunday Holiday Parks website with direct and online travel agent reservation interfacing will be implemented.

The unified group branding will lead to growth and increased occupancy through group marketing opportunities, internal cross marketing and referrals between parks.

DISCUSSION/CURRENT ISSUE

The goal is to align all the Council owned and managed holiday parks to operate in unison, that connects through brand elements which will drive a clean and consistent brand.

The new brand will be branded 'Whitsunday Holiday Parks'. The proposed logos have been developed to reflect a clean, modern and timeless look that includes colours which

represents each of the locations within the region, enhancing the overall appeal of the holiday parks.

If Council supports the proposed direction, a full brand Style Guide for Whitsunday Holiday Parks will be developed and include:

PURPOSE

To inform Council of the 2024 Lake Proserpine Golden Barramundi Fishing Competition.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Lake Proserpine Campgrounds are hosting the second annual Kids Fishing Day 28 September 2024 and in conjunction with that event, it is intended to launch the 2024 Lake Proserpine Golden Barramundi Fishing Competition.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION

That Council:

- a) Endorse the 2024 Lake Proserpine Golden Barramundi Fishing Competition; and
- b) Authorise the allocation of \$35,000.00, for the total prize money from the Commercial Businesses, Whitsunday Holiday Parks Marketing budget.

BACKGROUND

Whitsunday Regional Council's Lake Proserpine Campground hosted the first annual Family Fishing Day on 21 October 2023. This was funded primarily through the Queensland Community Fishing Grant and supported by Sunwater, Matthew Scholz Pelagic Pursuit, Coral Coast Barramundi and Mudskippa.

The day was a huge success and attracted 150 visitors and included fishing education, barramundi fingerling release and prize giveaways such as fishing rods.

Lake Proserpine Campground will be hosting the second annual Kids Fishing Day 'the Event' on the 28 September 2024.

Coral Coast Barramundi are an active partner in the Event and will be supplying fingerlings for the 2024 event, as they did in 2023. The fingerlings are supplied as part of the Lake Proserpine re-stocking permit and quota and in accordance with SunWater regulations.

DISCUSSION/CURRENT ISSUE

Coral Coast Barramundi have also offered to donate in honour of the Event, three extremely rare, tagged fish being one Golden Barramundi and two Platinum Barramundi.

Golden Barramundi represent 1 in 10 million in the wild and Platinum Barramundi represent only 1% of all Barramundi born. Both fish types are extremely sought after in the fishing community and catching a fish of this rarity is a once in a lifetime opportunity for avid anglers.

As part of ongoing marketing and development plans aimed at increasing visitation to the Lake Proserpine Campground and the Whitsunday Region, it is proposed to launch a golden barramundi fishing competition in conjunction with the Kids Fishing Day to be held at the

Lake Proserpine Campgrounds on the 28th of September 2024. It will be marketed as the 2024 Lake Proserpine Golden Barramundi Fishing Competition.

Prize money for the recapture of the tagged fish is recommended as:

- 1 x \$20,000.00 Golden Barramundi; and
- 2 x \$7,500.00 for the Platinum Barramundi.

The 2024 Lake Proserpine Golden Barramundi Fishing Competition will run from the 28 September 2024 – 28 September 2025. Should the three fish not be caught successfully during this time, it is intended to increase the prize money marginally annually. This will be reviewed at the conclusion of the Competition.

This Competition follows on from the hugely successful Million Dollar Fishing competition campaign held in the Northern Territory.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The prize money of \$35,000.00 will be allocated from the Commercial Businesses, Whitsunday Holiday Parks Marketing 2024/2025 budget.

The proposed Golden Barra - O/N Visitors event is planned to run for 365 days. It is an event of Region significance and is estimated to attract 20 visitors per day over the 365 days, with an average spend per person per day of \$415. This equals a total visitor spend of \$3,029,500 attributed to this event. Assuming the event will be held in Whitsunday, it is calculated to have the following potential impact:

As you may be aware, each year in accordance with the *Holidays Act 1983* local governments are invited to request special holidays to be observed during the following year for districts in their area.

If you wish to request special holidays to be observed during 2025 for districts in your local government area, please complete the attached request form and submit via email to info@oir.qld.gov.au by no later than **Friday**, **12 July 2024**.

A local council requested special holiday is a public holiday only if it is in respect of an agricultural, horticultural or industrial show. Under federal industrial relations legislation, on a public holiday employees are, without loss of ordinary pay, entitled to be absent from work or refuse to work in reasonable circumstances. Employees who work on a public holiday are entitled to penalty rates in accordance with their award or agreement.

A special holiday for any other reason is not a public holiday but is a bank holiday only and under the *Trading (Allowable Hours) Act 1990*, is only a holiday for banks and insurance offices and under a directive of the *Public Sector Act 2022*, a holiday for public service employees unless otherwise determined by a chief executive.

Upon receiving Ministerial approval, the holidays will be published in the Queensland Government Gazette. Confirmation of the approved special holidays together with a link to the Queensland Government Gazette will be emailed to your office.

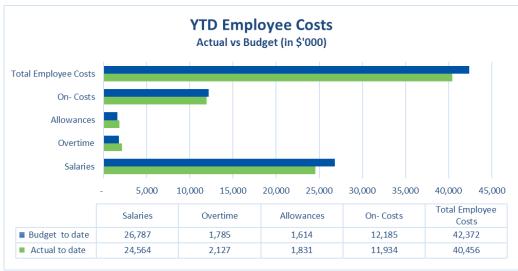
- Total Recurrent Earnings is on target to meet budget, currently sitting at 98%.
- What we have levied our ratepayers is on target at 101%. The second issue of Rates and Water notices were issued in February and discount for early payment closed 8 March 2024. The 1% relates to a small reduction in the number of prompt payment discounts compared to budget and new subdivisions that have occurred throughout the year.
- What we invoice our Customers is under budget at 89% due to timing of invoices being issued.
- Our Other Revenue is under budget at 81% predominately due to reduced revenue for passenger screening fees offset by reduced spend by the business on suppliers and operations
- Interest from Investments is performing well being ahead of budget at 107% due to maximising Council's return on investment with the underspend in operational expenditure and capital YTD expenditure, in addition to interest rates remaining higher than anticipated.

Expenditure

- Total direct spend is below YTD budget, currently sitting at 93%.
- Total spent on our staff is currently 95% of the YTD budget with limited change from the previous month at 94%. This is currently trending lower than budget due to staff vacancies.
- Total spent on suppliers is currently under budget at 92% of the YTD Budget with the gap increasing slightly more than the previous month at 91%. It is anticipated that more of this budget will be spent with invoices being processed as we progress towards end of financial year.
- Total depreciation set aside for asset renewals will be on target to meet budget.

Additional details of revenue and expenditure and their comparison to budget are graphically presented below which also demonstrates in labour costs that overtime is increasing over budget due to vacancies.





Employee costs continue to track under budget in a tight labour market with continuing difficulties in attracting specialist skills to vacancies within Council.

COMMUNITY WEALTH

The value of resources Council has, to service our community. Net Community wealth at the end of the period stood at \$1.31B.

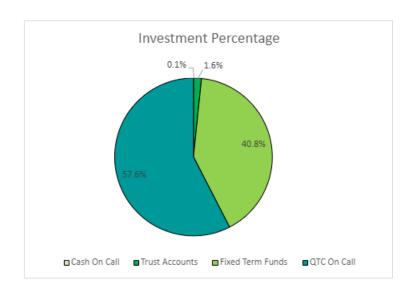

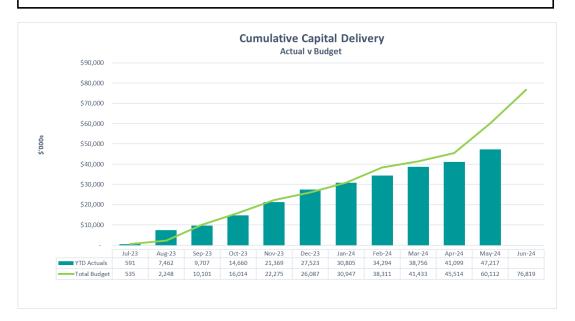

- \$60M is currently invested in term deposits at competitive interest rates to maximise Council's return on investment with \$20M maturing in June 2024.
- The balance of excess cash is invested with Queensland Treasury Corporation (QTC), as QTC
 has been providing the best returns among the acceptable counterparty institutions.

CAPITAL DELIVERY (Excluding remediation)

- \$47M or 61% of the full year capital budget of \$76.8M has been delivered up to 31 May excluding commitments.
- \$29.3M has been committed to date, which has increased from \$27.5M committed in April, which represents 99.6% of the full year capital budget spent or committed.
- The Project Management Framework continues to build momentum in its use across the majority of projects and reporting on project delivery is becoming more consistent.
